TRACTS WELL NO. 2 ON SURV. NO. 333

The third deep test contract in a week's time was announced the first of this week. In addition to the two deep tests contracted the past week by Messrs. Cunningham, Divine & Cooper, on the White ranches in the north part of the county, Geo. F. King this week announces having contracted for his well No. 2, which is to be drilled on the north center of Survey No. 333, known as the Dave Harkrider place. Mr. King and asociates hold a lease on 4,000 acres, which are embodied in this drilling tract, and which lie about 7 miles southwest of Brady, and in the Nine community. The tract includes the D. Harkrider, S. W. Espy and John Wall ranches. The contract calls for a 2500 ft. hole. Mr. King states that a standard rig has already been or-dered and he expects to begin drilling short of the 90 day contract per-iod. This new contract extends the McCulloch field of operations to the southwest part of the county.







Sacramento now has a population of from 65,000 to 70,000, and attributes her great growth from the time she awoke to the fact that she had poor hotels and poor roads and must make a change in both directions. Stockton, Cal., is a city of about 30,000, has had the same experience.

"Now we are not printing this either to knock Topeka or boost Sacramento, but to emphasize the oft-repeated statement that good, well-kept and prosperous hotels are a pretty fair index to a growing community.'

Folks like to go to a town that has good hotels, and the reverse is true also, that they do not like to go to a town that has poor hotels. And it takes folks, citizens and visitors to make a town.

Any kind of public improvements are infectious, and especially is this true of hotel building and good roads. -Hamilton Record.







the eleventh of September, we rolled all our equipments and personal belongings that we did not need and tagged them and placed them in a room where we were billeted. At 5 o'clock we went over the top' and started across No Man's land, which at the beginning of the war was a heavy forest, but the artillery fire that had been kept up for four years on both sides had not left a tree standing. The ground was cut with trenches and torn with shell until it would have been difficult to cross if there had been nothing else to hinder our advance. But there were vines, fallen tree tops, logs and the worst of all a net work of barbed wire entanglement we either had to climb through or cut, and we usually chose the former when possible. That was a beautiful picture to look on. Three or four times I stopped long enough to look back, my company being in the lead of the attack, I had a chance to see the ones in the rear that were supporting us. No Man's land was alive with Sammies, but yow could only see them as they leaped from one shell to another charging on the German position that they had been improving for four years. Cement dugouts 30 and 40 feet deep furnished like mansions. I had quite an experience that day. I did not know where our objective was and almost impossible to keep in contact with our company. I was ordered to take the lead of a combat group and before I had gone far there was only one man with me, the others having gotten lost in the shell holes and wire entanglements, but none killed or wounded. We kept going and pretty soon found ourselves twenty-five or thirty yards in front of our lines and between our company and the Germans and beyond our objective, with bullets playing 'Home Sweet Home' over our heads.
