# FOUR SHALLOW TESTS SPURRED IN THIS WEEK IN LOHN FIELD

### WEEKLY DRILLING REPORT—SHOWING OF OIL IN J. E. MORGAN WELL

Practically all wells drilling in McCulloch county are in full operation this week, both in the deep and the shallow fields, and good progress is noted. Especially noteworthy this week has been the number of new shallow wells spudded in, and it is evident that shallow production will soon be reached to justify the building of a pipe line and a refinery at Brady.

Among the new shallow wells spudded in this week are the following: Pope-Randerson Oil Co. spudded in the first of the week on H. Schmidt Survey No. 86. Both Messrs. Pope and Randerson have been here from Floydada the past couple weeks making arrangements for the drilling.

The Record Oil & Refining Co. is spudding in well No. 3 on Survey No. 99 this week, the location being about the center of the tract. Well No. 1 on the same tract is at less than 100 feet, and well No. 2 is at 384 feet. A carload of steel and material to be

used by this company was received here this week. The Record Company is also arranging to drill a 4,000 ft. deep test on the Sidney Webb ranch near Dryden, in Terrell county.

The Lohn Oil & Gas association of Sweetwater this week spudded in on Survey No. 1162.

Dr. J. A. Turner, J. C. Wickham, et al, received their rig this week and have spudded in on Survey 83.

Cobb & Lowry, who are drilling on the Northeast corner of Survey No. 1205, struck salt water at 315 feet, and are pulling their casing to straight ream, before resetting casing and continuing drilling.

W. O. Bucy is here from Greenville and reports his rig shipped out of Granbury this week for the Parks Winner Oil Co. He anticipates spudding in on the northeast corner of Survey 2576 early next week.

F. J. Brooks of Waco is completing arrangements for the drilling of a series of wells on Survey 102. Two

Star rigs have been shipped out from Oklahoma, and Mr. Brooks expects to have both in operation by next week, and will push drilling to early completion.

Report this week on the deep tests is as follows:

J. E. Morgan, drilling on State School survey No. 2, two miles north of Brady, had a showing of oil at 850 feet Saturday. The well is now drilling at about 875 feet.

Prairie Oil & Gas Co., hole full of salt water at 1800 feet. Setting 8 1/4 inch casing to shut off water, on Survey No. 90.

Texas Oil & Refining Co. on J. H. Gibson Survey No. 1, drilling resumed at 285 feet after several days' delay waiting for a carload of coal.

Texas Eastern Oil Co. on Survey 302, running tour at between 1100 and 1200 feet.

Douglas Oil Co., again making good

progress on Survey 1134, and drilling in gray lime at above 1200 feet.

C. S. Thomas No. 1 at Whiteland on Survey 1237, running tour at between 1600 and 1700 feet.

C. S. Thomas No. 1 on Survey 1351 at Salt Gap, repairs on broken bit received and again running tour at above 800 feet.

Geo. F. King well No. 1 on Survey 401 is expecting casing today and will set casing in 1040 ft. hole.

Geo. F. King well No. 2 (Geo. F. King Trust), on Survey 333, expecting rig in within two weeks.

Cooper-Shields on Survey 1066, drilling at between 500 and 600 feet.

Contractor Hays, associate of J. W. Waymire, arrived from Kansas to arrange the preliminaries for the placing of the tools and drilling equipment now enroute for the Smith & Jergins well on Survey No. 42. Mr. Hays will have active charge of the drilling of this well.

### M'CCULLOCH COUNTY ATTRACTING INVESTORS FROM ALL OVER U. S.

Among the week's visitors to the McCulloch county oil field have been F. R. Abbott and R. C. Newton of Idabel, Okla., the latter president of the American National bank of Idabel, who own a lease on Survey 86. "The field certainly looks good," said Mr. Newton, following a visit to the Lohn shallow field, "and we are not only highly pleased with the acreage we now hold, but have purchased additional acreage, and expect to drill two wells immediately. I can see no reason why the Lohn Valley should not become one of the most productive shallow fields in the state, and to judge from the number of wells now drilling and under contract, it will soon become a second Burkburnett."

To illustrate the widespread fame of the McCulloch county field, the visitors to Brady this week include oil men and investors from all parts of the United States, among others being: Ben C. Hyde and Frank D. Harrison of Kansas City, Mo., and J. B. Earle of Waco, who were here looking after the 7,000 acre lease on the Matthew Capps ranch 11 miles northeast of Brady, and on which they have two locations on excellent structure, and are under contract to drill; F. T. Sutherland of Jacksonville, Fla.; Dr. J. S. Henderson of Iowa; W. A. Wells of Minnesota; V. C. Badham of Alabama; J. E. McGinley of Douglas,

Neb., and A. Morgan of Burr, Neb.; the former being president of the Douglas Oil Co. now drilling six miles northwest of Brady; J. C. Heydrick of Lexington, Ky.; E. S. Armstrong of Los Angeles, Calif.; and E. G. Whitcomb of New York. In addition, the week's visitors have included A. W. Cooper, Raymond Cooper, Ft. Worth; H. H. Prince, I. H. King and Geo. R. Stone, Dallas; S. C. Parks, Cross Plains; L. D. Terry, Bronte; E. J. Montgomery, Dallas; Jno. Buie and S. P. Woodward, Coleman; E. Stokes, Dallas; V. L. Johnson, San Marcos; W. O. Bucy, Greenville; Foster Mitchell, J. A. Mitchell, Fort Worth; M. W. Coll, College Station; G. W. Trumbull, Houston; A. T. Jergins, Fort Worth.

### EAST HALF BANK BUILDING BOUGHT BY COMMERCIAL

The Commercial National bank has purchased the east half of the bank building from F. M. Newman for a consideration of \$10,000. The building was erected in 1903 jointly by the bank and Mr. Newman, and is one of the most substantial in town, its walls being so heavy that any number of stories may be added as occasion demands. The bank, wishing to make its present quarters permanent, and also to provide for the enlargement of the bank quarters should the present oil development in McCulloch county justify, made the purchase and now have tentative plans for the addition of several stories to the building, and the conversion of the upper floors into the most modern business offices in the city.

Judge Newman retains a lease on his office on the second floor and the Popular Dry Goods Co. also has a lease on the east half of the first floor, so there will be no changes in the location of any of the occupants, for the time being at least.

### KLEANUP CAMPAIGN APR. 22-23-24TH PROCLAMATION ISSUED BY MAYOR

ALL CITIZENS URGED TO JOIN IN WAR ON PESTILENCE, DISEASE AND FILTH.—LET'S MAKE A "CITY BEAUTIFUL."

The Standard's opening gun has gotten results. The ball is rolling and the big Spring Kleanup Campaign is on. Mayor L. H. King, by proclamation has set aside three days—April 22, 23 and 24th—as Kleanup Days, and every citizen is expected to have his place spic and span when curfew rings on the night of April 24th. Most citizens will, of course, prefer to attack rubbish heaps at once without waiting for the official kleanup days, and some will prefer to have their attention called to the fact of their neglect on the morning of the 25th—but let us hope and pray AND WORK to the end that this last-named brand of citizens may be conspicuous by their absence. Here is the

#### MAYOR'S PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, disease has been prevalent throughout the country during the past winter, and it is deemed advisable and for the best interests of the people of the City to take every possible precaution to guard against epidemics and diseases in the city during the coming summer; and

Whereas, the City Health Officer of the City of Brady has ordered that a clean up campaign be inaugurated and prosecuted throughout the city in order that all causes of disease may be removed as far as possible, and the danger of epidemics and disease reduced to a minimum, and it is deemed advisable and for the welfare and best interests of the inhabitants of the city that we should have such clean up campaign.

Now, therefore, I, L. H. King, Mayor of the City of Brady, by virtue of the authority vested in me, do hereby proclaim April 22, 23 and 24, 1919, as clean up days in the City of Brady, on which days every citizen of this city is ordered to clean up their premises, and destroy or remove from all property and premises in their possession or under their control any and all rubbish, trash and filth of every description, in order to avoid mosquitoes, typhoid germs, and other disease germs, as far as possible, and in order that all premises within the city may be rendered sanitary and causes of disease removed before hot weather begins. Proper measures will be taken to enforce this order against all persons in the city who do not clean up their premises within the city as above ordered. The support and cooperation of the public generally is requested, so that said clean up campaign may be a complete success.

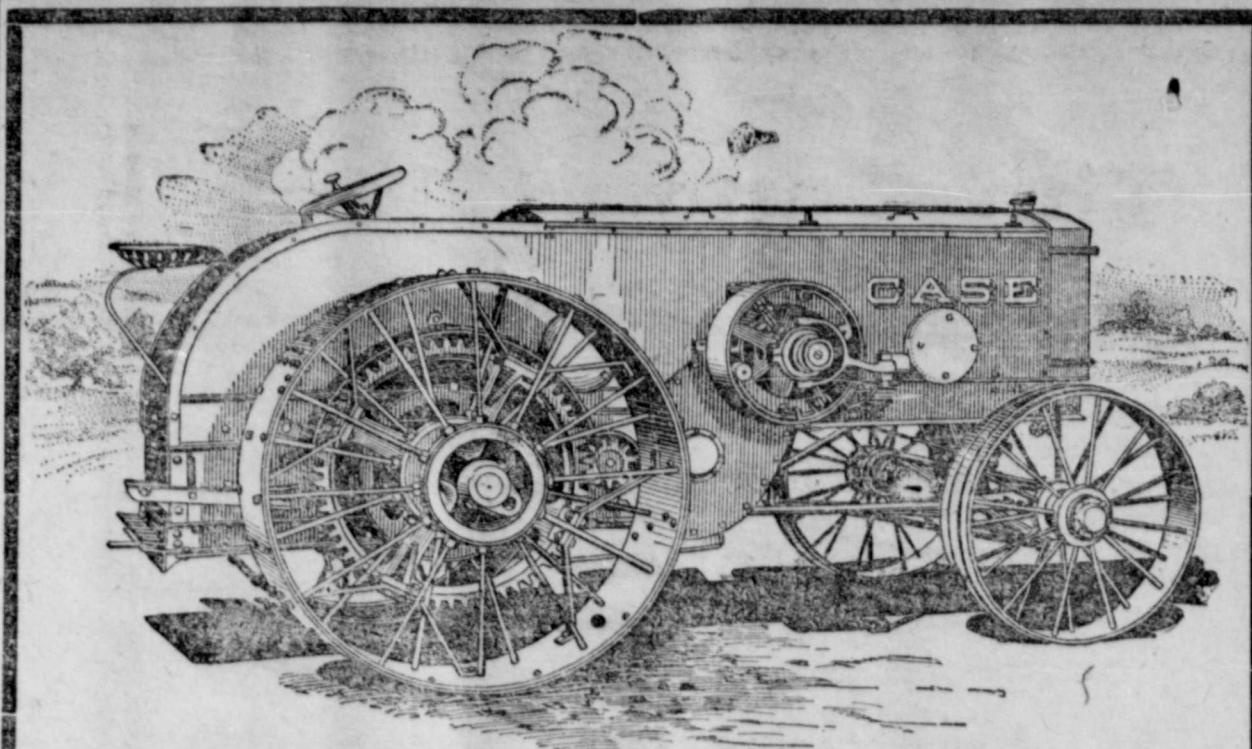

### POTTER'S CLAY ABOUND IN McCULLOCH COUNTY—VALUE IS INESTIMABLE

There is a mountain of potter's clay in McCulloch county that may some day be developed for commercial purposes and which may result in the establishment of a pottery manufacturing enterprise here among us. At least, there is no logical reason why such development should not come in the course of time. The mountain with this product is just about two miles east of Salt Gap, and but a few miles from the house of J. A. Henton of Melvin and on his land. The Standard has several samples of the clay on exhibition at its office, for which we are indebted to Mrs. Emma Campbell. Mrs. Campbell states that the children in Salt Gap use the clay to mold forms and figures, and find it very pliable and workable. A piece of the clay was laid upon live coals, and while baked but a few minutes, it took on a hard surface, which is capable of receiving a high polish. 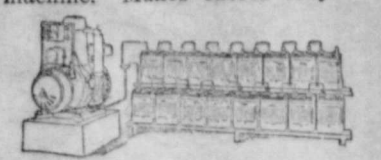

## FIRE LOSS AT RANGER \$850,000 —NO INSURANCE

Fort Worth, April 7.—The business section of the town of Ranger for a distance of two blocks with the Wilson hotel as the pivot was destroyed by fire last night. The loss on buildings was \$100,000.

Very little insurance was carried because of the frame construction of the houses and the absence of fire fighting equipment has caused most of the insurance companies refusing to accept the risk. Outside of the hundred thousand dollar loss on the buildings, the loss on stocks of merchandise will total \$750,000.

One unidentified man was reported killed and several were injured. It was necessary to dynamite several houses in order to stop the progress of the fire, since the town has no fire fighting equipment of any kind.

To Make Investigation.

State Fire Marshall Wallace English announced that he would leave for Ranger to investigate the fire in that city last night. He has received no information concerning the fire which is reported to have caused a loss of \$850,000.00 in the business section of Ranger.

We have not yet learned her name, but that will be published in next week's paper.

The Federal government offered to pay all the salary and expenses except \$450.00. This county was allowed to come in under this special offer. We certainly do think that was

a fair offer and no doubt the county will be greatly helped by this addition to the Agricultural department. It is supposed that the lady will office with the Chamber of Commerce force, as County Agent B. D. Black is now stationed there.

This Lady Home demonstrator will work with the ladies in the towns and country, teaching them to can meats and vegetables and the conservation of all garden and poultry products. Schools of cooking and sewing will be conducted by her. In fact, she is to enter the home life of the women and help them in their various economic problems.

The rain, which amounted to two-tenths of an inch in Brady, proved very beneficial to crops, especially following, as it did, the heavy winds of the early part of the week. Wednesday night there was frost, but not enough to damage even the tenderest of garden products.

**IRONS WELL IN SAN SABA COUNTY SEVEN MILES EAST OF MERCURY DRILLING**

"An important test for the southern part of Brown county and the northern part of San Saba county is now in progress on the Hyde tract, about two miles south of the Colorado river in San Saba county. **VISITORS TO OIL WELLS WARNED NOT TO LEAVE GATES OPEN OR DOWN**

Visitors to any of the oil wells in McCulloch county are invariably extended every courtesy and made to feel welcome at the wells, but several annoying incidents have occurred that threaten to abridge this right of visit and welcome, and that is the matter of leaving gates open and gaps down enroute to the wells. Especially have visitors to the C. S. Thomas wells at Whiteland and Salt Gap been flagrant violators of this rule of courtesy, and Superintendent J. B. Tait states that such carelessness must in future be avoided, or all visiting at the wells will be stopped. The leaving of gates open is not so much a matter of concern to the oil men, as it is to the farmers whose cattle and stock is thereby permitted to stray out of the pastures, and it is only to protect the stockmen that the oil men must threaten this action.
