Cattle which were almost too poor to stay on their feet, recovered speedily after being placed on the soap weed diet, and soon were able to kick up their heels  $\mathbf{M}^{\text{ISCELLANEOUS}}$ and get fat. The soap weed, he states, is worth \$1.00 per ton, and 50 tons may be grown on an acre of land. Another commercial discovery of im-portance is that sugar can be made from the soap weed. 
