



He passed all tests in the shops, being made master mechanic, and would have gone to France, as his unit, 390, sailed overseas on July 26th. However, he failed to pass the physical examination, and was sent to the hospital on the 21st of July. He was operated on on the 26th and again an the 27th of August, living until September 23rd. He was well known in Brady, having worked at the Brady Auto Co., and also at the Mann-Ricks Auto Co. He was also well known in San Saba, having married Miss Ruby Jones of that city. 
