"In all the fifty years I have been in this country I have never seen anything to compare with the season for dryness," said Wm. Bunch a few days ago when discussing the popular subject of the climate. Mr. Bunch is quite an expert on weather conditions in Southern Oregon, and is a much

Bunch says that it is his hunch that this dry spell will continue right on thru the season- or it will commence to rain in March and rain will be the regular thing all summer. He is pretty sure that it will either be very dry

or very wet. "For fifty years I have been preaching the gospel of irrigation," said Mr. Bunch. "When we get irrigation the farmer can quit guessing about when it is going to rain. But it has been a mighty hard game to bring the people to see the need for irrigation. Do you know, that with water for irrigation, any man can make money on five acres of our land. There is no crop that will pay better than berries. I once put in a quarter of an acre of berries, and on the second season had taken \$210 worth from the patch when a man came along and wanted to buy the tract. That is the thing I would be doing right now if I did not have this business on my hands."

SIGHTSEERS SHOULD KEEP OUT OF EUROPE UNTIL PEOPLE GET ON FEET AGAIN.

BAPTISTS ENLARGE WORK

Mission Secretary Will Recommend How Evangelistic, Educational and Benevolent Program Can Be Carried Out.

Americans should keep out of Europe, unless they have important business there, until Europeans have had an opportunity to get on their feet again, declares Dr. J. F. Love, secretary of the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Dr. Love, as chairman of a commis sion named by the Baptist 75 Million Campaign to visit Europe and make a survey of the mission fields there, has just returned from a five-months' tour of the continent. He says Americans have distributed cash with such a lav ish hand in many places on the continent that the people have become con vinced that every American has money to throw away and as soon as they spot a citizen from this country they proceed to overcharge him for everything he buys and every service rendered. Unless Americans forego sight-seeing in Europe for a few years a lot of the natives there will become professional beggars, in Dr. Love's

Baptists Suffered Heavily.

Along with the other religious denominations Baptists suffered heavy losses of property in Europe during the war. Dr. Love reports, but he found that such Baptists as survived the war remained loyal to their convictions and they are now ready to welcome the aid and co-operation of American Baptists in the rehabilitation of their countries and the propagation of the gospel.

From the contact formed with the Baptists of the chief countries of Europe by these representatives of the uthern Baptist Convention, Dr. Love believes there will ultimately be formed a co-operative alignment of the Baptists of the world that will make them larger factors in world evangefization than they have ever been be-

Carry on Relief Work.

While the program which Southern Baptists will carry on in the European countries which they have not occupied before will not be determined un til after the commission has reported to the Foreign Mission Board, members of the commission found crying need for money with which to meet cases demanding immediate relief and cabled connection in northern France and Belgium. This money was promptly forwarded and has been distributed conjunction with the Foreign Mission-Convention. Prior to the visit of this commission, missionary work by Southern Baptists in Europe has been confined to Italy and Bohemia. However, the commission visited England, Scotland, France, Belgium, Holland and Italy, but found it impossible to get into Czecho-Slovakia, the Balkans and Russia at this time.

Palestine and Egypt Visited.

After the tour of Europe had been completed, the commission, which included Dr. Z. T. Cody, editor of the Baptist Courier, of Greenville, S. C., and Dr. Everett Gill, formerly missionary to Italy, but now a pastor in Kansas City, went to Palestine to look into the missionary work there, formerly done by the Baptists of Southern Illinois, but recently taken over by the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. A trip into Egypt for the purpose of studying the Moham medan situation was made by the party while awaiting a ship on which to re turn to Italy. So far, Christianity has made very little inroad on Mchamme danism anywhere. Dr. Love found hough some of the missionary azercies in Palestine have been established for more than a half century. He antici pates a better chance for the Christian religion there, following British occupation of that country.

Establish Orphanage in Rome.

from the native Christians in the various mission fields to the 75 Million Campaign, many improvements on those fields have been made possible. Among the enlargements already pro vided for are an orphanage in Rome, the addition of a girls' department at Rio College in Brazil, and land for a girls' school at Sao Paulo, Brazil.

The Interior China Mission was asked for \$7,500 for the campaign, and the missionaries there subscribed this But if the normal course were much of alone, while the native converts added \$4,500. The North China Mission has subscribed \$50,000, while Brazil will respond with nearly \$1,000,000. In South Brazil the campaign as it was carried on in the South, was duplicated with all the special days and other extraordinary efforts and the response is far beyond the anticipations of the Foreign Mission Board. In Argentina. the quota asked was \$75,000, while the returns from that country have already

In Crude Form That Weapon Was Employed Centuries Before the Coming of Christ.

The earliest use of deleterious gases in siege warfare is recorded in the history of the Peloponnesian wars from 431 404 B. C. During this struggle between the Athenians and Spartans and their respective allies the cities of Palatea and Delium were besieged. Wood saturated with pitch and sulphur was set on fire and burned under the walls of these cities in order to generate choking and poisonous fumes, which would stupefy the defenders and make the task of attacking forces less difficult. Another form of the same method of attack used about this date was to fill a caldron with molten pitch, sulphur and burning charcoal, and to blow the fumes with the aid of a primitive form of bellows and air-

blast over the defenders' lines. Greek-fire, about which much was heard in the wars of the middle ages, was a liquid, the composition of which is now unknown, that was spurted through the air, chiefly in sea fights, in order to set fire to the ships of the enemy, and it was used by the Byzantine Greeks at the sieges of Constantinople in the years 1261 and 1412.

INSECT POWDER GROWN HERE

Americans Lost No Time In Developing Industry Once the Secret Was Discovered.

In our grandfathers' day the so called Persian insect powder (commonly sold nowadays under the name of "pyrethrum") cost \$16 a pound. Pretty dear for a bug-killer. The stuff was a mystery. Beyond the fact that it was of a vegetable na-

ture, nobody knew what it was. As a matter of fact, it came from Transcaucasia, where its production was a very important industry. For centuries it had been widely used in Asiatic countries, and the source of the material was a secret carefully

Eventually the secret was revealed by an Armenian merchant, who, traveling through Transcaucasia, discovered that the insect powder was simply the ground-up flower-heads of a plant nearly related to our own field

Later on, attempts were made to introduce the plant in the United States, but the seeds refused to sprout. This (as finally ascertained) was due to the circumstance that the persons from whom they were bought had baked

At the present time we grow all our own insect powder in California.

Heavy Penalties in Law.

For failing to make a return on time the penalty is a fine of not more than \$1,000 and an addition of 25 per cent to the tax, if any. For making a fals or fraudulent return the penalty is a I can safely rest my candidacy upon my past record. Many Sources of Income.

Aside from what one may earn by his services, there are many other sources of income. If he sold any property during 1919 he must figure out the gain realized. If he rented buildings, land, apartments or rooms such rents must be concidered taxaable, and he may claim deductions for necessary expenses incidental to rents

Bank interest is a common source of income and is taxable whether withdrawn or not. Any amount of interest credited to a depositor is income to the depositor.

Interest on mortgages and notes is taxable; also bond interest received from corporations.

A taxpayer who cashed his insurance during 1919 must report as income any excess received over the total of premiums paid

Members of partnerships or personal service corporations or beneficiaries of an estate or trust must report their shares of income distributable to them whether or not actually withdrawn. Dividends of domestic corporations

"What! The last dentist I went to, must be reported. Many other forms he only charged me fifty cents, and of income are taxable, unless specifically exempted.

INCOME_TAX IS DUE MARCH 15

Penalties for Delay and Failure to Make Returns-Early Compliance Urged.

All income tax returns covering the year 1919 must be filed by Monday, March 15. Each taxable return must be accompanied by check or money order for the full amount or at least onequarter of the amount of tax due. Cash payments are accepted only at

the collector's main office; if sent by mail, they are at the sender's risk. Residents of Texas should file their returns with, and make payments of Income Tax to, Alexander S. Walker, Collector of Internal Revenue, Austin,

Those who must file returns but have not done so are warned that the revenue law imposes heavy penalties for failure to get returns in on time or to make payments on time.

Early filing and early payments are urged, in order to relieve the internal revenue offices as much as possible of an overload on the final day, March 15
