\$25,000 BONDS JANUARY 8TH

An election for the purpose of voting on the issuance of \$25,000 bonds to be used in enlarging Brady's water supply, has been called for the second Tuesday in January, being January 8th, and all qualified voters of the city of Brady will be entitled to vote for or against the measure.

The proposition of voting on the question of bonds to enlarge the Brady water supply has been under consideration by leading citizens for some time, and at the meeting of the Brady city council Tuesday the matter was brought before that body for action, with the result that the councilmen voted unanimously to call the election.

The one idea in voting bonds, is to increase Brady's water supply, and whether the most feasible plan is to enlarge the present dam, build a dam on Bowie creek, or to adopt some other
