**M'CULLOCH COUNTY OVER TOP
WITH THE THIRD LIBERTY LOAN**

**Quota 5 Per Cent Over-Subscribed Wednesday—
Total Subscription Wednesday Night
\$115,000—Still Coming.**

McCulloch county is "Over the Top" with her quota of the Third Liberty Loan bonds. In fact the quota has been 5 per cent oversubscribed, and additional subscriptions are still coming in. The Honor Flag has been ordered and upon arrival will be flung to the breeze with appropriate ceremony.

Subscriptions reported up to Wednesday night were as follows:

Brady National Bank	\$ 35,000
Commercial National Bank	70,800

Total	\$114,800

The Melvin State bank forwarded their subscriptions direct to the Federal Reserve bank at Dallas, but this amount will eventually be credited to McCulloch county. Several hundreds of dollars of additional subscriptions were received yesterday, but had not been tabulated and so cannot be credited in the total. However, it is assured that McCulloch county will go at least 5 per cent over her quota. Credit for the unparalleled success of the bond campaign in McCulloch county is largely due C. A. Weise, assistant county chairman, who mapped out the plan of campaign and who

was tireless in his efforts to secure the Honor Flag for McCulloch county. In this he was ably assisted by patriotic citizens not only of Brady but from all over the county. In addition to the initial sum subscribed at the time of the rally held here two weeks ago, committees which visited every part of the county during the present week were successful in bringing in many additional subscriptions from these points—in fact, it was this final effort that put the Liberty Loan over.

Should there be any citizen or citizens who have not yet subscribed and who wish to have their names placed on the honor roll, they are urged to get their subscriptions in not later than Saturday, when the campaign closes. Uncle Sam has given practical assurance of accepting all over-subscriptions, so let every McCulloch county citizen do his patriotic duty.

SANTA FE AND FRISCO OFFICES CONSOLIDATED-BENNETT AGENT

Government Supervision of Railroads Responsible for Conservation Order—Entire Santa Fe Office Force Retained.

With no small degree of surprise it became known Wednesday that acting under direction of government authority, the local offices of the Santa Fe and Frisco railways had been consolidated, and will in future be operated jointly under one head. G. M. Bennett, formerly Santa Fe agent, was made joint agent, and the entire Santa Fe office force was retained. It is thought very likely that Clint Zimmerman and Jim Anderson, formerly of the Frisco will also be given positions in the joint office. Chas. Weise, agent, and R. O. Andrews, cashier for the Frisco, expect to be transferred to some other point on the Frisco lines.

Mr. Weise was checked out on Wednesday by M. R. Anderson, auditor for the Frisco, the change becoming effective May 1st. It is with greatest regret that Brady and McCulloch county citizens learn of the transfer of Messrs. Weise and Andrews. Not only has Mr. Weise made an exceptionally efficient and courteous agent, but he and Mrs. Weise have both been favorites in local church, social and business circles.

As secretary for the Brady Y. M. B. L., Mr. Weise has done notable work for the town and county, his latest achievement being the planning and carrying out of the Liberty Loan drive in McCulloch county, which resulted Wednesday in McCulloch county going "Over the Top" with her quota. Mr. Andrews and family, in the short time they have been Brady residents, have also made many warm friends, all of whom are loathe to see them leave.

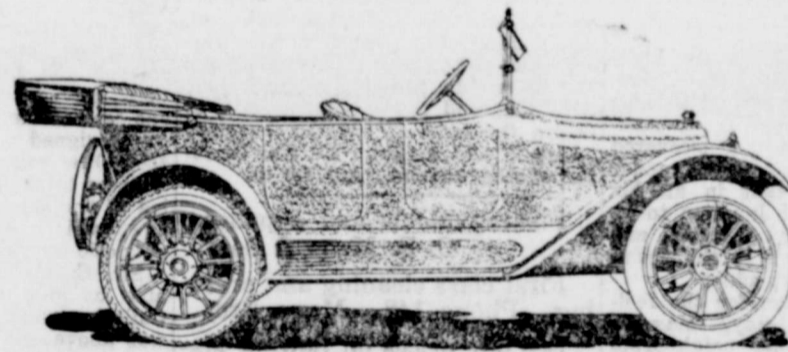

BUYS 100,000 POUNDS WOOL IN HOOD-ERATH CO.

H. P. Roddie returned Tuesday morning from Hood and Erath counties, where he had purchased 100,000 pounds of wool—the entire output of the two counties. The wool is being concentrated at Granbury and Stephenville, and Howard Campbell is at these points now completing arrangements for shipment of the wool to Boston. The wool was purchased at figures ranging from \$1.22 to \$1.68, clean basis, which is in accord with the prices fixed by the government, and the shipment will be taken over by U. S. authorities upon its arrival at market. The prices quoted are the equivalent of 40 to 55 cents for grease wool.

Mr. Roddie estimates that there will be a shortage of two million pounds of wool this season over last year. It is stated that at San Angelo, Menard and Junction as a result of the drought, there is a shortage of 300,000 head of sheep from last year. Basing the value of the wool from this number at \$4.00 a head, and of the increase at \$2.00 a head, it can readily be seen there will result a loss of approximately \$2,000,000 to wool growers of this section.

Editor's Note—If there is any one in the Mount Tabor community hoarding flour, or violating the food laws the matter should be reported at once to the authorities. Such act is punishable by fine or imprisonment or both, and the offenders may be severely dealt with under the Espionage law just recently passed. In all earnest, the editor warns every citizen having in his possession more flour than the food regulations permit, to return the same at once to the store where it was bought. He will be returned the amount paid for it.

ODOM P. MARTIN HEADS CASUALTY LIST OF CORPORALES IN THE MARINES

Washington, D. C., April 25.—The total losses of the brigade of marines with the American expeditionary force in France so far reported was announced today by Major General Barnett, commandant of the corps, as 278, divided as follows: Killed in action, 22; died from wounds 10; died from accidents 2, wounded in action 244.

All the dead are enlisted men, but eight officers, two captains and six lieutenants, were among the wounded.

Most of the casualties were in one company, which, General Barnett said lost a total of twenty-one men killed and 140 wounded out of a personnel of 250. The dates on which the marines were killed and wounded were not made public, nor was it indicated what part of the line the "soldiers of the sea" are holding or in what actions they have participated. Such information is withheld for military reasons.

It is known, however, that the marines have been holding a front line trench sector for several weeks, having been moved up to the battle line after doing police duty along the American lines of communication since they first went to France with the vanguard of General Pershing's forces last summer.

Listed among the number wounded in action is the name of Odom P. Martin, which heads the list of corporals. This confirms the news received in Brady some weeks ago, when it was reported that Odom Martin had been slightly wounded in action in France.

McCULLOCH CO. WAR SAVINGS LAG FAR BEHIND

The Standard is in receipt of advice from Lewis Lipsitz state director of the War Savings committee, giving the following information regarding the sales of War Savings stamps in McCulloch county: Amount sold to April 17, 1918, \$24,855.24; Sales per capita, \$1.22; Agents secured to April 17, 1918, 60; War Savings societies, 13.

Compared with this, Mr. Lipsitz points out that McCulloch a quota of War Savings and Thrift stamps is \$405,960.00.

Mr. Lipsitz adds: "Three and one-half months of the year are gone and I am appealing to you to stir your people deeply with a strong editorial, urging them to invest and re-invest in War Savings and Thrift stamps."

"The Treasury department asks every county to buy \$20.00 per capita of War Savings stamps. Some individuals cannot do so—many can and should buy the maximum amount which is 1,000.00 worth, face value."

"We need your help to impress the importance of this work upon your readers. No state has a better right to lead all of the states of the Union than has Texas—no state is better able—the money is here in plenty. Our farmers particularly have profited enormously by war prices for their crops and cannot be excused on the ground of poverty."

The new food regulations were discussed and explained, and the many complex problems gone into. Besides E. A. Peden, Texas state food administrator, Mr. Holloway, U. S. deputy to Herbert Hoover and Mr. Cullen of the Flying Squadron, both of Washington were present; Mr. Eling, state administrator of New Mexico and Mr. Hicks, state administrator of Louisiana, were among the notables present and making addresses. Mr. Crothers states that not only has Herbert Hoover and his entire staff offered their services to the U. S. without one cent of remuneration, but Mr. Peden resigned a position paying him \$50,000 a year to devote his entire services to the nation during the period of the war, and many other state and district administrators have made patriotic sacrifices.

Mr. Crothers was delighted to be able to give in the report of McCulloch county, especially since it was above the average in county reports.

The crowning moment of the meeting was when a cable received from Gen. Pershing, commander of the American Expeditionary forces in France was read, as follows: "Your message stating Texas is on wheatless basis received just before Americans charged, and it added pep to the charge to know that the greatest and best state in the Union is behind us. We love Texas."

INSTRUCTIONS ISSUED ON NEW SUGAR RULING

In complete explanation of the new regulations requiring purchasers of sugar for canning and preserving purposes to sign pledges with each purchase made and instructing retail grocers to keep a record of all such sales, turning it in monthly to the Food Administration, the following letter has been sent to all wholesale grocers.

"It is now time to issue instructions to the merchants as to how they are to supply the sugar demand for canning and preserving purposes.

"You will find instructions to the merchant on a separate sheet, and you will note that he is to keep a complete record of sugar sold for preserving purposes, and at the end of each month he is to make a certified copy of the record, using the certificate as shown on the inclosed sheet. This record is to be sent immediately to the Food Administrator in which county the retailer is located, and should be in his hands not later than the 4th of each month.

Records to Be Kept.
 "We are inclosing herewith a copy as to how this record should be kept, and we are going to ask that you furnish your salesmen with copies similar to this and have them give to your customers throughout the city and county. Have the salesmen instruct the customers as to how these records should be kept in regard to the use of sugar for preserving purposes, as outlined in this copy, so there will be no necessity for the Administration cutting off from any retailer his supplies.

"The merchant should not be allowed to take future orders for sugar and should not fill back orders. Sales should only be made out of stock on hand.

"In connection with the order issued by the Food Administrator to the retail grocers to furnish the individual customers sugar for preserving purposes, we wish to impress upon the housewives that, from reports that we are getting, there is going to be an abundant fruit crop, and we desire that they take advantage of this crop by canning and preserving their supplies for the year to come. At the same time we wish to convey to them the fact that our Government is anxious that not one pound of sugar be wasted, so in making their orders to the grocers, we request them not to overorder for their own immediate wants."

Forms to Be Signed.
 Following is the form to be signed by the consumer, and also the form for the monthly report to be made to the District Food Administrator by each merchant:

To the County Food Administrator, _____ County, _____ Texas.

I have this day received from _____ the number of pounds of sugar signed for, which I will need for the purpose of preserving fruits and vegetables. Should I fail to use the sugar for the above stated purpose within the next twenty days, I agree to return any amount not used at the end of that time.

GEN. JOHN W. PERSHING
NOTIFIED OF TEXAS BEING ON A WHEATLESS BASIS

Houston, Texas, April 28.—Commending the action of Texas in adopting a period of forty-five wheatless days beginning April 15 and terminating June 1. John W. Hallowell, first assistant to Herbert Hoover has written the following letter to Administrator Peden for Texas:

"Mr. Hoover wishes me to inform you that the following cable has been sent to Gen. John J. Pershing: 'Entire State Texas will consume no wheat until June first as a contribution toward winning the war.'"

"E. A. PEDEN, State Food Administrator.

"We all felt that the patriotic action of your state in abstaining from the use of wheat until next June should be called in your name.

"Needless to say, cheering news of this nature will be tremendously appreciated by the American forces under General Pershing. If Texas had not been so well organized for this war emergency such news would have been impossible to send abroad at this critical moment. Therefore, the unanimous opinion here is that Texas is to be doubly congratulated."

Commenting upon the letter, Mr. Peden said: "Hope very much that the cablegram reached Gen. Pershing before the terrific onslaught made upon the American front by the Germans—because any news from home that the American people are with the boys heart, body and soul—would strengthen the resolve to win; and make invincible the morale."

WORK FOR THE JR. RED CROSS AUXILIARIES

The Standard has been furnished with the following information regarding the articles most needed by the Junior Red Cross auxiliaries. One of the most useful is the Comfort kit. It has been found that the most satisfactory kit is a plain bag of inexpensive khaki-color twill, 12 inches by 8 inches when finished, and having an inch hem at the top, thru which is run a strong cord for a draw-string. The sewing materials furnished with the kit are attached to a hemmed strip of cotton flannel 12x4, called a "housewife," which is rolled and dropped into the bag with the other articles.

Very large numbers of these kits are wanted immediately.

The "housewife" should contain:
5 sharp needles,
2 darning needles,
6 safety pins (about 2 in. long),
6 safety pins (about 1 in. long),
2 blanket pins,
12 khaki buttons,
6 white buttons,
Strong khaki thread, carded,
Strong white linen thread, carded,
Hooks and eyes.

It is also recommended that the bag also contain:

A jack-knife (with corkscrew, can-opener, leather punch and combination screwdriver and bottle-opener included.)
A small carborundum stone (about 3x1 1/4 inch.)
Shaving soap,
Toothbrush,
Small comb with case,
Small mirror (not more than 2x2 1/2 inches).

Tobacco, pipe, cigarette papers.
A safety razor may also be included, but in no case should there be anything perishable, such as chocolate.

Refugee Garments.

Some people have questioned the propriety of putting the work for the refugees on the same footing as the work for our own men. When, however, we take into consideration the debt which we owe to the Belgians, it seems that we are granted a special privilege in caring for them.

Pinafores for the children are needed in considerable quantities (these are worn by both boys and girls), housegowns, chemises, petticoats, skirts and morning blouses for the women, dresses for the little girls, shirts and brown corduroy trousers for the boys of all ages, and blouse suits for the smaller boys. The capes come in three sizes—small, medium and large—and it is the medium size which is most wanted.

Pockets are not included in dress patterns, but may be added.

All chairmen of Junior Red Cross auxiliaries leaving their schools at close, are urged to appoint some one in their place and let the work continue.

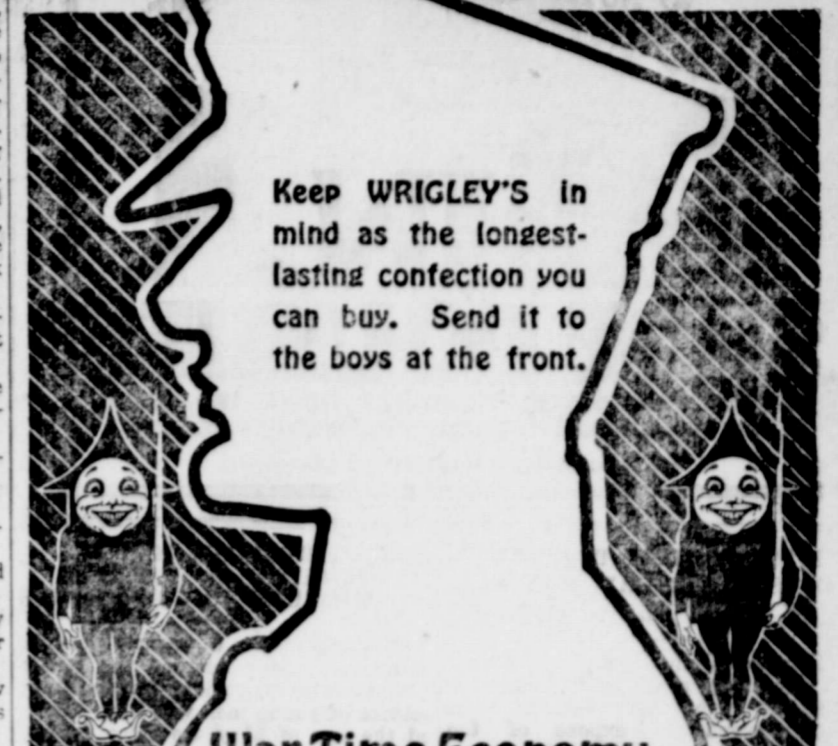

ANOTHER BIG RIG ARRIVES FOR ROCHELLE WELL

Much speculation in oil circles was occasioned Tuesday by the arrival here of W. L. Stewart and W. W. Orcutt of Los Angeles, Calif. Mr. Stewart is president of the Union Oil Co., of California, and Mr. Orcutt is head of the geological department of the same company. Both were non-committal, however, and gave out nothing for publicity other than they were making a casual survey of the territory in this section of Texas. They spent several days visiting various parts of the county and Mr. Orcutt vouchsafed the information, following these visits, that the structural indications in McCulloch county were far better than he had hoped to see and that he was very favorably impressed. Messrs. Stewart and Orcutt in company with other oil men left yesterday for a survey of the Brown county fields.

Another standard rig has arrived at Rochelle and is being placed on the Baker ranch, three miles north-east of Rochelle, where the Great Eastern Oil Co. has a contract for drill. Riggers are on the ground and the machine will be set up and gotten in shape to begin drilling within a week or so. The Southwestern Petroleum Co., Wednesday had reached a depth of 965 feet in their well. They have struck numerous flows of water, but are continuing drilling uninterrupted. A car of fuel oil has been unloaded by them and another car is on the track and will be stored, thus assuring continued and uninterrupted drilling in future. The Lucky Duck Oil Co., is completing arrangements for drilling on the Dick Sellman ranch and is at present awaiting arrival of its rig.

The rig for the Hall & Dutton tract is expected to arrive the early part of next week. A wife from Jeff Meers at Tulsa to his brother, Hub Meers, read: "Standard rig for Hall & Dutton well loaded. Expect it to be in Brady first to middle of next week." Mr. Meers returned from Tulsa Tuesday evening and reported that delay in loading the rig out for Brady had been occasioned by the bringing in of a well there. However, the riggers had dismantled the rig and had loaded it on coal cars, flat cars being unavailable, at the time of his leaving there. It is fully anticipated that this rig will be erected and in operation by next Monday week.

C. S. Thomas returned Monday from Houston where he had been gathering material for his well on the Comfort ranch. Mr. Thomas is getting his equipment assembled and preparations for drilling completed with dispatch that leaves no room for doubt as to his intentions. The rig timbers, boiler, casing and other material have already been placed on the ground, the six-room boarding and bunk house is completed and everything has been moving along as fast as general conditions and transportation facilities could warrant. Three cars' worth of material have already arrived and have been unloaded with all possible speed, no demurrage being paid on any of the cars. Much favorable comment has been made by those who have visited the scene by the fact that all the material is new and of the very best, and also by the splendid shape in which it has been delivered on the ground. Mr. Thomas freely gives credit to J. W. Batey of this city for the careful and skillful handling of the material, and the placing without so much as a scratch marring it. Mr. Thomas expects arrival of his head drifter within a week, and operations should be in progress within a very short while. Mr. Thomas has also signed a drilling contract with Meers Bros. and Lee Vaughn on a tract in the Salt Gap community. Title to this property is being examined this week, and if it proves up all right, drilling will be commenced as soon as equipment can be received.

On the Henry Miller place at Calf Creek operations were suspended last week awaiting repairs, but were resumed this week a depth of something over 100 feet has been reached. B. Furr, who is drilling a 200 foot water well on Miss Clara Wilhelm's place in the Calf Creek community last week found good indications of oil in the slush. The well was then at a depth of 112 feet, and stood 50 feet in water.

Oil men continue to scout over the county in numbers securing leases. Chief of interest in leasing last week was that of 317 acres from C. M. Bell, lying about ten miles north of Brady on the Brownwood road, which were secured by Edward M. Wheeler for \$1,600—or over \$5.00 per acre. Mr. Wheeler recently acquired the J. E. Bell tract, adjoining, paying \$23,500 or \$5.00 an acre for the same.



J. K. Blount Dead.

J. K. Blount, ex-Confederate veteran and an old-time citizen, answered the last call Saturday night at 9:30 o'clock, after a brief illness following a stroke of paralysis. He was 86 years old the 4th of last October.

Funeral services were held from the family residence in South Brady Sunday afternoon at 5:00 o'clock, Rev. J. H. Taylor conducting, and interment was made in Brady cemetery.

Mr. Blount saw active service in Arkansas and Louisiana in the war between the states, having been a member of the 33rd Texas cavalry, Trans-Mississippi department of the Confederate army.

He was born in Mississippi, being one of a family of six boys and six girls. The family came to Texas in 1843, locating in Caldwell county. Mr. Blount later located here and for a number of years had been a highly respected citizen of McCulloch county. He was a member in good standing of Ben McCulloch camp No. 563 since September 9, 1909, and that order attended the funeral services in a body to pay last respects to their companion.
