

MYSTERY OF DECOMPOSED CORPSE, RECOVERED NEAR WALD-RIP, SOLVED BY BALLINGER AUTHORITIES.

The swollen and partly decomposed body of an unknown man was recovered late Tuesday evening from the Colorado river at the Chaffin crossing below Waldrip. Sheriff Wall was summoned to Waldrip at 8:30 o'clock that evening. Deputy Ed Lindeman and Judge T. J. King accompanying him, the latter holding an inquest over the body, which was then carried to the top of the bank, and buried. Wednesday, Sheriff Wall got into communication with the authorities at Ballinger and established the identity of the man as that of a Mexican deserter, who was drowned while being carried by a Ballinger officer to Camp Bowie at Fort Worth. 



ALF. H. O'CONNOR FEATURE ATTRACTION OF CHAUTAUQUA SPEAKS TO LARGE CROWD

Probably no one worked harder for the success of the Brady chautauqua the past week than did the ladies of the ticket selling committee, includ-ing members of the Tuesday club, assisted by Miss Elizabeth Hancock of Kansas City, representing the White & Myers Chautauqua system, and by Messrs. Paul Calvert and N. T. Cook They were indefatigable in their efforts and not only went "over the top" Saturday in the sale of tickets covering the required guarantee, but went over sufficiently to guarantee all incidental expenses as well. Consequently they were entitled to suc-cess—and had the Fates not interfered they would have succeeded far beyond their fondest expectations.

However, an unkindly Fate deprived them of the first three numbers of the program, by reason of wash-outs and muddy roads which prevented the company's reaching Brady according to schedule. The program was to have been opened Sunday by Boileau's Quaker girls, and the tab-ernacle was filled to capacity by a crowd who eagerly awaited their coming. As time dragged on, however, no word of the wanderers was had, and Platform Manager Pearson filled in an uncomfortable wait very nicely with his crayon sketches, being assisted by a music program led by Miss Nettie Bellamy, with Mrs. J. S. Anderson playing the accompaniment. Finally word was had from the company that they had been unable to make an overland drive necessary to make train connections, and in an attempt to come by way of Dublin over the Texas Central, they had been caught in a wreck. Consequently they were obliged to cancel their en-Tuesday night, however, the chau-

tauqua was opened by Miss Elma Smith, mimic, and Alfred H. O'Connor, survivor of the Somme. To the credit of these performers be it said that in filling their engagement they overcame obstacles and successfully met difficulties that must have reminded O'Connor of his trials in the trenches. They reached Brownwood on the Frisco afternoon train to that city, expecting to arrive in Brady by automobile in ample time for the evening performance. Finding the roads impassable, they were obliged to return to Brownwood, and after endeavoring to secure permission from Fort Worth for the use of a gasoline track car, they finally started their journey to Brady at 7:30 p. m., via this route, and at 11:00 o'clock they chugged wearily into Brady. In the meantime an audience that filled the tabernacle almost to overflowing waited patiently for three hours upon their coming, being cheered from time to time by news of the wanderers. When Miss Smith and Mr. O'Connor finally appeared, however, it was just in the nick of time to prevent a wholesale exodus from the tablernacle. True, some had already gone, but those who remained were rewarded by one of the most remarkable programs ever heard in Brady.

WAR SAVINGS STAMP DRIVE DECIDED UPON

Every Taxpayer and Wage-Earner Summoned to Make Pledge On June 28th.

With the third Liberty loan successfully floated and Texas clambering over the top in the \$100,000,000 national Red Cross drive, special instructions have been issued by William G. McAdoo, Secretary of the United States Treasury, to begin throughout the United States an intensive drive on the sale of war savings stamps. Every taxpayer and wage earner in the country will be authoritatively summoned to appear at a designated place in his community June 28th and pledge to the Government the maximum amount he will save and invest in war savings stamps by Dec. 31.

Announcement of this order was made yesterday by Louis Lipsitz, State director of the National War Savings committee, and every war savings chairman in all of the Texas counties has been instructed to hold pledge meetings June 28 in every school district in his respective sub-

division, Mr. Lipsitz declared. "Some time next week a presidential proclamation, setting aside June 28 as national war savings day and summoning every citizens to make to the amount of money he will save and invest in war savings stamps, will be issued from the White House," Mr. Lipsitz explained. "A similar proclamation calling this proclamation to wage earners will be issued at Austin by Governor W. P. Hobby. towns and cities of Texas will also issue an official notice."

BRADY CREEK OFFERS BEST SOLUTION FOR AN INCREASED WATER SUPPLY-ADVICES MAKING ADDITIONAL SURVEYS

The written report of Frank Mer ritt, Santa Fe engineer, to the Brady city council upon his conclusions as to the best solution of Brady's water problem, is reproduced herewith. Mr. Merritt strongly recommends a 12 foot extension of the present dam, which, according to his figures McKavett it indicates the supply will give us an abundant supply of water for even a population of 10,000 and in the face of a drouth equally severe to the one through which we have passed the past year or more.
