



C. L. Bridges, one of Calf Creek's leading young citizens, was in this week to get his name on The Standard's list, and incidentally gave a brief but interesting account of his experiences as one of Uncle Sam's soidiers. Bridges has been back here the past six months or more, and is now engaged in farming in the Calf Creek community.

Three years ago he volunteered as a member of Uncle Sam's Signal Corps, and after training at Fort Leavenworth, Kans., was entrained under sealed orders. The destination proved to be the Panama Canal Zone, where they were stationed throughout the war. The pack mules the Signal Corps took with them, proved useless, being unable to negotiate the steep mountain sides, and steeper river and creek banks. The bearers of burden in the canal zone are chiefly Jamaica burros (about the size of a big jack rabbit, says Bridges) which carry a pack of about 150 pounds. In the dense forests of the interior, where paths are unknown, except those cut by the American soldiers, the natives carry the packs. Bridges says he has been all over the canal zone, Costa Rica and the Republic of Panama. 
