

### **SAVE 16,000,000 BUSHELS** OF WHEAT THAT FORMERLY WAS LOST IN THRESHING

Farmers, Urged by Food Administra. tion, Provide Seven Extra Loaves of Bread for Every American.

By adopting cleaner threshing methods and by literally combing harvest fields to gather grain formerly wasted, threshermen and farmers of the United States this year saved fully 16,000,000 bushels of wheat, estimated as equivalent to about seven one-pound loaves of bread for every person in the country. This result, accompanied by corresponding savings of barley, oats, rye and other grains, is shown by reports from 33 grain states to the U. S. Food Administration. Other states, although not prepared to furnish defi-

They reached time, was in direct response to requests by the Food Administration, which asked farmers and threshermen to reduce harvest losses from about 3¼ per cent.—the estimated average in normal times-to the lowest possible minimum. Country grain threshing committees carried into every grain growing community the official recommendations for accomplishing

In numerous instances drivers of racks with leaky bottoms were sent from the fields to repair their equipment and frequently bad order threshing machines were stopped until the cause of waste was removed. But in proportion to the number of persons engaged in gathering the nation's grain crop, cases of compulsion were comparatively rare. The Food Administration freely attributes the success of the grain threshing campaign to patriotic service by farmers, threshermen and their crews. Incidentally grain growers of the United States are many millions of dollars "in pocket" as a result of the grain saved.

Increase in All Respiratory Diseases After the Influenza Epidemic Probable.

ISSUES WARNING

U. S. HEALTH SERVICE

nfluenza Expected to Lurk for Months. How to Guard Against Pneumonia. Common Colds Highly Catching-Importance of Suitable Clothing-Could Save 100,000 Lives.

Washington, D. C .- With the subsidence of the epidemic of influenza the attention of health officers is directed to pneumonia, bronchitis and other diseases of the respiratory system which regularly cause a large number of deaths, especially during the winter season. According to Rupert Blue, Surgeon General of the United States Public Health Service, these diseases will be especially prevalent this winter unless the people are particularly careful to obey health instructions.

"The present epidemic," said Surgeon General Blue, "has taught by bitter experience how readily a condition beginning apparently as a slight cold may go on to pneumonia and death. Although the worst of the epidemic is over, there will continue to be a large number of scattered cases, many of them mild and unrecognized, which will be danger spots to be guarded against." The Surgeon General likened the present situation to that after a great fire, saying, "No fire chief who understands his business stops playing the hose on the charred debris as soon as the flames and visible fire have disappeared. On the contrary, he continues the water for hours and even days, for he knows that there is danger of the fire rekindling from smol-

"Then you fear another outbreak of influenza?" he was asked. "Not necessarily another large epidemic," said the Surgeon General, "but unless the people learn to realize the seriousness of the danger they will be compelled to pay a heavy death toll from pneumola and other respiratory diseases.

Common Colds Highly Catching.

U. S. Public Health Service Warns Public Against Tuberculosis. One Million Cases Tuberculosis in United States-Each a Source of Danger.

Influenza Convalescents Should Have Lungs Examined—Colds Which Hang On Often Beginning of Tuberculosis. No Cause for Alarm if Tuberculosis Is Recognized Early-Patent Medicines Not to Be Trusted.

Washington, D. C .- (Special.) -According to a report made to the United States Public Health Service, the epidemic of influenza in Spain has already caused an increase in the prevalence and deaths from pulmonary tuberculosis. A similar association between influenza and tuberculosis was recently made by Sir Arthur Newsholme, the chief medical officer of the English public health service, in his analysis of the tuberculosis death rate in England.

In order that the people of the United States may profit by the experience of other countries Surgeon General Rupert Blue of the United States Public Health Service has just issued a warning emphasizing the need of special precautions at the present time. "Experience seems to indicate," says the Surgeon General, "that persons whose resistance has been weakened by an attack of influenza are peculiar ly susceptible to tuberculosis. With millions of its people recently affected with influenza this country now offers conditions favoring the spread of tuberculosis."



Y. W. C. A. DOING SPECIAL WORK AMONG BOHEMIANS AND SPAN-IARDS TO HELP GOVERN-

MENT.

Two obstacles to efficient execu tion of the government's food conser vation plans bid fair to disappear as the work of the International Institute, the division of the Young Women's Christian Association devised to deal with problems of foreign-born women, extends its work.

San Antonio has been the center of this type of work in the Southwest, but recent trips of sections. leaders through Texas disclosed the fact that the number of women in Texas who speak Bohemian is exceeded only by the number speaking Spanish. Women of neither of these nationalities have hitherto co-operat ed thoroughly and understandingly with the food conservation program This has been due solely to the fact they have not understood the plans

Continuation of policies heretofore adopted promises acceptable translations, into the languages with which these women are familiar, of the food conservation program.

The other obstacle in the way of the food program, is the inflexibility of appetities. Foods must be some what like, in taste, those formerly used, or. in general, the foreign-born, foreign-language speaking women of Texas will avoid them. To this prob lem the Young Women's Christian sults now seem guaranteed.


