

Plowing is only the beginning of what a tractor should be able to do.



MAKING OF WINES AT HOME IS PROHIBITED RULES ATTY. GENERAL

Austin, Texas, Sept. 18 .- A person who manufactures wine, cider or any other beverage for home use as a beverage would be guilty of violating the law, provided the beverage so manufactured is capable of producing intoxication or is an intoxicating liquor according to an opinion given today by Acting Attorney General W. A. Keeling to J. P. Word, County Attorney of Bosque county.

County Attorney Word, in asking the opinion, stated that there are several farmers in Bosque county who wished to know if they are permitted under the law to make grape wine for their own use out of mustang or other grapes.

The Dean bill, which becomes effective October 21, in defining intoxicating liquors, constitutes all beverages intoxicating which contain one per cent or more of alcohol, but leaves it a question of fact as to whether or not liquors containing one

per cent or less are intoxicating. If a beverage would be intoxicating which contains less than one per cent of alcohol, the sale, transportation, etc., in Texas is prohibited. The legislature has not the power, if it were so disposed, to constitute a liquor nonintoxicating, but to aid the enforcement of law it can declare a liquor intoxicating, which in fact, is not intoxicating.

Under the constitutional amendment which is now in full force and effect, Acting Attorney General Keeling says the manufacture of any intoxicating liquors except for medicinal, mechanical, scientific or sacramental purposes is absolutely prohibited.

"It also follows that the manufacture of any character of intoxicating beverages, whether designated for personal use or for sale, is absolutely prohibited. Unless its manufacture was for medicinal, mechanical, scientific or sacramental purposes," says the opinion. The opinion further says: "When the Dean bill becomes operative, it being a measure passed in aid of the constitutional amendment. this measure constitutes any liquor an much as 1 per cent alcohol, and which

is a beverage. In other words, a beverage containing as much as 1 per cent alcohol is intoxicating liquor.
