HOME ECONOMICS DEPARTMENT.

Weather conditions have been such that I have been unable to get out, so I will give some recipes here that will likely be needed soon:


Canning Apricots.
Wash well, split open and remove the seeds. Do not peel. Blanch 1 to 2 minutes, pack into sterilized jars, and pour into them a syrup made of one part of sugar to two parts of water. Partly seal put the jars on a rack in a vessel of water. (The water must not come more than within 1 inch of the top of the jars). Cover the vessel and boil for 16 minutes. Remove from the water, seal, let cool and pack away.

Canning Peaches.
Firm peaches may be lye peeled, but only these. Have ready a boiling lye solution of 4 tablespoons of concentrated lye to 1 gallon of water. Drop the peaches into this for half a minute, lift out, and drop into clear water which has been boiling for a period. After this, place them in cold water, then the skins will come off easily. Cut into halves, remove the seeds, and pack into jars. Pour over them a syrup of 1 part of sugar and 4 parts of water. Follow instruction given for apricots.

Sauerkraut.
If properly handled sauerkraut of excellent quality can be produced from cabbage maturing at any season of the year. The essential points are the use of only mature, sound cabbage, scrupulous cleanliness throughout the process and proper care of the surface of the brine after fermentation is completed.

In making sauerkraut for home purposes the outer green leaves of the cabbage should be removed, just as in preparing cabbage for boiling. In addition all decayed or bruised leaves should be discarded and the core removed. Shred the cabbage and pack immediately into a perfectly clean, water-tight receptacle such as a barrel, keg, or crock. As the cabbage is packed, cover with a clean board cover. A cloth should be placed over the top. The salt soon extracts a considerable amount of the juice from the cabbage and a sufficient weight of clean brick or stone should be added to cause the brine to rise above the wooden cover. Care should be taken not to use lime or sandstone for weights, for the acid produced by fermentation attacks the lime and destroys the keeping quality of the rhine. Covers and receptacles made of yellow or pitch pine should not be employed because such woods cause disagreeable tastes.

The barrel or crock is now set aside and fermentation is allowed to proceed undisturbed. If the feathery cold or the product is stored in a cool cellar it may take three to five weeks for the fermentation to be completed. If placed in a warm room fermentation may be completed within ten days or two weeks. As soon as fermentation starts a foam appears on the surface of the brine. This is soon

followed by a film which develops into a scum, if allowed to remain. The scum should be removed as often as it forms, every day if necessary. This scum feeds upon the acid in the brine and if allowed to grow undisturbed, soon destroys both brine and kraut. As soon as gas bubbles cease to arise, the scum should be again removed, if any has formed, and a layer of hot melted paraffin about one-fourth to one-half inch thick should be poured upon the brine. If all the gas bubbles have not come to the top they will break through this layer of paraffin and it will have to be melted again and poured on again. Before adding the paraffin, hit the side of the jar to see if any bubbles will rise; if not, set the receptacle where it will not be disturbed until ready for use. Any attempt to remove them may break the seal and necessitate remelting and resealing.

To make pickles from these cucumbers open the containers, weight and freshen the cured cucumbers by allowing them to stand in clear, cool water for an hour or two. Drop them into a lime bath (one ounce of lime to one gallon of water) for about two hours. The lime used is calcium oxide and can be bought from the drug store. From this water put them into a soda bath (one teaspoonful of soda to one gallon of water). Then plunge the cucumbers into a clear, cool water for an hour. Drain and cover with a weak solution of vinegar and allow to stand for two or three hours. Put in kettle:

- 1 quart of vinegar.
- 1-4 cupful whole black pepper.
- 2 rods of red benner.

1 pound of brown sugar.
2 tablespoonfuls cloves.
1 tablespoon of mace.
Boil for five minutes and pour over the cucumbers which have been drained from the first vinegar. This amount is for one gallon of pickles. Pack into jars, cover with the spiced vinegar, and process to seal air-tight. Process means cooking the product in jars in hot water, counting the time after the water begins to boil.



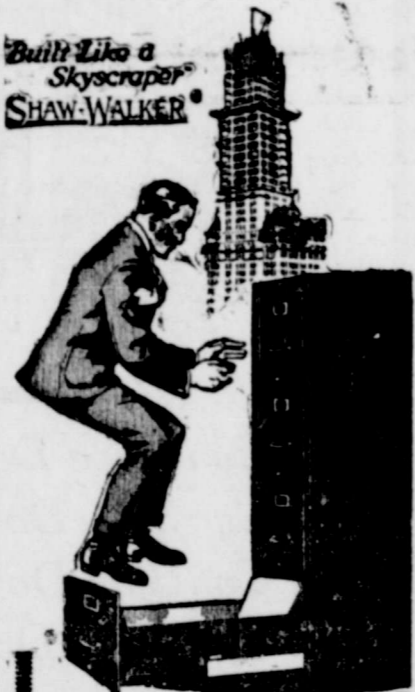
LOCAL BRIEFS
