Congressman Thos. L. Blanton has introduced in the House a bill providing for the local commemoration in each county of the supreme sacrifice made by each soldier, saile: matine and aviator who lost his life while in the services of the United States during the present war. Following is the text of the bill:

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, "That upon the citizens of any or every county in any of the United States raising a local fund to erect in the county seat of such county a fitting monument to the commemoration of each brave son who made thesupreme sacrifice, and making application therefor, the Secretary of the Treasury is directed to contribute to such fund by paying to the treasurer of said county a sum aggregating \$200 each for every soldier, sailor, marine, and aviator giving such county as his home when inducted into service who lost his life while in the service of the United States during the present war, such Government contribution to be added to such local fund and expended in erecting such monument.

"That where a cannon is desired by any county in furnishing a memorial park, upon application therefor, out of any cannon not needed by the Government, furnished by either the Secretary of War or the Secretary of the Navy, the Secretary of the Treas- 40 Gallon. Just the thing to ury shall cause a cannon to be delivered at the railroad station nearest to the county seat of said county.

"That to carry out the provisions o fthis Act there is hereby appropriat- left. ed out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, the sum may be necessary to be administered by the Secretary of the Treasury.






