

Conserving the Garden Moisture.

"To obtain best results," says G. D. Everett, garden specialist, Extension Service, A. and M. College of Texas, "cultivation in the garden should be started as quickly this spring as the soil can be worked in order to conserve the moisture which lou, and attending to business. is now in the soil. Cultivate not only where the seeds have been sown, but over the entire garden. Mistakes have been made in the past by failure to cultivate that part of the garden which was to be planted later, with the result that it was allowed to bake and the moisture permitted to escape. A soil mulch should be preserved at all times.

"Every day that the crust which forms upon the surface of the soil is left means just that much less water for the plants that are to grow there. The soil should be cultivated after every rain or irrigation and at least once every ten days during the dry periods. The depth of cultivation should be at least two inches to obtain a good mulch. This cultivation not only conserve the moisture, but makes a better home for the plants and keeps the weed down.

"The spike or spring tooth harrow is a good tool to use in a large garden, and the hand wheel cultivators Schwenker. in a small garden. The rake, hoe or hand cultivator makes a good mulch when used properly."

136 COUNTIES TO BE REMOVED FROM **QUARANTINE AREA**

One hundred and thirty-six counties in Texas will on April 1 or April 15 be released from both federal and state quarantines against the sheep scab, according to instructions that have just been received in San Angelo by Dr. I. B. Paxton, chief of the bureau of animal industry, United States department of agriculture. They came from D. H. Cunningham of Ft. Worth, chairman of the state livestock sanitary commission, and upon the recommendation of the federal bureau.

According to Dr. Paxton only eleven counties in Texas remains under quarantine aganist the scabies, these being Concho, Crockett, Edwards, Kimble, Menard, Pecos, Tom Green, Schleicher, Terrell, Sutton and Val CALL TO ENLIST IN THE

3,000,000 Free Sheep Inspected.

The greater part of the work resulting in the ordered removal of the quarantine was begun on May 1, of last year. Between May 1, 1917, and February 1, 1918, 3,256,837 "free" sheep, that is sheep without scabies were inspected; 1,112,949 exposed sheep were handled, 358,530 infected ones were treated and 820,577 infected animals were dipped. This means that the federal bureau working in conjunction with state and county inspectors handled more than 505,000 sheep each month.



MEATLESS DAYS SAVE 140,000,000 **POUNDS OF BEEF**

Washing, D. C., Feb. 22.-Meatless days in the United States have saved 140,000,000 pounds of beef in four months, the food administration announced today. During this period 165 000,000 pounds of beef were exported to the allies together with 400,000,000 pounds of pork products. The figures were made public in a statement explaining why the food administration refused requests of cattle and sheep growers to remove beef, mutton and lamb from the conservation rules with regard to meatless days. The administration again declared that meatless day was established for the purpose of enabling the United States to feed the allies by saving on meat consumption.

Mutton and lamb are not exported and the food administration has removed the restriction on its consumption in some Western states. The restriction will be lifted soon in many other Western states in which large numbers of sheep and lambs are produced. Food Administrator Hoover will recommend to state administrators that the people be permitted to eat all the mutton and lamb they want until after April 15th, when the spring marketing season is about at an end.

"Our national consumption has increased at a faster rate than our production and, therefore, without meatless days we would not be in a position to export even the pre-war average amounts," said Hoover. "Therefore, the actual saving is more than is apparent by the comparison of former McCulloch county citizens, direct figures.

Mr. Woodall has been in Washington for several months on business connected with the Federal food administration, and expressed himself as especially interested in all efforts to increase the growing of peanuts

"In my opinion," said Mr. Woodall, "this is most desirable; by reason of my connection with the food administration, I am in position to know that there is a shortage of fats, and inasmuch as one acre of peanuts produces the same amount of fats, as five acres in cotton, it will be a big help in its solution. In addition to this we get 560 pounds of peanut cake from the production of one acre of peanuts, and only 180 pounds of cotton seed cake from one acre of cotton, and this does not take into consideration the peanut hay, which is equivalent to alfalfa.

"The Food Administration is now purchase of one pound of substitutes, and the fact that peanut flour is recognized as one of these substitutes, is an additional reason why peanuts should be considered in high favor. There is no possible chance, peanuts this year, as whether the war continues or ends, the demands for feed, food and fats will be beyond our ability to supply, and should the war end and no restrictions as to the price of commodities be placed, we may anticipate the highest prices for feeds and fats immediately following the war we have probably ever seen.



MEATLESS DAYS SAVE 140,000,000 **POUNDS OF BEEF**

Washing, D. C., Feb. 22.-Meatless days in the United States have saved 140,000,000 pounds of beef in four months, the food administration announced today. During this period 165,000,000 pounds of beef were exported to the allies together with 400,000,000 pounds of pork products. The figures were made public in a statement explaining why the food administration refused requests of cattle and sheep growers to remove beef, mutton and lamb from the conservation rules with regard to meatless days. The administration again declared that meatless day was established for the purpose of enabling the United States to feed the allies by saving on meat consumption.

Mutton and lamb are not exported and the food administration has removed the restriction on its consumption in some Western states. The restriction will be lifted soon in many other Western states in which large numbers of sheep and lambs are produced. Food Administrator Hoover will recommend to state administrators that the people be permitted to eat all the mutton and lamb they want until after April 15th, when the spring marketing season is about at an end.

"Our national consumption has increased at a faster rate than our production and, therefore, without meatless days we would not be in a position to export even the pre-war average amounts," said Hoover. "Therefore, the actual saving is more than direct figures.



SIXTH DISTRICT **ADMINISTRATORS** IN CONFERENCE

Messrs. W. D. Crothers, county food administrator, and Howard Broad deputy food administrator for McCulloch county, were in Brownwood Saturday attending the conference of food administrators of the Sixth Texas District. We reproduce the following from the Sunday's issue of Brownwood Bulletin:

"The county food administrators of the Sixth Texas District, of which Brownwood is headquarters, met in Brownwood today for a conference with District Administrator Porter A. Whaley of Brownwood and H. Wirt Steel of Washington, D. C., director of development in Texas. The local price interpreting committee also joined in the conference, a portion of which was devoted exclusively to a discussion of the duties of the price interpreters.

"Ten counties are included in this district, with an administrator i charge of the food conservaton wo: in each county, as follows: Brown county, Dr. M. L. Brown, Brownwood; Coleman county, J. C. Dibrell, Coleman; Concho county, H. H. Ratchford, Paint Rock; Mason county, H. Sneed, Mason; McCulloch county, W. D. Crothers, Brady; Menard county D. T. Benchoff, Menard; Mills county, J. C. Darroch, Goldthwaite; Runnels county, R. T. Williams, Ballinger; San Saba county, N. C. Walker, San Saba

Price Interpreting.

"Those attending the conference spent the noon hour at lunch at the Graham hotel, after which the conference was begun in earnest in the Chamber of Commerce office, Mr. Steel first discussed with the local price interpreting committee the duties of this important subdivision of the food administration, pointing out that it is not the prerogative of the committee to fix prices in this vicinity, but to ascertain first what foodstuffs cost the retailer, and then to determine upon suggested retail prices which in the opinion of the committee give the retailer a fair profit and are at the same time fair to the consumer. The local committee is composed of two wholesalers, two re tail dealers and two representative

strators is for the purpose of giving the county directors a more thorough knowledge of the regulations governing their work, so that the food regulations may be enforced in a uniform manner in each county of the district. The county administrators were in session with Mr. Steel and Mr. Whaley throughout the afternoon.


