UNPRECEDENTED BUILDING AND IMPROVEMENT ACTIVITY IN BRADY

DESPITE HIGH COST OF LUMBER, LABOR AND BUILDING MATERIAL, GREATER PROGRAM OF BUILDING CARRIED OUT THAN EVER BEFORE IN HISTORY.

Brady is now in the midst of a One Hundred Thousand dollar building program—and before the year is out, these figures are certain to be swelled to around a quarter of a million dollars. There is greater building activity in the Brady section now than has ever before been known at one period. Every contractor has building contracts for months ahead, and every carpenter, mason, painter and artisan is employed, with additional skilled labor of every class in great demand. The high price of lumber, labor and building material has no terror for Brady citizens, and the supply of all three of these commodities is falling far short of the demand.

The following is a brief synopsis of new buildings, improvements and remodeling now in progress or being completed by three of Brady's leading contractors. In it are not included the work of independent contractors or carpenters, nor much building and improving of a minor nature, which will run easily up into the thousands of dollars additional. Also there is a vast amount of brick and concrete work, painting and improving which does not show up in the figures presented.

Contractor W. W. Wilder's report:

Dr. Granville Residence.

Finishing touches are now being put upon the Dr. J. B. Granville residence, which has been remodeled and enlarged at a cost of \$3,500. The improvements include the addition of a dining room, kitchen, hall, pantry and commodious glassed-in sun parlor, size 15x30, with fire place. The new rooms are finished throughout with beaver board in panel effect, and make this home one of the most attractive and comfortable in the city.

Wulff's Garage.

The F. R. Wulff garage is undergoing improvement and remodeling at an expenditure of about \$2,000. The improvements include a new driveway and entrance, with partition walls, the building of a mezzanine floor, 12x50 ft., and the rearrangement and enlargement of the parts and accessories department, which now occupies the front corner of the building, where it is readily accessible to autoists when driving in or stopping at the garage. The changes

will not only make for added floor space and convenience, but will also increase the car storage space more than 100 per cent. The improvements conform in design and finish to the original building.

THOUSAND DOLLARS OF RINGS STOLEN FROM BROWNWOOD STORE. Robbery that is mysterious to its details occurred in the Armstrong Jewelry company night or Saturday morning became known today, and so the details that promises to unravel very has been found. The value of the stolen gems is eight thousand dollars, according to the wholesale prices of the jewelry company. The robbery was noted at about five Saturday afternoon, when a diamond ring was asked to see the diamond rings, which were set with diamonds and others having less expensive settings, had been placed in the safe at ten o'clock Friday when the store was closed. The manner of its disappearance was ascertained. The three diamonds of its disappearance, according to those who are familiar with the circumstances, are that some one hidden in the store Friday night took the case of rings from the store that the case was stolen Saturday morning while stock was being taken from the safe; or that it was taken during the early business hours by some one who walked into the store with it unnoticed, containing a number of loose

diamonds was left untouched in the safe. Two of the stolen rings contained very valuable diamonds, each weighing approximately one and one-half carats and valued at more than \$1,000 each. A complete list of all the stolen rings has been prepared and will be given to the jewelers of the state as well as the police in the various cities. The Armstrong Jewelry company sustained a considerable loss four years ago when, early Sunday morning, some one smashed the show window of the establishment and made way with several watches and other articles which had been left in the window overnight.—Brownwood Bulletin.

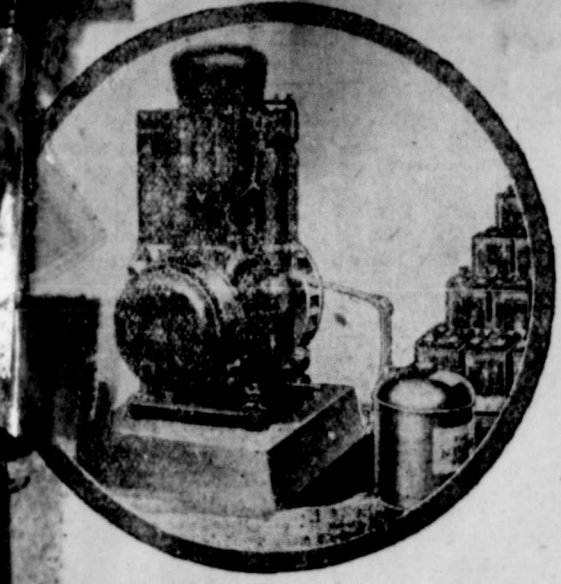

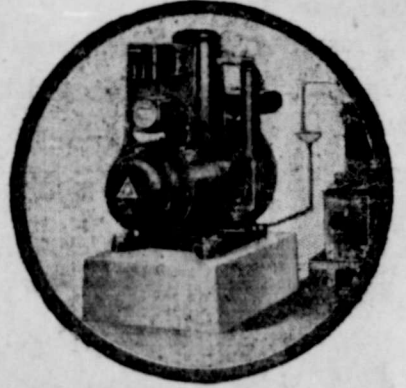

PATRIOTISM RUNNING LOW.

Only the banks in Ballinger observed San Jacinto day Wednesday. The banks closed and the employes no doubt enjoyed a day of leisure or diversion from daily routine work.

Schools and all business was carried on as usual and not a flag waved over the city to remind Texans that eighty-four years ago on this day General Sam Houston cleaned up with a bunch of "spiks" and paved the way for the establishing of the republic on the map.

The lack of interest cannot be charged to the lack of time. It was not a busy day in commercial circles, not so busy but what a pause could not have been made for some observance of one of the greatest days in the history of the Lone Star state.

Some of the neighboring towns suspended business, schools closed and public gatherings, speaking and music making was the order of the program. By this the coming generation is taught a lesson of patriotism for the cause for which our forefathers met death.

It was on this day in 1836 that Gen. Sam Houston met and defeated an army of Mexicans which outnumbered the Texans by large odds. The scrap took place on the banks of San Jacinto Bayou, not very far from the site of what is now Houston. Gen. Houston's forces numbered only about six or seven hundred, but they routed Santa Anna and his big army of cutthroats and captured Santa Anna.

The Texans in that battle made it possible for the brightest star on the flag to shine today. The Mexicans had butchered Fannin and his force at Goliad and had stormed the Alamo—wiping out the garrison at that place, but the San Jacinto band proved too much for the Mexicans and they were made to retreat across the Rio Grande, and the day is one which should be kept fresh in the minds of all Texans.

It was later when Houston was made first president of the Republic of Texas. Ballinger Banner-Ledger.

RICHLAND SPRINGS TEAM CLEANS UP ON BRADY IN STAR GAME OF SEASON

In the best exhibition of the national sport so far had on the local diamonds this season, Richland Springs won from Brady Wednesday afternoon by a score of 5 to 4. A high wind blowing marred the game to the extent of increasing the percentage of errors, but the game was interesting from start to finish. Brady started off with a lead of two runs in the first inning, and added another tally in the third and still another in the fifth. For a time it appeared they had Richland Springs bested, but that aggregation got together in the fourth inning and scored two runs. In the sixth, they scored one more, and in the seventh, two more.

Richland Springs' first two scores were due to weakening on the part of Cook, pitcher for Brady. Up to this time, Cook pitched a star game, but having been out of training for two years, he lost control, and delivered some three or four bases on balls, not only filling the bases but forcing in at least one run. At that, the losing of the game is attributable equally to untimely errors on the part of other members of the team.

Ell Harkrider, Brady high school star pitcher supplanted Cook in the ninth inning and covered himself with glory by striking out three of Richland's heaviest sluggers—three men up, three men down. Brady failed to retrieve herself in the last half of the ninth, and Richland Springs carried off the honors of the day.

Richland Springs has a splendid team, many of them veterans of the game. Their pitcher threw a wonderful game, getting stronger the longer the game ran. He possessed wonderful control, had a wicked curve and burnt the air with his speed.

H. S. Coleman umpired the game and, upon the whole, gave satisfaction. One of his decisions that counted heavily against Brady was the calling of a foul on "Casey" Yeager in the 7th, the ball lighting well within the 3rd-base line, but bouncing out behind the foul flag.

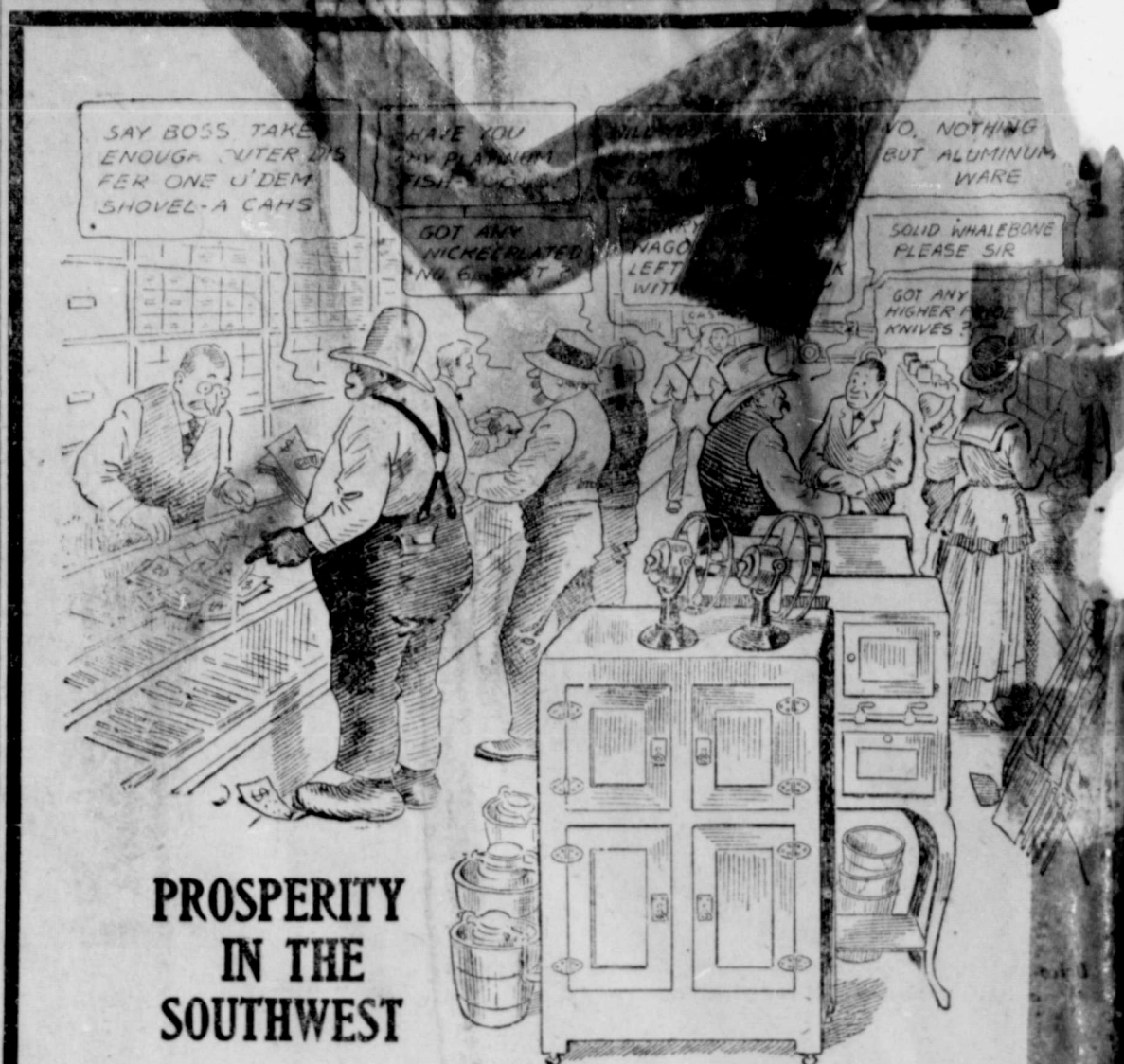

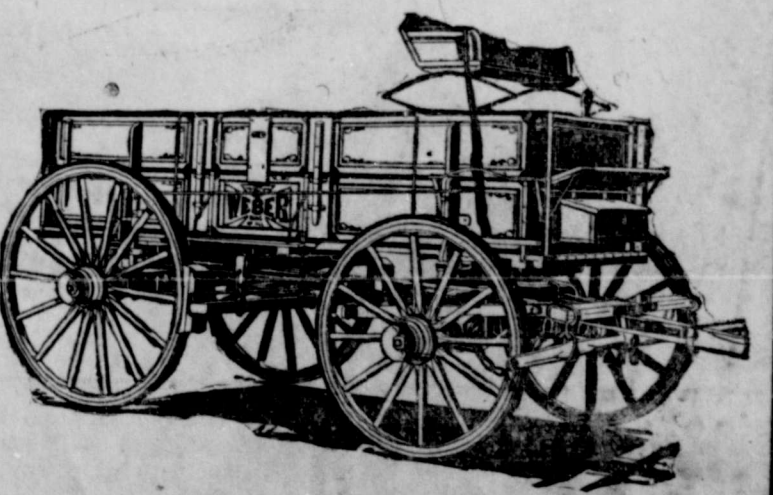

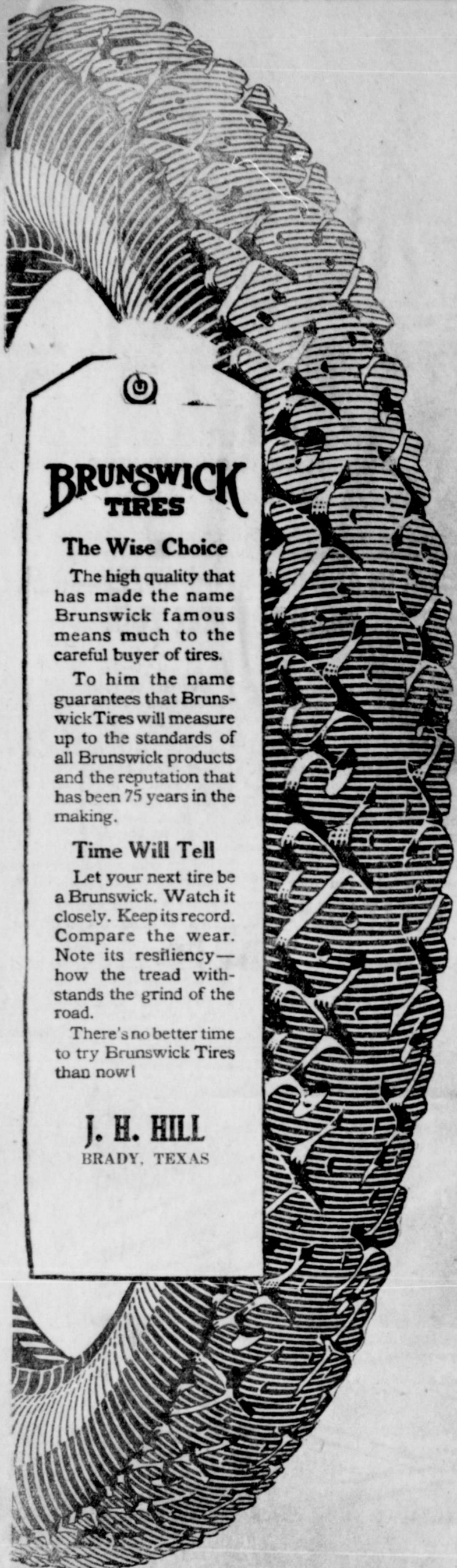

INDIA HOME OF TREE FERN

In That Country the Plant Attains the Dignity of a Splendid, Full-Grown Tree.

When we visit a botanical garden and behold specimens of palms and ferns so luxuriant that their crowns nearly touch the glass-domed conservatory, we rarely pause to realize that in their native haunts these tropical plants are trees. At Darjeeling, India, for instance, is the tree fern found in its greatest glory. The first few miles of the 2-foot gauge railway journey from Calcutta passes through a dense jungle, with a vegetation of tropical luxuriance. Grass is 15 feet deep, cane stalks rise 50 and 60 feet high, while from the feathery foliage of the tree fern peacocks and birds-of-paradise lift their haughty heads in their topmost fronds. As one runs along in the little first-class carriage which weighs under two tons, he realizes that the tree fern and all the other luxuriant foliage in this impenetrable jungle, shields the home of the tiger, rhinoceros, panther and wild hog.

There are no tree ferns in the United States, but 30 specimens or more are found in the higher altitudes of the West Indies, and many more occur in other tropical regions. In some portions of the mountains of Jamaica, tree ferns form half or more of the forest vegetation, their trunks varying from 6 to 60 feet in height.

BEAUTIFUL IN ITS COLORING

Green Warbler Remarkable Even Among American Birds for the Gorgeousness of Its Plumage.

Some birds get very nervous and become much excited if you approach their nests, and among them is the black-throated green warbler, says the American Forestry association. Another thing about this bird is that it frequently builds several nests. Whether this is because it changed its mind after building the first one and decided to select a better location or with the deliberate purpose of deceiving any intruders who might come along is not known. The bird is very beautifully colored, the top of its head and the region nearly down to the shoulders being a yellow green, the back olive green, the throat and breast jet black and the under parts white with some yellow in them at times.

If you are out bird hunting and are looking for that member of the warbler known as the pine warbler, you will be most likely to find it, as the name implies, in a pine grove. In fact it is seldom found outside of such localities. The bird is rather quiet in its manners and does not move about from one spot to another with as much fuss as do many birds. Like the creeper it has the habit of creeping about among the branches of the trees. It is greenish yellow above and brighter below, with two white wing bars and with white spots on its outer tail feathers.

Plants Demand Cold.

After the period of growth in spring and summer there is a period of dormancy before the cold weather sets in, and if plants are maintained artificially at a high temperature this dormant period persists. Exposure to cold is needed to activate the plant for another period of growth. Perhaps the liberation of enzymes acts on the stored starches, converting them into sugars, or the phenomenon may be due to a change in the permeability of the cell-membrane. Though normally the stimulus required for a renewal of growth is supplied by cold, mechanical injury or a period of drying may have the same effect. The process occurs independently in any exposed part of a plant, so that if one or two branches of a plant be kept continually warm while the other is subjected to the usual winter chilling, the former will not develop on the return of summer temperature, though the latter develops as usual.

Fishing Superstitions.

The salmon fisheries of California used to be responsible for a queer custom on the part of the Indians. Every spring they would "dance for salmon." If the fish did not appear with the celerity deemed appropriate, there would be employed a "wise man" who made an image of a swimming fish which was placed in the water in the hope of attracting live fish to the bait. The Japanese fishermen have the quaint notion that silence must be observed, and even the women left at home are not permitted to talk lest the fish should hear and disapprove. Among the members of the primitive race of Ainus, the first fish caught is brought in through a window instead of a door, so that the other fish "may not see."

Cruel Chinese Custom.

There is a cruel custom which prevails in some districts in South China in time of drought. A large collection of brass locks is made, and each is marked with a Chinese character. One iron lock is added to the pile, and duplicate slips are distributed among the male population of the villages. The unfortunate man whose slip holds the same writing on it as the iron lock must have a slit made in the front of his throat and through this the bar of the iron lock is passed. He is considered to be in some way the cause of the drought and must wear this lock until it rains. Blood poisoning often carries the victim off before the drought is broken.

Kindergarten Helps for Parents

This is No. 35 of a series of articles issued by the National Kinder-
garten Association. They will appear weekly in these columns.

The child is a primitive little being. His desires are near the surface, and primarily very selfish. He wants all things for his own. He must also be first in everything, and, if he is the biggest force in the play group, what more natural than that he should try to make everything conform to his wishes? But this child, if once actuated by the right, becomes the most generous, the most considerate and the gentlest of little fellows. A few words, a firm but kind insistence on your part, and he knows the pleasure of giving up for others.

All children have their difficulties with one another, and sometimes, if one judges by the noise in the backyard, they are very big ones.

A moment's wait will usually show whether it is wise to run and help the children readjust their little world. Do this only when necessary. Hold your breath behind the door, and see if happily they are not righting the situation themselves. Even the physical hurts need much less sympathy than the average mother is apt to bestow. Would we coddle our children into becoming physical cowards? From earliest babyhood, begin to turn their attention when hurt to some new interest, and observe how quickly the pain is forgotten.

As a child grows out of the first years of my mother's greatest service a mother can do her child is to teach him self-reliance. If you begin with the baby, the habit forms easily and before you know it self-reliance has really become a habit with him. Hold yourself free from fear as he tries out his growing powers. Watch alertly, but wait. Let him try the reach that may topple him over, but secure for him the bright ball. Let him make all the moves he wants to, and if necessary, be there to catch him as he falls. Hesitate long before you turn a child deliberately away from the thing he has set his heart on doing. Strong initiative is too glorious a characteristic to nip in the bud. Try for one day to stop and think before you deprive your child of the pleasure of simple achievement.

There are countless little tasks a child can do for himself to help mother. Each mother will think of many of these in the course of a day. Remember that in the child's world of new impressions the most trite acts to us are to him, the most delightful of plays.

Play is the vital employment of childhood. The art of playing alone, being friends with himself, is a foundation for self-reliance in greater things later in life. A child cannot be more than contented. So hesitate, dear mother, to interfere when your child is quietly employing himself in his own chosen way, even if it is only baby with his toes. Let the

spell last as long as it will; the next will last longer. Soon your child of three will play hours by himself. The busy mother often needs this respite.
