



#### WEEK MARKED BY MANY OIL **ACTIVITIES**

The past week has seen greater activity in oil circles than at any \$15.00 time since interest first began. In all directions there are steps being 7.50 taken that point to a thorough test of McCulloch couny oil sands at an early date.

Most noteworthy of all the activithe following announcements, subject ties so far is the arrival at Rochelle Wednesday afternoon of a complete standard rig, which is to be placed on the J. F. Crews place, one mile south of Rochelle. The contract for drilling was signed by the Southwestern Petroleum Co., of St. Louis and Tulsa, Okla., one of the leading companies in the field and the drilling is under contract to the Wold Drilling Co., of Oklahoma. This company expects to begin its well as soon as it can get the rig placed. The drill will be operated with fuel oil and the oil tanks have already been placed and are in readiness for the beginning of drilling. The well is to be started with a 121/2 inch hole, and the contracts calls for a 3,000 feet

> Pruitt & Liston, who have the Sellman ranch under lease have their rig up, but operations have not yet be-

Three miles beyond the Pruitt & Liston rig, an 85-foot derrick is up, and everything is in readiness to begin work as soon as the well machinery arrives. However, this location is not definitely settled, and it is likely the rig will be moved closer to Rochelle before drilling begins.

The Great Eastern Oil Co., has leased from Bob Sellman, 1,100 acres lying three miles east of Rochelle, and have contracted to begin drilling a deep well at once.

As a result of all these activities in the Rochelle community lease prices have received a great impetus and are soaring skyward.



Well, if they lack any information just now, March 22nd, they will have learned all there is to know about the War Savings stamps through a novel plan just announced by W. D. Crothers, war savings director, and Mrs S. W. Hughes, county chairman of the Woman's War Savings committee

for McCulloch county. In order that the children may inform themselves on the subject, all schools in the county are to be supplied with the War Savings stamp questionnaire, which will give full information on the subject. On March 22nd through the co-operation of County Superintendent Marion Deans an examination will be held in all the schools, the questions being basschool turning in the best set of answers will be given a War Savings stamp, valued at \$5.00.

When it is realized that in addition to the two schools in Brady, there are thirty-nine schools in the county, the liberality of Mr. Henderson's offer must be realized. Furthermore, inasmuch as a prize is offered both to grammar and high school pupils, two prizes are thus available in schools having both these departments.

The object of the plan is, of course, to thoroughly acquaint each child in the county, and through them the parents, with the war savings stamps and their purposes. The War Savings committee has been working hard to interest all the citizens in the war savings plan, and through the timely offer of Mr. Henderson it is hoped to further the great work they are doing more rapidly, and to make it more wide-spread.

Already, through the efforts of Mrs. Hughes and her assistants, have several war savings societies been organized in the schools of the county, the latest to report being that at Fairview school, Miss Tempie Davis, teacher.

In order that all may fully understand the rules governing the offering of the prize, we herewith publish them for the guidance of teachers and pupils:





### **REP. BEASLEY** SUPPORTS TEN MILE ZONE BILI

Following receipt of the telegram from the McCulloch County Red Cross chapter, requesting his support of measure to make Texas dry, Representative Beasley has written that body, pledging his support to the ten mile dry zone bill, as well as any subsequent legislation that may tend towards making the state of Texas dry. His letter to the Red Cross organization is as follows:

"Austin, Texas, Feb. 27, 1918.

"Dear Mrs. Schaeg:
"Your telegram of yesterday requesting my support of some measure that will make Texas dry received, and I beg to assure you that I am heartily in accord with the propoam heartily in accord with the proposition to drive the saloons from the State at this time and I shall not dis-

appoint you.
"The Governor today asked the legislature to create a ten-mile dry zone around all places where soldiers are in training, and it is my opinion that this bill should be apssed to go into effect immediately and to be folowed by another provided for State wide prohibition.

"I believe that it will be unwise to amend the zone bill in such a way as to make its effect State-wide, for we have no assurance that the Governor will approve the latter and should he not, then we will have lost the relief offered by the former.
"I thank you for the telegram and trust that you and your contractions."

White of this city received a telegram from Mr. Beasley stating the ten mile dry zone bill had been passed Monday, March 4th, and would become effective April 1st. The vote in the house was 108 favoring and 10 opposing. The bill is already assured of passage in the senate.

The Texas legislature on Monday afternoon also joined the states which have ratified the prohibition amendment to the Federal constitution.


