She has studied ballet since before she started to public school, and following a year at West Texas State University, where she had a drama scholarship, Laura has taken time out from her formal education to study with the Dallas Ballet Company.

Miss Ellis was a dancer in the "Texas" production in Palo Duro Canyon during the summer of 1979, and also had a role in "Stars Over Palo Duro." For the summer of 1980, she won a dancing role in Six Flags Over Texas' Southern Palace, starring as "Miss France" in the anniversary show.

There are a record 70 girls in the 1981 Miss Texas Scholarship Pageant.

Laura is the second Friona girl to make it to the Miss Texas Pageant. Kay Bureson Cash was the other entry. By coincidence, both started out as "Miss Friona Star" in Friona's Maize Queen contest.

## Chamber Holds Meeting July 1

Bovina's Chamber of Commerce members held their regular meeting at noon in the Bovina Restaurant on July 1.

Members present for the meeting were Suezey Smith, Bubby Marshall, Norma Whitten, Mac Glasscock, Billy J. Charles, Larry Scott, Steve Sherrill, Kenneth Gaunt, Tom Bonds, Scooter Russell, Dennis Willard, and one guest, Janet Wilke, Blade editor.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. Mr. Sherrill gave the treasurer's report and funds in the regular fund stood at \$546.07, and in the Banquet fund, the sum was \$381.13, and for the Bull Town Days fund, the total was \$367.47.

Sherrill indicated that he has contacted Jack Jackson to be the speaker for the Chamber Banquet, but Jackson indicated that it was still too early in the year to make such plans.

The members discussed the possibility of the McClarans moving from Bovina, and having to find a replacement for Monta McClaran. It was brought up by Steve Sherrill that Tommy Scaff would be the next person in line for Monta's directorship.

New business included a discussion on the Bull Town Days parade situation, and having the Chamber designate places in the parade for the contestants, therefore eliminating the

hassel and confusion prior to the kickoff of the parade. Mrs. Smith suggested that the out-of-town participants in the parade be furnished with a free meal, and her suggestion was passed as a motion by the other members of the Chamber.

It was decided that these people would be mailed their free meal tickets prior to Bull Town Days.

Sherrill made the motion that the Chamber allow \$100 for prize money for parade contestants. The motion carried.

Discussion was given as to how much meat should be purchased for the Bull Town Days barbecue, and members decided to make the amount less than last year's. The motion was also made and passed to purchase and cook 100 pounds of beans, which was about twice as much as was served last year at LTD.

Barbecue which is left over from LTD will be sold for \$3.50 per pound members decided, and the charge for the meal during LTD will remain at \$2.00 per plate. Charles said he was not sure of the status of the fruit which is to be served at the meal, but was still hoping to come up with something.

Steve Sherrill also indicated that the committee had not yet found a carnival for Bull Town Days.

Dennis Willard suggested that different organizations be responsible for the various booths at LTD, and after discussion by the members, they decided that each of the local organizations would be contacted in this regard and they could give their opinions on the situation.

Mac Glasscock said he would look into the organization of a talent show or some other means of entertainment for LTD.

It was reported that Jimmie Clements had donated a freezer. It will be picked up and used for LTD.

The meeting was then adjourned.

Three bids had been received by the court, two from Reeve Chevrolet-Olds and one from Friona Ford Sales, representing three makes of vehicles. After much discussion, the bid was awarded to Reeve Chevrolet-Olds for a trade difference of \$8,642.

A 1977 Chrysler four-door is the trade-in vehicle.

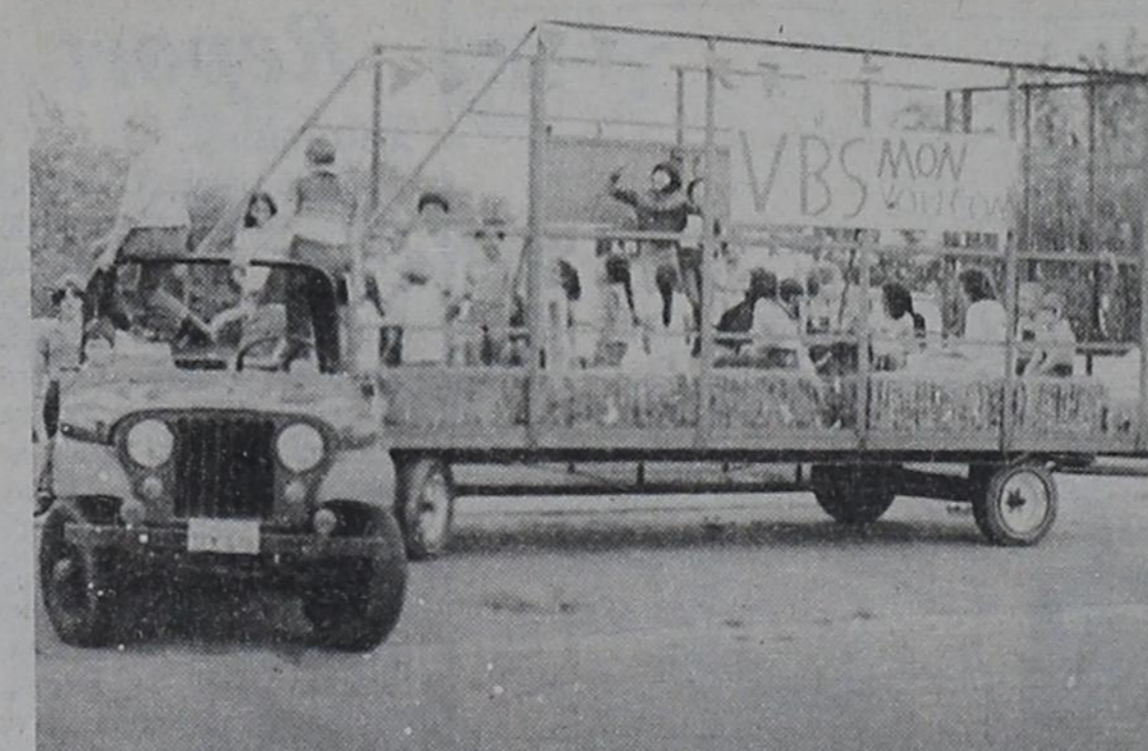

A court order was received to pay a court-appointed counsel. This bill, in the amount of \$160 to attorney Doyle Curtis, was approved.

Soil Conservation work by county equipment was approved for West Friona Grain. The work will be performed when the machinery is not needed on county roads, and billed to the company.

You probably will never have guilt feelings and most probably the dog never meant much to you, but he did have feelings and rights, just as any creature God puts here does.

But, you deprived him of a happy, healthy life. All it would have taken was a shot from the Vet. This would have saved a lot of suffering on your puppy's part.

But, he's gone now, and you don't have to worry with him anymore. You might think that putting a bullet in his brain was cruel, but what you failed to do was far more cruel.

Negligence is the worst abuse of all.

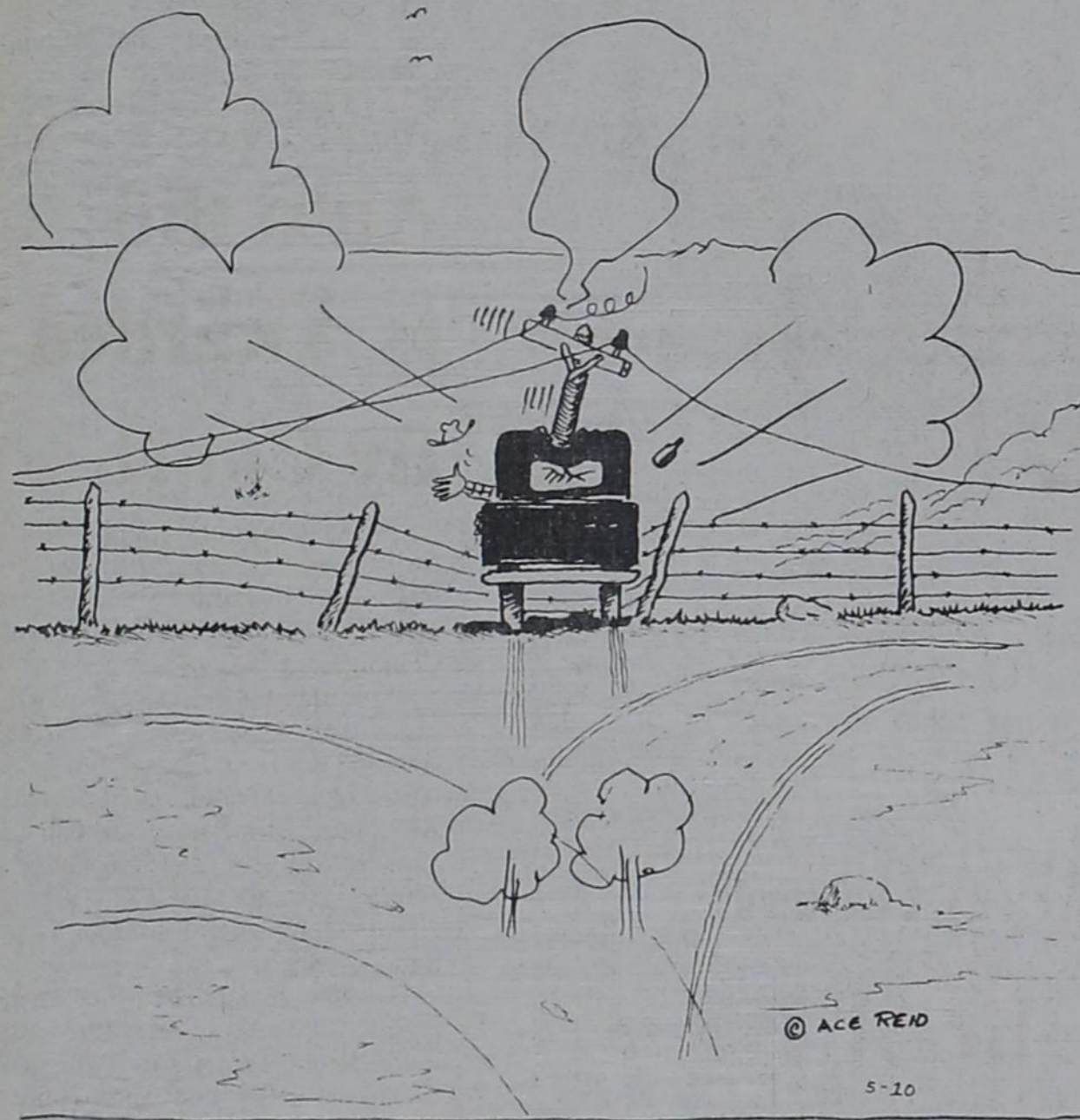

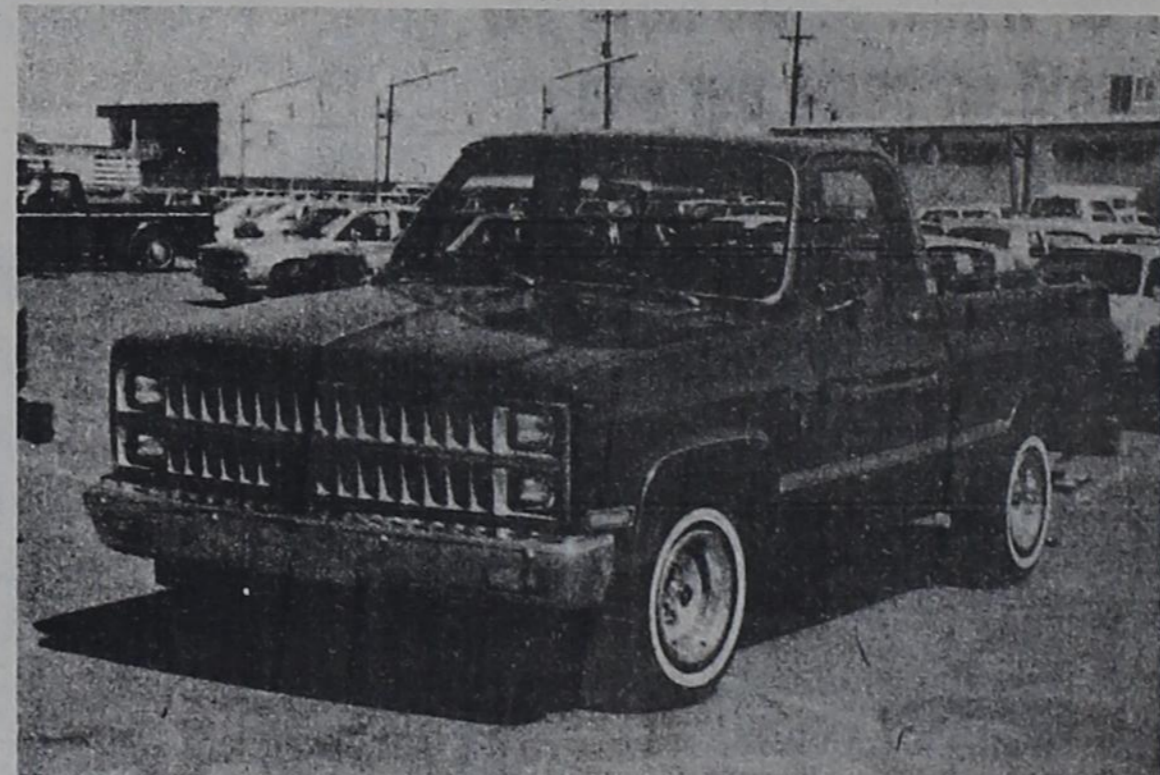

In "Reflections Of His Love," Miss Eareckson shares with us the great transformations that have taken place in her life because of her willingness to accept all of the things that happened to her.

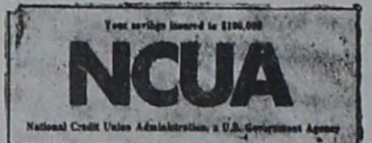
Throughout the film we will realize the trust and deep faith of this young woman as she struggles with the problems of life.

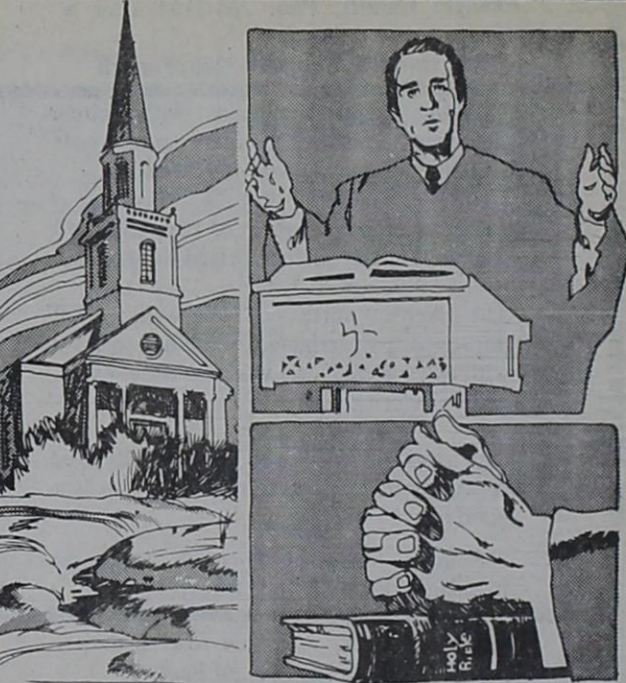

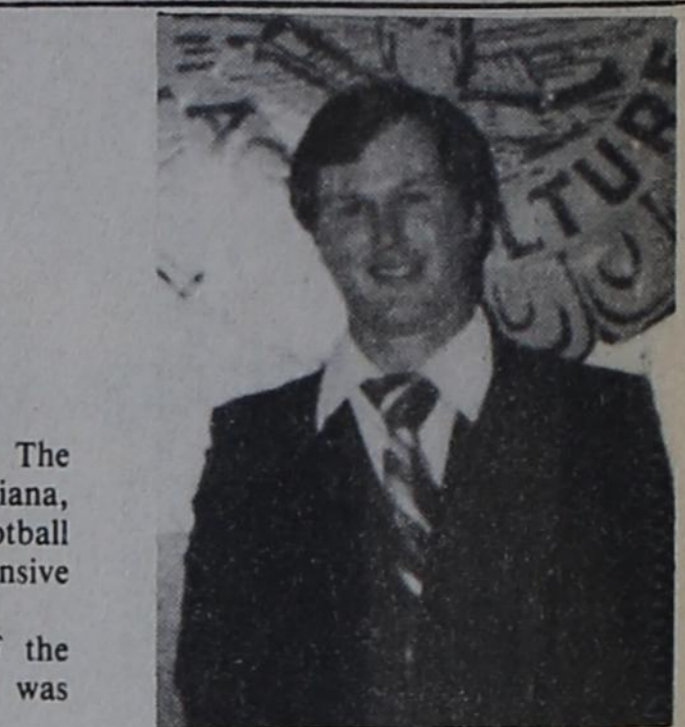

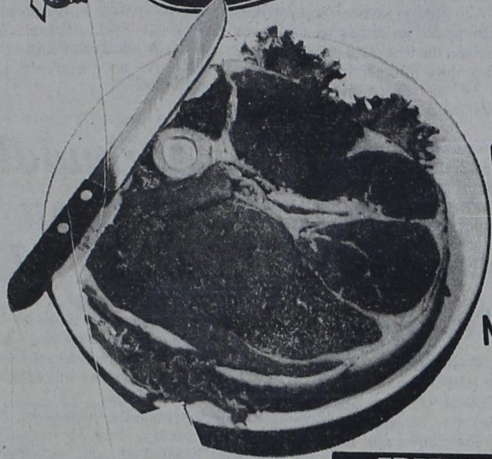
