#### Exiled From Homes.

Since the beginning of the war the Turkish Armenians have been largely refugees from their homes. A simple agricultural people, they have been exiles from their farms, deprived of all opportunity to support themselves Year by year their sufferings have in creased. Now, a year after fighting has ceased, they are still living the life of nomads, able to continue to keep alive only by virtue of American philanthropy.

These homeless people-"filthy infldels" to the Turk-were good enoug! to exert their poor might in our be half while the war was still in the balance. Massacres of a half century had not so broken their spirit that they dared not fight for right and for democracy when justice was the issue, We accepted their aid then. Surely we shall not pass them by without compassion now.

The day has passed when any self respecting man dates permit absorption in his own personal affairs to exclude consideration of his neighbor's well being. No honorable man can knowingly allow his neighbor to hunger or to go unclothed. The Christian peoples of the Near East are our neighbors. The money needed to relieve them can be spared without causing any man, woman or child in the United States to suffer.

Must Not Rest on Past. In other years of our own free will we sent missionaries to Turkey. Our schools and colleges and hospitals have played a wonderful role in hu manizing that dark spot in the world Our ideas, our educational resources our material equipment, have been leaven in the Near East. Because we have done well in times past we have this great opportunity for the present. The Armenians have been treated as perhaps no people in history have been treated because they are the spiritual brothers of western races.

Will America help them? There can be but one answer. Their necessity is dire, but our power is great. We are wealthy. We are a member of the family of nations. Our brothers call us. Food, clothes, money, are immediately wanted. If ever unmerited suffering called for succor the plight of the Armenians should be heeded now. A few months more and it may be relief will be too late for those myriads whom only we can save We shall not fail them.

Episcopal board of education. "By the new method, finding the child interested in the church's stained glass windows, we explain these windows and thus teach him stories of the saints and incidents depicted there. This plan is extended indefinitely in similar ways.

"For instance, in the vestments of the priest, we explain that the black stands for separation from the world and white for purity. We also explain that in the colors of the altar hangings and Eucharistic vestments, the purple of Advent is for penitence white at Christmas and Easter for joy, red on saints' days for the blood of the church's martyrs, and the black of Good Friday for death."

#### To Teach Teachers.

The new idea has been started through the organization of a Church Normal school in New York city with a faculty of 14 men and women, who will give a six months' course to 1,671 Episcopal Sunday school teachers of Manhattan. Similar normal schools to prepare teachers for their work throughout the country are being planned as part of the nation-wide campaign of the Episcopal church.

Whereas the training of Sunday school teachers in the past has been largely a matter of chance and the results of their teaching has been more or less uncertain, it is believed that by the new plan definite results can be obtained toward making the Sunday schools much more attractive to children, and their knowledge of the Bible LEWIS B. #### A Child's Logic.

"A school teacher near Richmond, Va., was instructing a class in geography," said the Rev. Dr. W. H. Milton of Wilmington, N. C., in addressing a meeting in the interests of the nation-wide campaign of the Episcopal. church, "She talked about the equator, the different zones and explained the general facts about the elements. To test the impression she had made she asked one little girl to explain why it was that Massachusetts was so much colder than Virginia. The child pondered a moment, and then replied :

"It is this way teacher, Massachusetts is so much further away from the Creator than Virginia."

The nation-wide campaign of the Episcopal church, which in the last few weeks has aroused the interest of all church and social workers in this vicinity, is bringing local church workers into closer touch with the leaders of the church than anything done in recent years. Chief among the church dignituries in the work is the Rt. Rev. Charles P. Anderson, D. D., LL. D., bishop of the diocese of Chicago.

Bishop Anderson was elected chairman of the joint commission on the nation-wide campaign of the Episcopal church at the general convention held in Detroit in October.

The bishop was born in Kemptville, Canada, September 8, 1863, He took his first degree at St. John's college, Toronto, where he was made an archdeacon. His first charge in the United States was as rector in Oak Park, Ill., a suburb of Chicago. He was bishop of the Chicago diocese in 1905, and has been a leader of the church in the middle West since that

In the spring of this year he was leader of the commission which toured Europe in the interest of an international conference of Christian churches.


