BROWNWOOD'S WATERWORKS SYSTEM.

Oftimes the whole world looks dark and gloomy and discouragement very nearly gets the better of the greatest of optimism. On the whole we have had no real reason to kick, for the service under municipal ownership has been better than ever before, and the city is gradually acquiring a piece of property that will some day be one of her most valuable assets. There may still be times of gloom and despondency in store for us, but eventually the effort we now make will have its reward.
