RATE ON POSTAL CARDS ALSO REDUCED TO 1c-DROP LETTERS 1c-ALL OTHER MAIL MATTER CONTIN-UES AT SAME RATE AS PRESENT.

Announcement has been made that, effective July 1st, letter postage will be reduced to 2c per ounce; drop letters will again be mailable at the rate of 1c per ounce, and the rate of postage on postal cards will also be reduced to 1c. Rates on all other matter, with the exception of 2nd class rates, will remain the same as at present. In other words, the postal rates are being returned to the pre-war basis.



### SAVAGES USED "POISON GAS"

Ingredients Were Different, but Object Was the Same as That Sought by the Germans.

As is well known, the Germans in the great war were anticipated by some savage tribes in the use of polsonous gas for war purposes. Nature quotes authorities to show that tribes like the Tupinamba and Guaranis of the Brazil littoral and on the Rio Parana used poisonous gases in attacking fortified villages. Men went in front of the attacking party, each holding a pan with embers in one hand and ground red pepper in the other. When the wind was against the Spaniards they sprinkled the pepper on the embers. This was also done in attacks on the Spaniards in Venezuela. In the same way pepper was largely used in exorcising demons and evil spirits. The use of this pepper, known as Aji, would soon be discovered by these Indians, who cultivated the plant extensively. It was only necessary for some one to upset a basin of Ajl into the fire and a hut would soon be cleared of its occupants. The use of the smake in warfare would be a natural develop-

### Star Time Most Reliable.

The official "time man" at the navnt observatory at Washington, lying on his back with his eye to a telescope and his finger on a recording button, checks up "Old Sol" by a certain fixed star -- for the sun is not quite punctual. In fact, Sol is about four minutes behind time except on just four occasions during the year; and so many allowances have to be made for his vagaries that an imaginary sun is used by the government astronomer, on which to base his horoscopical calculations.

It may be interposed that the earth's elliptic orbit and its varying rate of speed in its travels, says the Watchman of America, helps to give the sun, as a timekeeper, a bad record, but the fact remains that sidereal, or star time, is much more reliable than sun time.

### Look Up to the Stars.

There are thousands of people who never look at the stars, except as possibly some bright planet attracts their eye for an instant. Even then the gorgeous, plainly discernible Orion, with his belt and scabbard, fails to impress itself upon their earth-drawn gaze. Surely it is a groveling nature that never looks up to the softly luminous twinkle.

One may be sorry for people who do not study the stars-they lose so much. The sufferer from insomnia, wracked by hectic plans of the morrow, tosses on his unique bed instead of forgetting the world in the cool night zephyrs and the stars' medium of peace and right.

Weather conditions have been such that I have been unable to get out, so I will give some recipes here that will likely be needed soon:

Canning Apricots. Wash well, split open and remove the seeds. Do not peel. Blanch 1 to 2 minutes, pack into sterilized jars, and pour into them a syrup made of one part of sugar to two parts of water. Partly seal put the jars on a rack in a vessel of water. (The water must not come more than within 1 inch of the top of the jars). Cover the vessel and boil for 16 minutes. Remove from the water, seal, let cool and pack away.

Canning Peaches.

Firm peaches may be lye peeled, but only these. Have ready a boiling . lye solution of 4 tablespoon of concentrated lye to 1 gallon of water. + Drop the peaches into this for half a minute, lift out, and drop into clear water which has been boiling for a period. The rains have kept them at home almost all during their residence there. They have no crops except cotton, even the corn being drowned out. However, Mr. Anderson says he has about 30 acres of mighty pretty cotton. The only way he could get it in shape was to take off his shoes, roll up his pants and wade out in the mud and water and pull out the weeds and cotton instead of chopping it out. 




