THAD O. DAY WELL DRILLED THROUGH 26 FT. RICH OIL SANDS

OIL SANDS IN DAY WELL FOLLOWED BY 14 FOOT OF SHALE ALSO RICH IN OIL

OIL SANDS SHOW REMARKABLE ABSENCE OF WATER—MAY MAKE 500 BARREL WELL AFTER BEING SHOT—OPERATIONS AWAIT ADVICE OF EXPERTS.

The Thad O. Day well continues an enigma to oil men, with every indication pointing towards the making of a well with remarkable production. Tuesday night the hole was drilled deeper, the drill going through 26 to 29 feet of sand, and then drilling into 12 to 14 ft. of shale, in which formation operations were suspended. Both sand and shale showed not the least indication of water, but were rich in oil.

As a rule, when drilling through such a great body of sand, some streaks of sand will be encountered, which will show an entire absence of oil. Also the bottom sand usually shows up with water. None of these customary experiences have been had. The couple streaks of sand at the top were loose, but showing strongly with oil. The several other streaks of sand were more hard packed, and unusual rich in oil. The shale also showed up strongly with oil, although not as rich as the sands.

Mr. Day has sent samples of the sands and shale to M. J. Munn, one of the best-known geologists in Texas, and who is interested in the Day well, in order to secure his advice on how

BIGGEST MONEY ORDER BUSINESS IN P. O. HISTORY

Prosperity abounds in McCulloch county! You see its evidences everywhere—in the crowds that thronged Brady streets and business houses Saturday—in the buying of new goods—new implements and life's necessities—yes, even is it written in the local postoffice records.

According to Postmaster A. B. Reagan, Monday marked a red letter day in the annals of local postoffice records, by setting a new high mark for the number of postoffice money orders remitted. Altogether, \$1427.86 was handled Monday on postoffice money orders, and of this sum \$1200 was remitted, while the balance was paid out. Eleven were foreign orders, all going to Mexico, whereas the greatest previous record was four foreign money orders in a whole month's time.

Naturally, this great volume of business is due to the large numbers of imported laborers in the county. Negro and Mexican cotton pickers, during the past ten days of pretty weather, have accumulated small fortunes in pay for cotton picking, and they are sending the surplus "back home."

No parcels or letters addressed to Germany have been received at the local office since the resumption of mail facilities with our former enemy, but large quantities of parcels post packages are going forward thru the Mason office, and the Mason postmaster has just made requisition upon the local office for additional custom tags. Food and clothing make up the bulk of the parcels sent to Germany from Mason, with bacon playing no small part in making up the total.

W. M. BAUHOF RESIGNS AS SUPERINTENDENT BRADY WATER-LIGHT WKS.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES EXPECTED TO NAME E. V. CARROLL OF WEATHERFORD AS SUCCESSOR—INSTALLATION OF PLANT UNDER LATTER'S SUPERVISION

W. M. Bauhof, who has been superintendent of the Brady Water & Light Works plant since last February, Monday tendered to the Board of Trustees his resignation, to become effective at once. Mr. Bauhof will devote his time to his cotton crop on his farm three miles out of Brady on the Coleman road, and in the meantime has under consideration offers of positions with several of the large machinery and supply houses.

During his brief stay in the city Monday, Mr. Carroll made many friends, and his excellent recommendations, as well as his achievements at Weatherford, make it appear that the rehabilitation of the municipal plant should be carried out to a successful consummation. Mr. Carroll has been engaged in the water and light business for the past 16 years, and since 1901 has been at the head of the water and light works in Weatherford, during which time the plant there was converted from a direct to an alternating current plant in the same manner that the local change is to be brought about.

After viewing the local situation, Mr. Carroll saw an opportunity to continue in the line of work to which he has given the greater part of his life, and accordingly made application for the contract to install the new plant. The contract was approved by the Board of Trustees, acting in co-operation with the city council and representative citizens interested in the financing of the new plant, and Mr. Carroll returned to Weatherford Monday night to wind up his business affairs in that city and to arrange for his return here the first of next week, at which time he assumes his new duties. His family will continue to make their home in Weatherford until the end of the fall term of school, when they will join him here.

These are but a few of the obstacles that have beset the operation of the present municipal plant, and which constituted a Herculean task that only unremitting effort and hard labor on the part of Mr. Bauhof overcame. With the arrival and installation of the new engines, the difficulties will have largely been overcome, since their economy of operation will more than counterbalance the scarcity of fuel, as well as to obviate the constant making of repairs and the replacing of worn parts on the present equipment. A united citizenship is hoping that the old plant may continue to give service until the new one is installed, and that the arrival of the new machinery may in every way be speeded.

No operations have been possible in a number of weeks at the Thomas Salt Gap well because of inability to haul out fuel or supplies.

FRISCO LINES TO USE OIL BURNERS BY DEC. 25

All engines of the Frisco lines in Texas, will be equipped with oil burners by Christmas, according to an announcement from the operating department of the Frisco, Monday. The change from coal to oil burners on the lines, which was announced some time ago, is rapidly taking place and more than half of the engines have been equipped at the shops at Sherman.

The company is following out the general policy now being adopted by the railroads of Texas in equipping their engines with oil burners. Officials point out this change will save hundreds of dollars annually as well as being cleaner and more sanitary. Coal, which is a difficult product to obtain at the present time, due to the labor unrest, will not be depended upon for fuel to run the trains in the future, it is said.—Fort Worth Record.

WYOMING SHEEPMEN FIND TEXAS RANGES THEIR SALVATION

Abilene, Nov. 18.—Wyoming sheepmen have found West Texas to be an "earthly paradise," according to LeRoy Moore, secretary of a large sheepmen's association of Wyoming, who spent the past week in West Texas looking for pasturage for the starved-out flocks of that state.

Half a million head of sheep are now in the foothills of Wyoming, being fed cotton seed and alfalfa pending arrival of cars for shipment to Texas ranges. A three-foot snow, following a long drouth, forced the Wyoming sheepmen to seek other pastures, and West Texas is solving the problem for them. It is said 200,000 head of sheep have been placed in the San Angelo country alone in the past few weeks.

WATCH OUT FOR BIG ADVANCE IN CANDY PRICE; SUGAR BLAMED

Candy prices will advance with the sugar shortage, Fort Worth manufacturers said Tuesday.

This increase is liable to be considerable, but none of them would make a prediction as to what it would be. Dealers during the past week have paid prices ranging from 5 to 20 cents a pound higher, they say. The next week may see a maximum reached.

"Louisiana sugar cane growers are asking from 17 to 22 cents for their crop, against the Government price of 9 cents for the old crop," one candy factory official said Tuesday. "Candy prices will advance in proportion to the sugar situation. It is impossible to tell what that will be."

Another manufacturing firm would say nothing at all about prices. "You can't make candy without sugar," a representative said.

POWER AGAIN.

Issuing two complete papers in the course of a five-day period, with no electric power on three of the five days, is a feat of which The Standard can boast. Incidentally, it required some ingenuity to secure makeshift power in the interval.

Despite assurance of power all day Wednesday, none was had, the fuel supply having run so low that the municipal plant sought only to maintain steam for the pumping of water. On Thursday it appeared that the fuel supply was so short that even the water supply would have to be abandoned, thus forcing the closing down of the gins, compress, oil mills and all industries dependent upon the city for water, as well as cutting off the residential and business districts, with but a scanty supply for fire protection. However, the board of trustees succeeded in buying, borrowing, begging or stealing enough fuel to prevent this catastrophe, and last Thursday night a tank of long-delayed fuel oil was finally received. If shipments of oil can be secured with regularity, no further delays or shutdowns are anticipated.

In the meantime, The Standard had rigged up a gasoline engine to furnish power to run its presses, and had all but completed arrangements to also run its linotype with the same power. Because of the fact that the linotype was not aligned with the main drive shaft, this latter feat presented many difficulties—accordingly we were greatly relieved to have the city again furnish power for our motors this (Friday) morning.

Incidentally, the hiatus in lighting and power service has resulted in numbers of the business men installing Delco and hollow wire lighting systems for their store. The shutdown, especially right in the busiest season of the year, was a most unfortunate occurrence.

SHOP EARLY.

PUBLIC FORUM.

School Teachers' Salaries.
Brady, Texas, Nov. 20.
Editor Brady Standard:

In the issue of The Standard of November 18th, I notice that you copy and comment on an editorial from the San Saba News concerning teacher's salaries. I would like to make a few remarks on this editorial.

This is another case of a person blazng away as if blind, a case where the writer made no study of the school teaching profession and is utterly ignorant of the conditions that surround this profession.

I wonder if this person could make a decent living on the average salary paid school teachers. I wonder if this person knows what the average salary of the school teacher really is?

Listen, Mr. "Son-of-a-Gun!" The average earnings of the teachers in the Common School Districts of McCulloch county, for the school year ending August 31, 1919, was \$348.73. Can you, Mr. "Son-of-a-Gun," exist on that pittance? If you can, you can make more money telling the teachers how to do it, than you are making in the newspaper business.

It may be all right to talk about teachers getting their reward in the "good they can do," but when it comes to paying board and buying clothes, the boarding houses and the merchants will not accept "the good you do" as legal tender.

You speak, Mr. "Son-of-a-Gun" of "getting back to the old standard," and I judge from your writings that you have never gotten away from the old standards. I suppose that you are one of those that think in the Chinese way, viz: Anything that my grandfather used is good enough for me. If you are, you should use the old G. Washington press and set your type by hand.

You may be agin' living salaries for teachers, but you just as well prepare to take your medicine, for better salaries must come, or your school houses will become the haunts of rats, bats and cockroaches.

Again, if you show me one teacher that has prepared for old age by teaching, I believe that I can show you 1000 that had to quit the profession in order to prepare for this period in life. I feel quite safe on this proposition for "there ain't no such animal."

I agree with you that teachers should not forfeit their contracts unless agreeable to the school board, but under the present conditions the average boards are paying all they can, and are willing for the teachers to better their conditions when possible.

Mr. "Son-of-a-Gun," we must have some relief from somewhere or Texas will drop back to this "old standard" of rank, which was 38, in the United States.

Do you, Mr. "Son-of-a-Gun," want Texas to rank 38 in this Union along educational lines? We MUST have

better teachers, and the only way to get them is to pay better salaries. (Signed:) W. M. DEANS, County Superintendent McCulloch County, Texas.

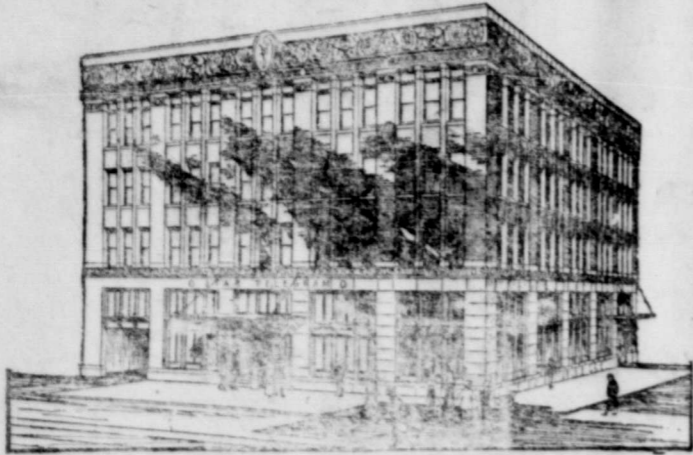

BAPTIST WOMEN TO RAISE \$15,000,000

FIFTH OF SUM SOUGHT IN FIVE-YEAR PROGRAM WILL COME FROM THEM.

ARE DOING A LARGE WORK

Hospitals, Mountain Schools, Good Will Centers and Church Building Funds Maintained by Them in Addition To Regular Gifts.

Evidencing the larger sphere which women have come to occupy in church life, as well as other activities, when the Baptist 75 Million Campaign was decided upon at the meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in Atlanta last May, the women, through their regular organization, the Woman's Missionary Union, at once agreed to be responsible for one-fifth of the sum sought, or \$15,000,000. This means that the Baptist women of the South will raise for missions of all kinds, Christian education and benevolences, the sum of \$3,000,000 a year for the next five years, in addition to their contributions to local enterprises and special work.

Through the channels of the Woman's Missionary Union, with headquarters at Baltimore Md., the Baptist women of the South have since their organization contributed more than \$5,000,000 in cash to various denominational purposes. With the addition of boxes of food and clothing sent to orphanages and other benevolent institutions, the total of their contributions through this channel has reached \$5,710,433.71.

Miss Kathleen Mallory is the corresponding secretary of the Woman's Missionary Union, and in appreciation of the service she has rendered in that connection the Baptist women of Alabama have established the Kathleen Mallory Hospital for Women at Laichow-Fu, Shantung, China, Miss Mallory being a native of Alabama.

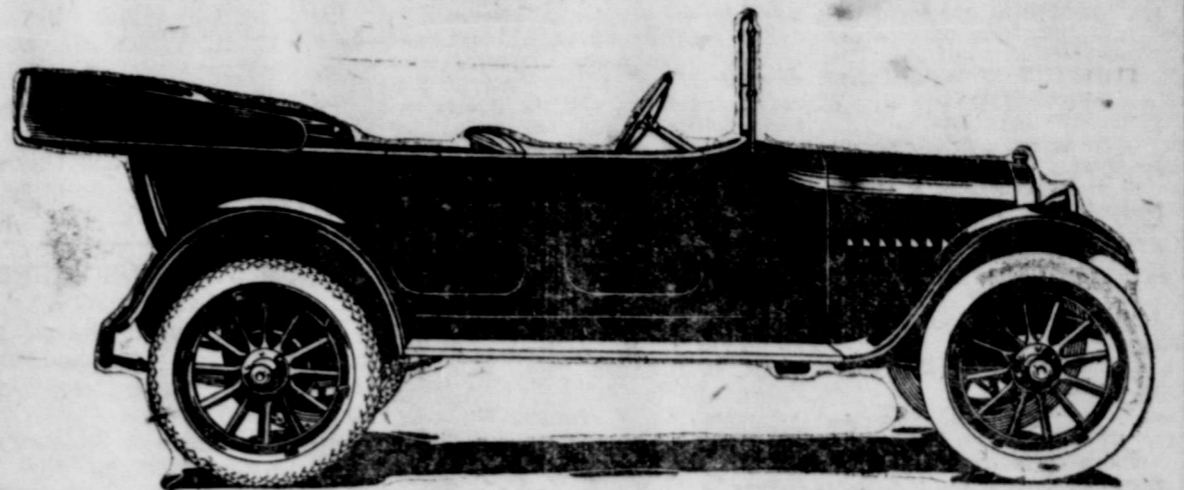
Women of many of the other states have also undertaken special enterprises of their own. Those of Georgia, for instance, established the Ayers Hospital for Women at Hwanghaien, China, a girls' school at Kumamoto, Japan, the Catherine Bryan Kindergarten School at Canton, China, and the Mary P. Willingham School for Girls at Blue Ridge, Ga., a school designed especially for the education of girls in the mountainous section of that state.

Many of the other state unions have special projects such as Good Will Centers in the tenement, factory and mining districts, where effort is made to bring more sunshine and enlightenment and love into the homes and lives of needy families, especially those of foreign birth; church building funds, scholarships for young women who want to obtain training for special Christian service, and similar undertakings.

The general W. M. U., representing all the women of the Southern Baptist Convention, owns and operates the Women's Training School at Louisville, Ky., which has already sent out 700 trained women for special service in all parts of the world; and has established the Margaret Fund for the education in the Baptist schools of the South the sons and daughters of missionaries on the foreign fields, and the Fannie E. S. Heck Memorial, a church building fund established in honor of one of the greatest leaders Southern Baptist women have known.

But money for the support of these institutions as well as that for the payment of the women's pledge of \$15,000,000 in the 75 Million Campaign, will be raised by the actual work of the women and through economy and sacrifice. Church fairs, bazaars, suppers, ice cream socials and the like, are frowned upon by the organized Baptist women of the South as unworthy means for raising funds for carrying forward the work of the kingdom of God and their contributions will not come from this source, it is announced.

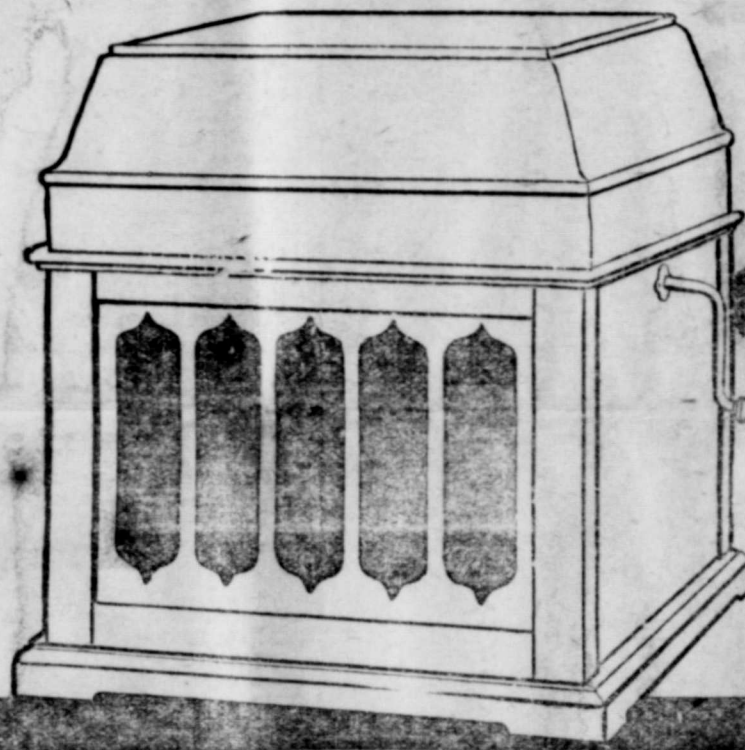

PAPER MAKERS FAVOR NATIONAL OWNERSHIP OF TIMBERED LANDS

New York, Nov. 15.—The Paper and Pulp Association's special committee on forest conservation, in its report just submitted to the association, recommends public ownership of timber land, national or state.

A very large program of forest planting on denuded lands which shows little promise of new natural crops was urged.

The best obtainable estimates, according to the report, indicate an original forest area in the United States of 850,000,000 acres. Based on the same figures the present area is but 550,000,000 acres. Of this 200,000,000 acres are practically merchantable timber, 250,000,000 acres

have been partly cut and turned over with fair natural reproduction, and 100,000,000 acres are cut and burned so badly that extensive planting will be needed to restore it to a productive basis.
