### LEON MCFERRIN DIES IN FRANCE OF PNEUMONIA

Brady has been called upon to make another sacrifice in the great war for humanity, Leon McFerrin having answered the last roll call on October 4th, death having resulted from an attack of acute influenza and pneumonia.

The news came in the form of a telegram from the Adjutant General in Washington, D. C., to Mrs. Oscar Strickland sister of the deceased. The message was received at 4:45

o'clock last Thursday afternoon. The sad news was a great shock to friends, and more especially to his sister, who had received two cheerful letters from him only the week before.

A letter received Saturday by Mrs. Strickland from a chaplain in France told of his death and burial at Mehan with full military honors.

Leon McFerrin was 24 years old. He was born and raised in Tennessee, and had lived in Coleman county before coming to Brady two years ago, since when he had been in the employ of the Radford Grocery Co. He was an excellent young man, with a splendid physique and buoyant health, and his good nature and cheerful disposition made him a favorite with all.

McFerrin was in the draft of June 25th, being entrained for Camp Travis, and after being in training there for some time, was transferred to Camp Hancock at Augusta, Ga. He had been in France only a few weeks.

The last two letters written by McFerrin were dated September 17th and 21st. In them he stated that the ordnance company, of which he was a member, had been to various points in Scotland and England, and had also been within five miles of Paris, and that he planned to go to Paris before long. He stated further that the boys who hadn't gone over the waters, or who would not get to go across, could not realize the treat they were missing.

Besides Mrs. Strickland, another sister, Mrs. Willie Young, and a brother, Harry McFerrin, both of Coleman, survive.

It is with sorrow that Brady places another gold star in her service flag, but her citizens will ever keep its lustre bright and the memory green for Leon McFerrin, who died a hero's death in France, for us.

### BRADY MAKES RECORD SHIPMENT OF SEEDS AND SHELLS FOR SOLDIERS' GAS MASKS

The McCulloch County Red Cross chapter may truthfully boast of having made a record shipment of seeds and shells for soldiers' gas masks, and from reports so far at hand, the record is the best in the state of Texas for a town of this size. A dispatch from San Angelo recently boasted that that place had shipped "more seeds and shells than any place in the State of Texas," and gave 2600 pounds as their total.

Brady's first shipment, made about a week after the collection began, totaled 2,860 pounds, and another shipment of 1,000 pounds is now ready for forwarding.

### THOMAS' SALT GAP WELL LOCATED S. E. COR. SURV. 1351

Location of the C. S. Thomas Salt Gap well is announced as in the south east corner of the C. Usner survey, No. 1351, the exact spot being 200 ft. west and 200 ft. north from the southeast corner of the Craig lease. The location is in McCulloch county, and about 4 1/2 miles north and 1 mile west from the town of Melvin.

Mr. Thomas has already placed the order for the rig, and the machinery and tools will be assembled as rapidly as possible.

### Salt Gap Leases in Demand.

The letting of the contract has occasioned a great demand for leases in the Salt Gap community, and fancy prices are being paid for choice tracts.

### Day Ships Casing for Hall-Dutton.

A wire received by Jeff Meers yesterday morning from Thad O. Day at Tulsa, Okla., stated a car of casing for the Hall-Dutton well had left there yesterday morning. Mr. Day will spend the week in Kansas City looking after business affairs, but will leave there Sunday for Brady, by which time the casing is expected to arrive in Brady, and will take immediate charge of operations at the well.

The difficulties which have been delaying work on the well have been adjusted, and the company re-organized with Mr. Day in charge of operations on the Hall-Dutton well. It is currently reported that one of the biggest oil companies in the state is behind the new organization and that no effort or expense will be spared towards making this one of the most thorough tests in the county.

The well is standing at 726 feet in good condition, and will be under-reamed and cased before drilling proceeds.

### Shallow Well No. 2 Comes In Good.

The Tucker Oil Co. Monday brought in its shallow well No. 2 at a little over 200 feet. The well is said to be better than the first, and is making ten barrels per day, without having been shot. The company will shoot the well and have it cleaned out before testing the production further.

Shallow well No. 1 is still holding up with a production of from 25 to 30 barrels daily.

The J. E. Morgan shallow well two miles north of Brady is down something less than 100 feet. The entire crew was down the past week with influenza, which delayed progress of drilling.

The Prairie Oil & Gas Co., which spudded in last Thursday on the Zelle tract, has been making rapid progress and last Monday was already down over 100 feet.

No reports of interest other than usual progress have been had from the other wells in the county.

### NOTED CANADIAN TO MAKE ADDRESS 3:00 P. M. TODAY

Adjutant General Starbord of Canada, who spent two and a half years on the battle-front in France, will be in Brady this (Friday) afternoon to address the citizens on the war, and the great work being done by the seven great relief organizations in the battle zone. The object of General Starbord's visit is to arouse interest in the United War Work campaign, and as he has been an eye-witness to many of the heroic deeds performed, his address will prove of exceptional interest. As a matter of fact, he is said to be the most interesting speaker in the campaign.

The address will be given at an open-air meeting to be held at the court house, the weather permitting, and all stores and business houses in Brady will close upon the occasion. Every citizen is invited to attend and hear this notable address.

### NEED FOR UNITED WAR WORK FUND OF \$250,000,000

The United War Work campaign to be conducted November 11th to 18th will have for its object the raising of a fund of \$250,000,000 instead of the \$170,500,000 fund at first planned. This increase of nearly fifty per cent in the total was made at the request of President Wilson, who saw the urgent need of funds to carry on the work of the seven organizations participating in this campaign for funds. No new apportionment has been given out, but the great increase is to be met by having each community oversubscribe its original apportionment at least 50%.

Porter Whaley of Brownwood, district campaign manager, will be here Friday with a complete staff of organizers, and all precinct chairmen are requested by these district organizers to be present and confer with them on the plan of carrying out a successful campaign.

County Chairman C. H. Vincent is in receipt of advice that the first ten states going over the top will have their names put on ten portable huts which will move with our troops into Berlin. Of course Texas wants her name on one of these huts, and so every effort will be made to put Texas' quota over the first few days of the campaign.

A point of interest that should be emphasized is that any contributor may designate, if he wishes, to which organization he wants his contribution to go, but should he not make any such designation, then in that event the sum will be pro-rated among the seven organizations participating.

Let no one get the idea that this fund is not needed since peace is apparently close at hand. There will be greater work than ever for these organizations to do. It will possibly be two years after peace is declared before demobilization is effected, and in the meantime these organizations will continue to bring the home influences to our boys, and will lend their efforts towards maintaining the morale of the army.

Committees have this week visited various parts of the county to help get the campaign workers organized, and the interest aroused in this great work is manifested by the fact that practically every citizen is alive to the necessity of putting McCulloch county's quota over. Brady merchants have evinced their interest by subscribing to a liberal advertising fund and will follow this up by contributing liberally towards the campaign fund.

### WATER SPOUT IN COLEMAN COUNTY WORST IN YEARS

What is reported as the worst flood ever had in Coleman visited that city yesterday morning, when a waterspout broke over the town and for three hours the water fell in a perfect deluge, flooding the streets and homes.

It was learned over the phone yesterday morning that Coleman citizens waded in water up to their waists to rescue neighbors imprisoned in their homes by the flood waters.

Although the clouds have been threatening the past several days, McCulloch county missed the downpour almost entirely. Rain was reported yesterday all the way from Mercury to Fort Worth; Eden reported an inch and a half of rain, and rain was also had between Lost Creek and Voca, Lost Creek coming down on a four foot rise.

McCulloch county finally came in for her share of the rain, a slow, steady downpour beginning at 2:30 yesterday afternoon, which promises a thorough drenching.

### OIL FLOWS OVER DER-RICK IN RUSSELL WELL—NOW AT 2,505 FEET.

Ballinger, Texas, Nov. 1.—With the drill hanging in the well to a depth of 100 feet, oil gushed out around it and shot over the top of the derrick at the Russell well near this city again yesterday. Intermittent gushing has kept up when the drill was pulled from the well for the past several days, but the flow yesterday was the greatest at any time since oil was struck at a depth of 1,975 feet. The well is now 2,505 feet and drilling continues in black lime rock. With the strong gas increase the drillers are confident of a strong oil well when they strike sand.

### CORPORAL HENRY KING ASSISTS IN TRANSPORTING CAPTURED GERMAN AMMUNITION

In an interesting letter to home folks, Corporal Henry King, who is with the ordnance department of the First American Expeditionary force, tells of some of his experiences. The most interesting part of the letter, probably, mentions his department as having charge of the transporting of some German ammunition and cannon that had been captured. There was 100 carloads of the booty, and one case of ammunition that had evidently never been opened, was dated 1906, while other cases looked like they might be 50 years old. The whole readily verified the fact that Germany had been preparing for the war for many, many years. Henry stated that they were confident if the war did not close before Christmas, then it would surely be wound up next Spring.

### ADOLPH BAUMANN VICTIM HUNTING ACCIDENT SUNDAY

Adolph Baumann, son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Baumann of the Voca community, was shot and fatally wounded Saturday, while hunting with his brother, his death occurring at Brady sanitarium Sunday morning at 9:30 o'clock. The shot that caused his death was from a 30-30 rifle in the hands of the victim's older brother, Boss Baumann. Deceased was 18 years, 7 months and 21 days old.

The dead youth lived with his parents in the Voca community on the place purchased by them something like two years ago from John and Otto Armor. His brother lives in Llano county. The two started out on a hunting trip, going to the mouth of Brady creek on the Gibbons ranch in San Saba county. They separated to look for game, and while Adolph was crouching in some bushes, his brother mistook him for a deer and fired full into him, the bullet entering the small of the back, piercing the descending colon, and emerging thru the abdomen. The injured man was brought to Brady with all possible speed, and taken to the local sanitarium, where he lingered until death relieved his sufferings the following morning.

The body was buried at Cold Creek Sunday evening.

# BRADY FLOODED BY CREEK RISE

**Water Is Backed Across Square to South Side Running Like Mill Race in Streets.**

Brady creek early this morning came down on the biggest rise in history and the Brady square was entirely covered with a swirling mass of water. The rise was estimated at 25 feet, its crest being reached at 4:30 this a. m. when it lacked but half an inch of flooding the Brady Water & Light Works and putting the plant out of commission.

By actual measure the creek rose 1 ft. and 1 inch higher than during the big flood of 1909.

The water in front of Brady Auto Co. reached a depth of about 3 ft. and the garage was 2 ft. under water, and passage to the north side was cut off by a 6 ft. wall of water.

At 4:00 o'clock yesterday afternoon Melvin phoned that the creek was on a 15 ft. rise and local officers warned all folks out of the creek bottoms. A few families were marooned by the high water, but at no time were they in danger.

The big rise resulted from tremendous rains had in the Eden section, and other points report like big rains. An 8-inch rain is reported at Loyal Valley, and in the Waldrip community the rain is reported at between 6 and 10 inches. One family including four children, was marooned last night in the tree tops on Saddle Creek, rescue being impossible.

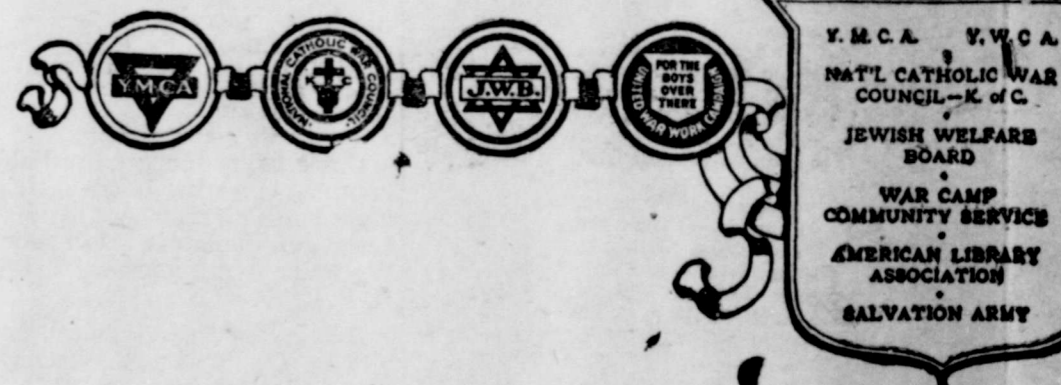
—nights when the boys greet joyously the chocolate and cigarettes that our money provided; and are happier because *our* representative has passed.

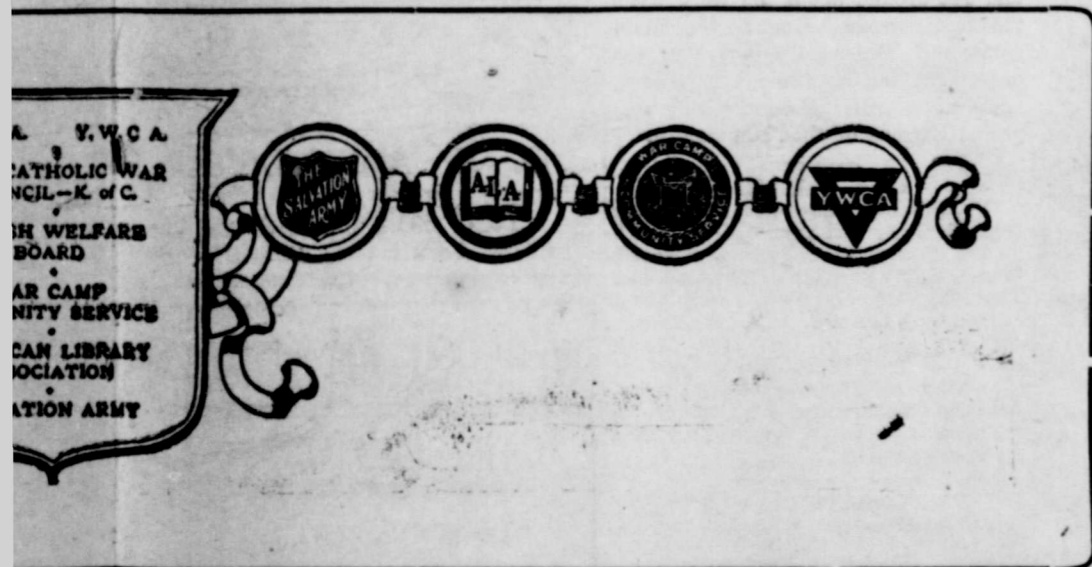

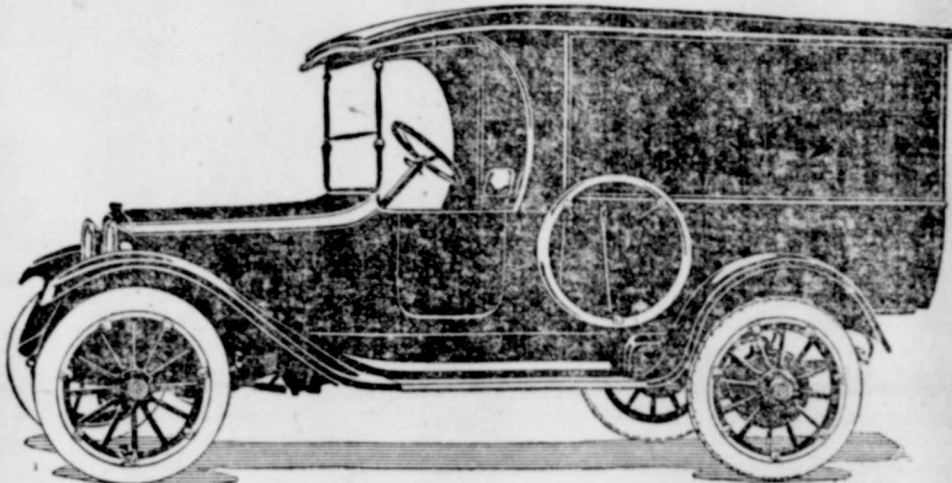

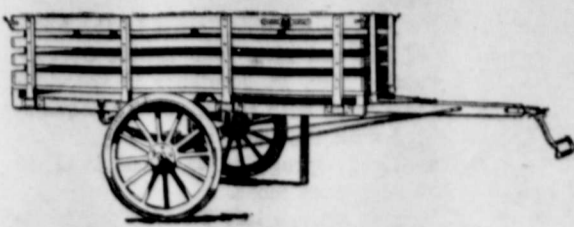
