INFORMATION FOR VOTERS IN THE PRIMARY SATURDAY

County Democratic Chairman J. E. Shropshire has announced the following information of interest to voters and election officials in Saturday's primary:

Saturday, July 27th, is the day.

Vote early. Vote before noon if possible, so that the report can be sent in early and so the clerks will not have to work late.

The latest information from the attorney-general is that "women should be permitted to vote whether registered or not, if their homes are outside of cities of 10,000 population or more."

Women voters, as well as men, may assist in holding the election. Phone in the returns at once after the count has been completed. Just tell the telephone operator you have election returns for Brady, and the proper connection will be made.

A voter must have lived in the state a year and in the county six months next preceding the election day.

Election officers may assist a voter who is blind or otherwise physically unable to make out said ballot but must not assist a voter simply because said voter cannot read or write.

Voters must not carry to the polls any data to refer to in making out a ballot.

Let the judges stamp "Woman" on every ticket voted by a woman, and "Woman Unregistered" on every ticket voted by a woman who has not registered.

Take every precaution so that we can easily verify our vote in case of a contest.

Women voters should bring their registration receipts to the polls; others should be prepared to make affidavit as to their qualifications at the voting places.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO ASSIST SCHOOLS SAYS SUPERVISOR WHITE

E. L. White, rural school supervisor, representing the Department of Education, has been in this section the past several days, and while in Brady enjoyed greeting his many friends here. Mr. White is conferring with the county superintendents and school trustees with reference to the continuation of the schools in the drouth-stricken area, for the full term during the coming year. The Department of Education is very anxious that nothing be allowed to interfere with the carrying on of the schools as usual, and wherever necessary is extending aid and assistance

to the schools. It is Mr. White's duty to inquire into the status of the various schools, and to recommend aid wherever it may be found necessary. Needless to say his work is both vital and important, and future generations will rise up to praise the foresight and wisdom of the department in planning and carrying out this work.

Mr. White states that he has twenty-five counties on his itinerary, and that it will take him until about the 1st of September to finish his work. So far he has visited some ten of the counties. All his many friends were glad to see him here once more, and are pleased to know that he is engaged in such useful and beneficial work.

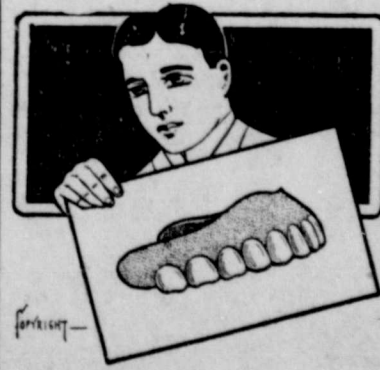

BIG NEWS NOW DEVELOPING IN OIL CIRCLES

While everything appears quiet on the surface, there is an undercurrent in local oil circles that presages big developments in the immediate future. The Standard has information from a reliable source that some big oil men are now completing arrangements for taking over certain leases, and upon consummation of the transaction will ship a big rig here for development of an entirely new territory. No one appears to have information as to where the rig will be placed, and all are eagerly anticipating news of the new contract. It is stated that the information will be ready for publication within a week or such a matter.

The Bowen-Day well on the Hall-DuFon ranch is shut down temporarily because of having jumped a pin. The lost bit was readily recovered and is now undergoing repairs. It is thought operations will be resumed the end of this week or the first of next.

The Thomas well on the Comfort ranch at Whiteland also had the misfortune of a breakdown last week, but is going good again.

G. W. Cooper, who has had a big Star rig here the past three weeks, has so far made no effort to place the rig. Just what the nature of the delay may be cannot be ascertained, but it is thought upon Mr. Cooper's return from Kansas City, the rig will be carried out to Lohn and work on

the well on the Roberts-Shelton tract will be begun without delay.

From Mercury and Milburn reports indicate steady progress, with no developments of other than customary nature.

C. M. Meadows of Kansas City, Mo., has been here this week and is quite interested in developments in the local oil territory. Mr. Meadows holds the lease on the Mathew Capps tract of land north of Brady on the Brownwood road.
