Mr. Souther was born in Union county, Georgia, in 1841, and at the age of ten years emigrated with his parents to Arkansas. At the outbreak of the Civil War he was among the first 100 to volunteer, joining the first Arkansas volunteers and serving three and a half years with the Union army. He was married in 1863 to Miss Polly Ann Duckworth, and their 56 years of married life were singularly happy. His widow with seven children, W. L. Souther of North Dakota, Mrs. O. S. Macy and Mrs. Bee Ogden of Brady, Mrs. J. B. Chambers of Corpus Christi, Mrs. P. T. Orlopp of San Diego, Calif., Miss Ida Mae Souther of Corpus Christi and Miss Elizabeth Souther of Brady, together with twelve grand-children and one great-grand-child survive.

Twenty-six years ago the family moved to Brady, Mr. Souther conducting one of the early hotels on the west side for a year. He then removed to San Saba, where he was engaged in the hotel business for three years, and upon his return to Brady he led a retired life. He had been a member of the Baptist church for 49 years, and had led a consistent Christian life, being a kind and indulgent father, a true friend and an ideal citizen and neighbor.
