Washington, August 1 .-- Cotton production of 11,016,000 bales for this year was forecasted by the Department of Agriculture today. The condition of the crop on July 25th was given as 67.1 per cent of normal.

Today's forecast shows an increase of 30,000 bales over the forecast a month ago, and the condition has declined 2.9 per cent. The condition of the Texas crop announced today was 67 per cent.
