- Know your buyer. If you don't know him personally, at least check out his financial situation with his banker.

- Don't get into the creditlending business. Beware of the buyer who asks you to extend credit or hold a postdated check. - Beware of the over-anxious

buyer - the one who attempts to rush you into a decision, offers you more than your livestock is worth, or is buying everything in sight.

- Protect yourself by dealing with a market agent at a central public market or a bonded order buyer. Statistics show that most "failure to pay" problems arise with packer buyers who are not bonded. - Insist on prompt payment. At central public markets you get paid the same day you sell. Packer and order buyers are required by the P & S to pay for livestock by the close of the next business day.

Financial protection should not become an overlooked aspect of your marketing system. United's market specialists point out that if you've spent months feeding your livestock, you can certainly spend a few hours making sure you'll be paid for them.

> Does winter have days with less sunlight than the other seasons? Is this why it's the coldest of our sea-

> Strangely enough, winter does not have less sunlight than any other season. Fall, which ends December 21st this year, averages the same amount of sunlight per day, as does winter.

> The shortest day of the year, December 22nd, is the winter solstice and from then until the solstice, in June, the days are getting longer. So the days actually begin to get longer as soon as winter begins.

> Winter is the coldest of the seasons because the earth loses most of its summer heat by January and February. But January and February contain more daylight than November and December.



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
