EDD BROAD BUYS DICK MARSDEN PLACE WEST OF BRADY ON COLEMAN ROAD

Edd Broad last week closed a deal for the purchase from Dick Marsden of the 45-acre tract lying one-half west of Brady at the turn of the Coleman road. The property extends west to the T. J. Wood place and south to Brady creek, lying on both sides, the water rights to Brady creek being included in the transfer. In addition, Mr. Broad yesterday acquired from A. B. Stobaugh the property formerly occupied by the latter's laundry. This tract adjoins the Marsden land on the east and extends to the Coleman road bridge. Mr. Broad states that he is planning on converting his new purchase into a model suburban residence, and will erect a comfortable six-room cottage on the property, work on which will begin within the next two months. The property is ideally located for this purpose, and in addition to the water rights, the land includes pasture and farm land and pecan timber, all of which make it of especial attraction and value.

HOWELL & HYDE TEST ON CAPPS TRACT TO SPUD IN

No time has been lost in rigging up the Howell & Hyde test on the Matthew Capps 7,000-acre tract 13 miles north of Brady, and C. W. Purcell, superintendent of operations, expects to spud in the well by Saturday. The rig, a 28 Star, which arrived here just ten days ago, has been rigged up; the bunk house has been completed, and the water lines are ready. The drill will be making hole next week. The well will be drilled on the southwest corner of Survey No. 734, and midway between and on a line with the Day and White producers.

D. W. Franchot & Co. of Tulsa, Okla., are completing arrangements to drill their 160 acre tract offsetting Thad O. Day well No. 1 on the north. J. H. Mook spent the past week here representing the company, and completing arrangements. Mr. Mook was greatly impressed with the production of Day No. 1, and the Franchot company is expected to be in the drilling game here within a very short time.

Thad O. Day No. 3 has about completed underreaming about 25 ft. to reset the top casing to shut off water. The hole has been drilled to a depth of 550 ft. It is expected the well will resume running tour the end of the week.

C. S. Thomas well at Whiteland has completed the pulling of 8 1-4 inch casing to reset. At Salt Gap, the crew is underreaming to shut off water.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

- New England Baked Dinner.
- 2 pounds corned beef
- 1 small head cabbage
- 6 small turnips
- 6 small carrots
- 6 small beets
- Potatoes.

Wipe the meat and tie securely in shape. Put in a kettle and cover with cold water, bring slowly to the boiling point, boil for a few minutes, remove scum and reduce heat. Finish cooking at a lower temperature. Remove to hot platter and cook the vegetables in the liquid from which the meat has been removed. If too salty add hot water. Too much salt will wilt the vegetables and spoil the flavor. The beets should be cooked separately or canned beets may be used.

To serve: Place the meat in the center of the platter and arrange around it border of the various vegetables. Sprinkle with chopped parsley or garnish with sprigs of parsley. The head of cabbage should be put in eighths after cooking.

Pot Roast of Mutton With Currant Mint Sauce.

2½ pounds mutton (plate) Seasoning.

Wipe meat, sprinkle with salt and pepper, place on rack in dripping pan, and dredge meat and bottom of pan with flour. Bake in hot oven for 2 hours, basting frequently with butter or butter substitute. Serve with currant mint sauce.

Currant Mint Sauce. Separate 2½ tumbler of currant jelly in pieces, but do not beat it. Add one to two tablespoonfuls finely chopped mint leaves and shavings from an orange rind. Serve around roast.

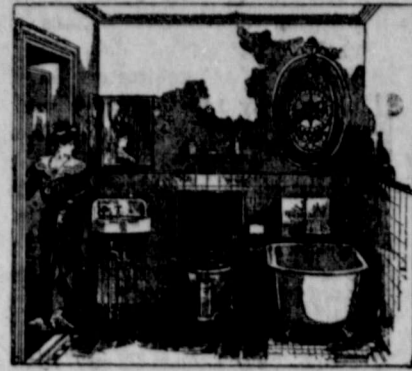

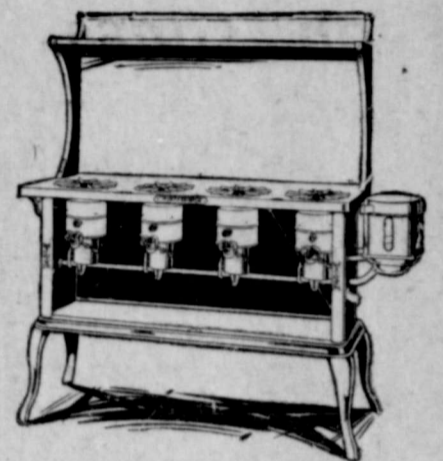

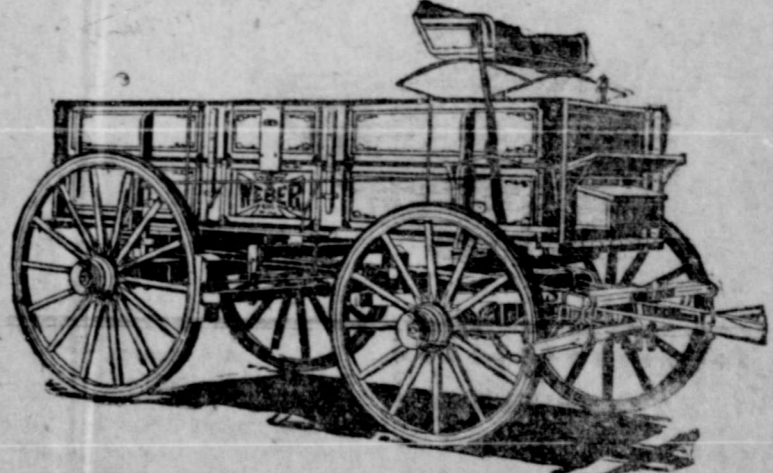

JACK LEWIS, FORMER RESIDENT OF BRADY, LOSES LIFE IN DALLAS TRAGEDY

Jack Lewis, former Brady boy, who was employed in the show business with Messrs. Levy and Morton some eight or ten years ago, and whose parents at that time operated one of Brady's hotels, met death Sunday morning at Dallas in an auto accident. News of the tragedy was contained in a message received by friends of the family here yesterday.

The Dallas News gives the following account of the fatal accident:

"An automobile smashup at the 'S' turn on the Lemmon Avenue road just north of Park Lane about 3:30 o'clock yesterday morning resulted in the death of one man and one woman and serious injury to two men and a woman. The party was hastening to the city following a fight at the Southern Chicken Farm, during which several persons had been injured. The dead:

"MRS. ALMA FEARIS, 27 years old, whose parents live in Sherman.

"JACK LEWIS, 29 years old, who has relatives at Lewis, near San Antonio.

"Mr. Lewis, who lived at the Adolphus Hotel, died on the way to the sanitarium.

"The injured:
"Miss Billie Wilson, who was driving the wrecked automobile and who was painfully cut and bruised about the head and body.

"Billy Skaggs, traveling salesman, son of John Skaggs, a merchant of Winters, skull fractured.

"Maud Thompson, 1500 Ross avenue, broken leg and fractured skull.

"The body of Mrs. Fearis was sent to Sherman, the home of her mother, Mrs. W. Beatty, yesterday afternoon for burial, and that of Lewis will be sent to San Antonio. The injured are under treatment at local sanitariums and were reported last night to have good chances for recovery.

"Mr. Lewis, whose face and body were badly disfigured, was first taken to the Emergency Hospital for first aid. From there he was being removed to a sanitarium, but died on the way.

"Deputy Constable Roy Robinson, who was attracted to the scene of the fight as he was passing, said he drove his motorcycle to the house and took seven pistols from men in the crowd there.

"Before F. H. Alexander, Justice of the Peace for Precinct No. 1, an investigation was conducted yesterday afternoon by P. P. Ballowe, Assistant District Attorney, into the details of the fight preceding the tragedy. Following the hearing Mr. Ballowe announced that the investigation will be continued. No arrests were made.

"In an account of the accident given by Miss Wilson, who lives at 1500 Ross avenue, she said that she had started back to Dallas from the poultry farm and was approaching a concrete bridge at the 'S' turn when she was confronted by a smaller automobile. She could not avoid both the automobile and bridge, she said, so she chose the bridge, directing her car into the concrete bridge rail.

"Mr. Skaggs' father and mother were on their way to Dallas from Winters last night and other relatives were en route from Lampasas. They are expected to reach Dallas this morning."

Dallas, May 12.—Robert Broadnax, proprietor of the Southern Poultry farm, a road resort near Dallas, was arraigned before United States Commissioner Davidson yesterday on a charge of violating the federal prohibition act. He was released on \$1,000 bond to appear before the federal grand jury May 4.

Charges were filed against Broadnax following a fight at the Southern Poultry farm between patrons of the place last Saturday night. Bottles that had contained liquor were said to have been found in the vicinity of the place after the fight, in which several persons were injured. Two persons were killed while being rushed to town following the fight when their automobile struck a bridge.

STATE FAILS TO SECURE DELAY IN J. CALLAN TRIAL

Llano, Texas, May 11.—Presenting himself for trial here Tuesday on a charge of murder in connection with the killing of Victor Billings at Menard, Nov. 12, James Callan, twice president of the Cattle Raisers' Association of Texas, was faced with a motion for a continuance by attorneys for the State. District Judge N. T. Stubbs is presiding.

The defense insists that the trial be had now. The State contends that Guadalupe Garsea and Dr. J. V. Guiton are material witnesses and that diligence has been exercised in a search for them and that they cannot be located.

Dr. Guiton lives in Hidalgo county and Garsea is supposed to be in Brown county.

Said He Examined Horse.

The State is not required on its first motion for a continuance to state the nature of the testimony supposed to be obtained from the absent witnesses. It is understood, however, that Dr. Guiton examined the horse upon which Billings was riding when slain and will testify regarding wounds on the animal.

Judge Moses in pleading for the immediate trial of the case denied that the State had used diligence in seeking the two men and charged that they were not material witnesses.

Callan, he said, has waived all technicalities and has been ready for trial ever since the indictment was

returned at Menard, March 31. Motion Overruled.

Judge Stubbs overruled the motion for a continuance by the State and ordered examination of the veniremen to proceed.

Llano is filled with visitors for the trial. Callan and his chief counsel, Dayton Moses, former district attorney for this district, have been here for a week. E. B. Spiller, secretary of the Cattle Raisers' Association of Texas, also is here as are more than a hundred cattlemen from all parts of Texas.

Moses will be assisted by S. C. Rowe of the firm of Moses & Rowe, Judge Clarence Martin, former district judge and district attorney for this district; W. C. Linden, former district attorney for this district; Frank Hartgraves of Menard, Representative T. J. Martin of Fredericksburg and J. H. McLean and F. J. Johnson of Llano.

District Attorney George Christian is leading the prosecution and he is being assisted by Representative M. E. Blackburn of Junction, W. H. Blanton of Gonzales and Eugene Dalrymple of Llano.

C. R. Billings of Nopal, in DeWitt county, father of Victor Billings; Mrs. Billings, widow of Victor Billings, and T. J. Asher of Karnes county, father of Mrs. Victor Billings, are attending the trial.

200 BARRELS FROM SANTA ANNA WELL - WILL SHOOT WELL

Santa Anna, Tex., May 11.—The Gladys Belle well is making 200 barrels of oil a day, according to Supt. Earl Livingstone, who stated today that he will shoot the well to increase the flow.

Acresage prices have increased in the last twenty-four hours and some lease holders are placing drilling contracts. The land is changing hands at from \$25 to \$150 an acre, according to the distance from the well. This practically doubles the price the day after the discovery of oil.

The first big boom of the Santa Anna publicity campaign will break at the end of the week. It is understood that the chamber of commerce will buy space in all the big dailies to tell oil fans what has happened.

The Texas Best Refinery company is contemplating its two-story office here, owning some of the best holdings in the field with some land very near the well. It is understood that it will place a drilling contract within the next few days. C. P. Guess is president of this organization.

Drilling rigs of several of the larger companies are said to be on the way to the field. Some have held leases here for the last five years, and are thought to be ready to develop them. Numbers of drilling contracts are being held up because contractors are unable to bring machinery into the field.
