## CONTRACT CLOSED FOR NEW TEST ON C. C. LEDBETTER RANCH

### 3,500 FT. TEST CONTRACTED BY CRANDALL & HENRY OF SAN DIEGO, CALIF.

COMPLETE STANDARD RIG AND MOST OF TOOLS ALREADY ON RIGHT-OF-WAY AT PASCHE—DRILLING TO BE IN PROGRESS WITHIN 90 DAYS.

C. C. Ledbetter announces the closing of a contract with Messrs. Crandall & Henry of San Diego, Calif., for the drilling of a 3,500 ft. test on his ranch lying south of Pasche, the well to be spudded in within 90 days. Material for a complete standard rig, with 84 ft. derrick, is already on the right-of-way at Pasche, together with most of the tools, having been moved out from Brady on October 27th. The company, of which Messrs. Crandall & Henry are the head, is known as the California-Texas Oil & Development Co. C. H. Crandall spent several days here a few weeks back, completing arrangements for the drilling of the well, going from here to Lampasas, where the company is also arranging to drill.

The lease held by Crandall & Henry includes some 2,000 acres, all being owned by Claude Ledbetter. This acreage has been under lease by these California parties for the past year or two, but last August, through oversight, they permitted their lease to lapse. The value they placed upon their holdings was indicated by their efforts to renew the contract immediately upon the arrival in Texas of Mr. Crandall, and the new arrangement was finally successfully negotiated with Mr. Ledbetter, the contract being signed on November 7th.

Drilling is to begin within 90 days from this date. Particular interest is attached to this contract in view of the fact that the Leonard Petroleum Co.'s well on the Waring ranch, also in Concho county, is expected to develop into a good producer as soon as preparations have been completed for the drilling of the well in.

The location for the new test on the Ledbetter tract has not yet been definitely decided, but will be announced within the next week or two, and the rig and material immediately moved out.

### RAMSAY TO OPEN PLANING MILL IN EASTLAND

E. B. Ramsay is completing arrangements to go to Eastland, Texas, with the intention of opening a first-class planing mill at that place. In fact, he had all his plans laid some time back to make the move, but for the past six weeks has been awaiting permit from railway headquarters to enable him to secure a car in which to ship his planing mill equipment and material. In the meantime he has been getting everything assembled and in readiness to load on the cars when he finally secures them.

Mr. Ramsay has torn down the old Midway school building, which he purchased some two years ago at the time of the building of the new Claxton school house, and will ship the lumber to Eastland for use in erecting a building to house his mill. About two months ago Mr. Ramsay purchased for \$4500 a lot 100x100 ft. in Eastland, being located on the main business street, and about 6 blocks from the heart of the city. On this lot he will erect his building and establish his plant. Practically all the planing machinery from the local plant will be moved to Eastland, where the building activities have created a great demand for this class of work. Mr. Ramsay has rented out his home in Brady and will move his family with him. Also J. E. Snavely and Jack

Corbin, who have been in Mr. Ramsay's employ for a long number of years, will accompany him to that place and help him in the establishment and conduct of the business.

In going to Eastland, however, Mr. Ramsay is not quitting Brady permanently. On the contrary, he retains large interests and business and resident property holdings, which mean his eventual return to this city. However, he sees in Eastland an opportunity to dispose of his surplus material, as well as to establish a business which will bring him handsome returns either from its operation or from an advantageous sale a little later. In his new undertaking he has the best wishes of all his friends, and all are hoping to see him and his estimable family soon re-established as Brady citizens.

### POOL HALL CASE IS TO BE HEARD NOV. 14TH AT FORT WORTH, TEXAS

Hearing on the constitutionality of the pool hall law will be held Friday, November 14th, according to Federal Judge James C. Wilson, who will preside at the hearing. The court will be composed of Judge Wilson, United States District Judge Smith of El Paso and Judge Walker of the United States appellate court, now in session in this city.

### BRIEF HISTORY OF THE HALL-DUTTON LEASE

The present oil activities in McCulloch county may rightfully be said to have had their origin in the development begun about 7 years ago at Lohn, Texas, by Messrs. J. and H. Meers, operating under the firm name of Meers Bros. These operations were not a financial success, due almost entirely to the lack of a market for oil production at this time, and, on account of insufficient capital, the Lohn development fell through.

However, the big companies and pipe line people agreed that if a 200-barrel production could be secured at Lohn, they would be justified in building a pipe line to Brady and thus afford the needed market for the oil production.

Meers brothers, not being satisfied with what development had been done, prevailed upon Dr. J. A. Udden, state geologist, to come to McCulloch county and look it over from a geological standpoint. At this time, Dr. Udden pointed out the structure on the Hall-Dutton lease to J. Meers. After that time, Meers Brothers kept a part of this acreage leased up with a view of getting someone to drill it. Both Messrs. P. C. Dutton and J. C. Hall, owners in fee of what is now known as the Hall-Dutton lease, originally composed of 3,440 acres, having for a long number of years had confidence in the oil possibilities of their lands, and being desirous of securing development, offered to give a lease on their joint holdings for development in preference to selling the lease for a bonus. During all this period, when a lease would lapse, these gentlemen were ready and willing to give Meers Bros. a renewal in order to aid the latter in their efforts to secure a drilling contract. The final renewal of the lease on the Hall-Dutton tract, was given Meers Bros. on December 1st, 1917. Shortly after this time, a trade was made between the Messrs. Meers and C. A. Bowen of Tulsa, Oklahoma, to drill a well on this acreage, Meers Bros. giving 3,520 acres to drill a well to a depth of 2500 ft. unless oil or gas be found at a lesser depth. In the meantime Thad O. Day of Tulsa, became interested with Mr. Bowen in the contract, and eventually succeeded Bowen and assumed the contract to drill the well.

The first well was spudded in on May 15, 1918, just 15 days before the expiration of Meers Bros. time limit on the lease contract. In order to speed up shipment of rig and material and to assure the spudding in of the well within the contract period, J. Meers made a trip to Tulsa and in company with Thad O. Day made a long drive out of Tulsa, secured a rig, also teamsters to haul and load the same, as well as overcoming all obstacles in securing a car for shipment due to the government having requisitioned all flat cars to ship cannons on. The rig was loaded out within 24 hours after its purchase had been negotiated. Arriving in Brady, the time limit was so short that the rig builders, who chanced also to be experienced drillers, spudded in the well on the final day of the contract period between the Messrs. Meers and Bowen and Day. The drilling crew arrived within a few days, and actual drilling of the hole was begun by them. Bad luck dodged their efforts, however, and at 65 ft. a crooked hole compelled abandonment of the first attempt, and the rig was moved one-half mile east, where the second hole was spudded in. This well was also lost on account of a crooked hole at 740 ft.

It was then that a new standard rig, with 84-ft. derrick, was built, and the present hole spudded in, resulting in the striking of oil sands in this well at 854 ft.

The development at this time is different from the development of seven years ago, in that before a few spe-

ulators jumped in and leased up the country, resulting in the shutting out of the big companies. This time, however, Mr. Day sold part of his acreage, in blocks of from 80 to 320 acres to nearly all of the big companies, among others now holding close-in and offset acreage being Prairie Oil & Gas Co., Empire Gas & Fuel Co., J. S. Cosden & Co., Constantine Oil & Refining Co., Nelson & Nelson of Kansas City, and others whose identity is not generally known.

The oil strike in the Day well is not only universally conceded the best opportunity McCulloch county has ever had to enter the ranks of big producers, but the fact that the many big companies own offset and surrounding acreage, together with the further fact that the Union Oil Co. of California, holds a block of acreage at Cow Gap, which adjoins the Hall-Dutton lease on the southwest, assures a market for all the oil that may be produced.

In conclusion, attention is directed to the several causes which have resulted in McCulloch county oil territory now being in the limelight. First, the unremitting efforts and undying faith the Meers brothers had in the future development of oil in McCulloch county. Second, the magnanimous offer and repeated courtesies of Messrs. Hall and Dutton, who put permanent development above temporary personal gain. Third, the dogged persistence of Mr. Day, who, in spite of repeated failures and disasters, continued tirelessly in his efforts to drill a well, risking his all to bring about the present development, and again his consideration and foresight, by which the big oil companies were able to secure from him offset acreage and thereby assure a market for Day's own production, when it should be had. As a concrete example of the good results of mutual co-operation and fair dealing, the foregoing is notable.

### KILLING FREEZE FEATURE OF WEEK—THERMOMETER REGISTERS DROP WEDN'DAY.

A heavy frost Tuesday night marked the end of the 1919 cotton growing season, the frost being sufficient to kill all cotton except probably some upland fields. What withstood Tuesday night's frost, however, received its death blow early yesterday morning, when a heavy freeze was recorded. The night was very quiet, scarce a breath of air stirring, and the thermometer gradually dropped below the freezing point about daybreak, the freeze continuing until after sun-up. Yesterday continued quite cool, although clear and sunshiny.

The cold spell is welcomed from the standpoint of stabilizing the weather and warding off a tendency towards another rainy spell. On the other hand, considerable loss will have been sustained by farmers who have been too busy to cut their fall feed.

### DAY WELL IS PRODUCER JUST AS IT STANDS IS THE OPINION OF OIL MEN

BAILING OUT OF WELL COMPLETED TUESDAY—LAST BAILER FULL OF OIL WITH VERY LITTLE WATER SHOWING—TEST OUT IN FEW DAYS.

With but one foot of sand pierced by the drill, every indication points to the Day well being a first-class producer just as it stands. The well was bailed out Tuesday and the packers were found to be holding perfectly. After the last water was bailed out, the bailer was dropped to the bottom of the hole and drawn out full of oil, with but a very little water showing. The well has been closed down temporarily to permit the oil to accumulate for a few days when a test will be made and a decision reached whether or not to attempt to increase the production by drilling deeper into the sands.

The well continues to show up so good that now there is no question whatever about the fact that production is assured, rather the question is how great will the production be and whether the well will eventually flow. It is said by those familiar with the geology of the country that the oil sands are the same as the strata found at corresponding depths in other wells in the county and some of which have been around 30 ft. in thickness. If such be the case, with this great oil sand strata showing up so well after being barely pierced, it is virtually assured that a wonderful production is possible if the well is drilled deeper into the sands.

In the meantime, interested oil men and the citizenship in general is curbing its impatience as best it can and hoping expectantly almost any minute to hear of the well coming in as a gusher.

### DEATH OF W. J. FULLAGER

### HORSE BUYER AT MENARD KILLED BY JAS. CALLAN

Considerable interest was manifested in Brady yesterday morning by news of the killing of a man named Billings at Menard. Jas. Callan doing the shooting, and the tragedy occurring on the Callan ranch. Particulars are not available, except that the shooting occurred sometime late Wednesday evening. In response to an inquiry from Sheriff Wall, the sheriff's department at Menard yesterday morning sent the following information:

"In reference to the killing. Party's name is Billings—a stranger—think he is from Georgetown. Don't know what the trouble was. Jas. Callan did the shooting." Inquiry over long distance through the West Texas Telephone Co. brought the added information that Billings was a horse buyer and that the shooting occurred on Jas. Callan's ranch between Menard and Callan, Texas. LATER—Word received over long distance is that Billings was accused of leaving a gate open by Callan. Billings was shot in the back, the report says, as he was running away from Callan.

I see "O. I. C. U. R. Right" has received only two ears of corn. What is the matter? Correspondents, have you none to send, or is it just too muddy to get in after it? Just wait till I send mine in. I am sure I'll capture the paper dollar.

Mrs. Joe Carroll and Mrs. Geo. Mooring went to the Richland country last week for pears and brought back some of as nice ones as I have ever seen, and say there are many more bushels left in the orchard after they got theirs.



**POULTRY SHOW TO BE HELD AT BROWNWOOD DECEMBER 4TH TO 6TH**

Arrangements are complete for holding a poultry show at Brownwood December 4th to 6th next. At the same time there will be held a poultry school under the direction of the A. & M. college. Entry to both show and school will be free to all.

In addition to poultry there will be held at the same time an exhibit in connection with the boys' and girls' pig, baby beef, corn, cotton, sheep, peanut clubs, and prizes will be distributed for the best exhibits. There will also be a display of pecans, with prizes for the best exhibits, and in addition a sale of pedigreed pigs will take place during the show.

Mr. C. P. Van Winkle, of Dallas, who is one of the Poultry Judges at the National poultry show at Kansas City, will judge the poultry. Mr. Van Winkle is counted one of the best judges of poultry in the country.

Entries will have to be of high grade in order to compete with the Brown county birds. In Brownwood there lives one of the foremost breeders of Barred Plymouth Rocks in the country, while breeders of Black Minorcas, Rhode Island Reds, White Leghorns, Anconas and Black and White Langshans are spread all over the county, who ship out every week birds of very high class. The recent dry spell in this section operated to the disadvantage of the poultry business in the county, but notwithstanding this drawback the annual export of farm yard poultry has averaged around a quarter of a million dollars a year, and the coming show will revive the industry very rapidly in the county, the conditions in which are very favorable to poultry raising.

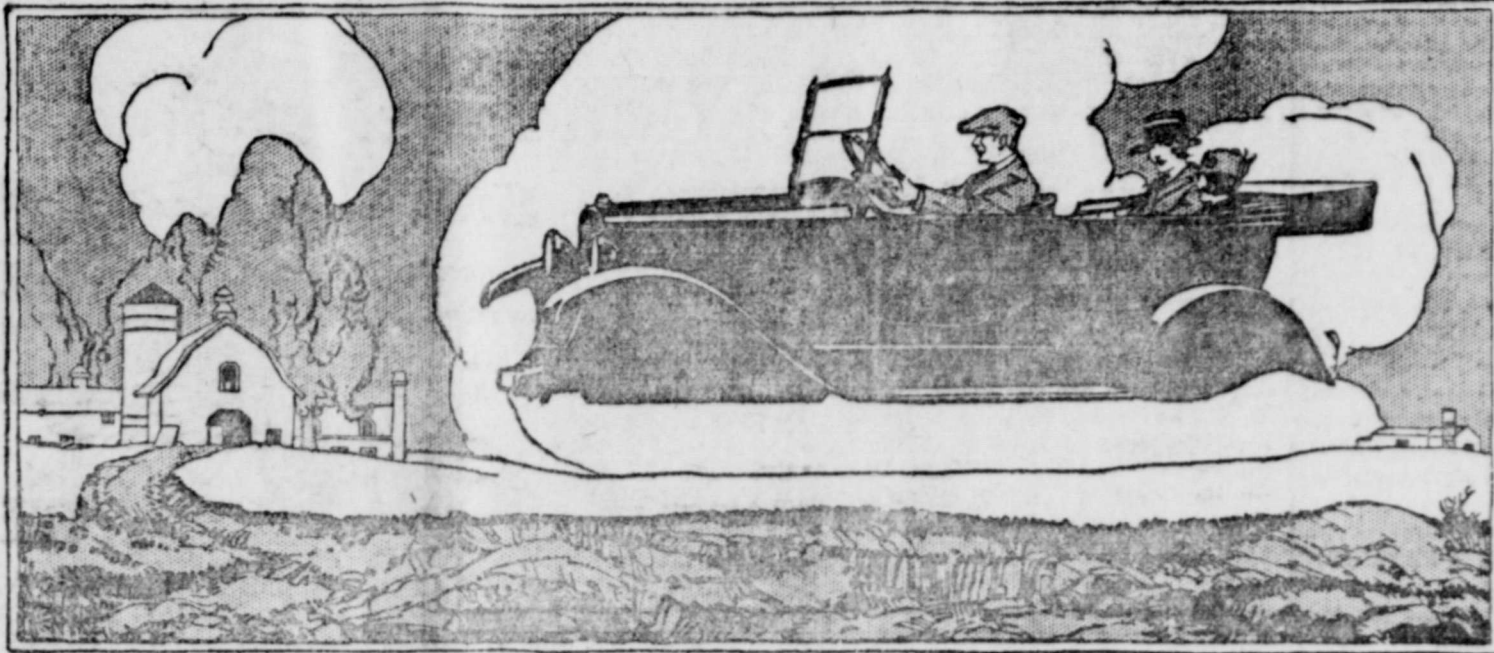

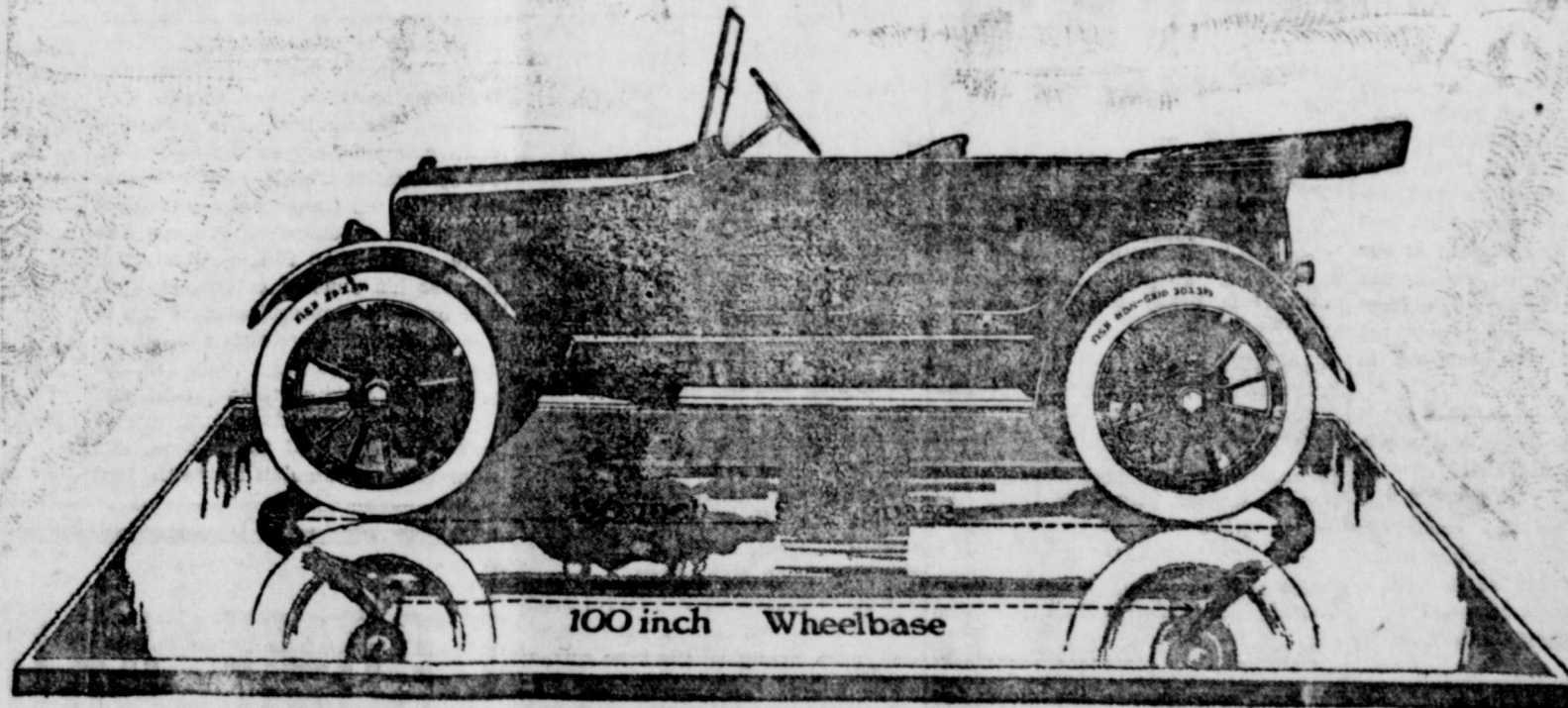

White says the educational conditions in the East, and especially in such cities as Pittsburgh, where a large percent of the population is of foreign extraction, is hardly comparable with those of Texas. He found there a certain smug, self-satisfaction and contentment that smacked of unambition. He returned more strongly impressed than ever by the virgile, progressive and forward-looking ideas of the people of the grand old state of Texas. He returned to Dallas Monday night.

**BAPTISTS LAUNCH WORLD PROGRAM**

PLAN TO RAISE \$75,000,000 FOR GENERAL PURPOSES WITHIN NEXT FIVE YEARS.

**WHOLE SOUTH TO CO-OPERATE**

Each State is Given Definite Task To Perform in Raising Huge Sum For Denomination's New Budget—Drive Is On.

Recognizing the need of the world for more religion and christian service along general lines, the Baptists of the South have resolved to contribute \$75,000,000 to a program of reconstruction following the war, and have laid plans to subscribe this sum during the week of November 30-December 7, a period of five years to be given in which to complete the payment of these subscriptions.

The decision to inaugurate this world program was reached at the meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in Atlanta last May, when the more than 4,000 delegates present voted unanimously to undertake the

The campaign has now been organized with the general headquarters in Nashville, Tenn., where Dr. L. R. Scarborough, president of the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary at Fort Worth, is in charge as general director for the South. He is assisted by a number of men in charge of special divisions of the work, while each of the eighteen states in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention has in turn perfected a state organization, including a State Director, a State Organizer and State Publicity Director. Each association, or district, within each of the states has likewise gotten busy by naming its associational or district directors, and the work of organization has been carried into the local churches to the extent that practically all of the more than 25,000 local Baptist congregations in the South have their workers named to help put over the biggest church drive that has ever been attempted in this section of the country. There are 3,000,000 white Baptists holding church membership in the South, and it is hoped to reach every man, woman and child among them with the message of this campaign and give each of them a part in the plan of saving the world by giving to the extent of their ability to this vast conservation fund.

Christian education, home and foreign missions, state missions, ministerial relief, orphanages and hospitals, are among the various general interests of the denomination that will be cared for in this campaign, the matter of local church expenses, and local church equipment not being included.

Between now and November 30th every effort will be put forth in organizing and mobilizing the Baptist forces in the South, preparatory to the launching of the big drive for the subscriptions and cash payments. July was known as preparation month, August was designated as information month, during which time every effort has been put forth in informing the people on every phase of the campaign, while September has been designated as intercession month, October as enlistment month, November as stewardship month, and the period from November 30 to December 7 as victory week.

"We have undertaken a big task," Dr. Scarborough, the General Director, says, "but we have undertaken it in God's name and for His glory, and by trusting in God and doing our whole duty, we will succeed. There is work here for all, and glory enough for all if we win, but we cannot succeed except we labor diligently and pray earnestly."

"But I am getting old," she replied, "and may not live till the end of September, and I do not want to pass away without having had a part in this great campaign."

Winner of "Armistice Day" Letter in  
Star-Telegram Contest Gives Most  
Vivid Description on War's End

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram recently offered three prizes for the best articles written by former over-seas soldiers as to where they were a year ago on "Armistice Day" and what their experiences and feelings were upon that occasion. The following letter, published on the first anniversary of the signing of the armistice, was awarded first prize—and it is well worth the prize and the reading, as well:

"Armistice Editor:

"(Torn from my diary book. Written 'Somewhere Over There).'

"We knew the day and the hour when the armistice was to go into effect; the eleventh at eleven o'clock. Everyone in camp was wondering whether the Germans would stop firing. The barrage was heavier than any artillery fire I had ever seen and heard since I had been in France and as an ambulance driver and stretcher-bearer I have heard some very heavy duels indeed. Men were crouching here and there behind buildings. Several times my buddy asked: 'Do you think that they really stop firing at eleven?'

"Our captain came up the hill with two officers. I saluted him courteously and it was graciously returned. Then we speculated concerning the armistice. Would the Germans cease firing? The captain would not guess; he preferred to wait and see.

This was about a quarter to eleven o'clock. Shells were falling everywhere; guns were roaring, two of our heavy fourteens being very near. Our buddies kept coming, hiding around the walls and in the least expected places. Ten minutes of eleven and still the guns roared on, unmindful of the fact that peace was imminent. Five minutes of eleven and everyone was showing signs of nervousness.

Firing Ends Abruptly.

"Then, as suddenly as though God Himself had dropped a wet blanket

over the crackling flames of hell and at one blow had extinguished them all, the firing and rumbling immediately ceased. There was an instant pause in which it seemed as though the world had come to an end. Then from the bells of an old cathedral pealed forth silver tones that once again were saying 'Peace on earth.'

"My heart was in my mouth for I was joyously and deliriously leaping about, yelling, shouting and singing, the only time I ever carried a tune. Then I ran for an old cathedral. I reached for the swinging ropes as I entered the door, so as to give the bells another pull. The roof was open to heaven, because the German shells had destroyed it. There, in that ruined place, I knelt with hundreds of other Yanks; I knelt with hands clasped, eyes turned towards heaven and prayed as I have never prayed before.

"I thought of home, a mother who would hold me in her arms and cry a bit and then go to see I had my favorite dessert for dinner; a father who would say it bit huskily, 'Son, it's good to see you again,' and of one who had done a number of things for me, and last but not least, I was thinking of those rows and rows of graves in Flanders fields. Our brothers who died for liberty were asleep there, 'between the crosses, row on row.' The victory is won, the war is over and they sleep in Flanders fields and we are to go home.
