ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING OF BRADY CHAMBER COMMERCE, 25TH

A. W. COOPER BUYS ADDITIONAL McCULLOCH ACREAGE—TO DRILL 1,000 FOOT TEST

The McCulloch Land Company has purchased a tract of 600 acres in the northern part of the country and a 1,000-foot test will be put down immediately. A. W. Cooper, who recently brought in a new shallow field in McCulloch county, made the purchase.

The Gladys Bell well in Coleman county is immediately north of these holdings and is now producing about 200 barrels of oil daily.—Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

OVER 200,000 POUNDS WOOL IN STORAGE WITH NO BUYERS; MARKET DEMORALIZED

The Sheep and Goat Growers association of McCulloch county has something like a quarter million pounds of wool in storage in Brady, with no market and no buyers. The bulk of this wool is stored with the Mayhew Produce company of this city. Some two or three weeks ago the market went to pieces, because of strikes in the east, freight embargoes and transportation difficulties. Coupled with this array of physical demoralization, is the claim that loan money in the east has risen to a basis of 7 1-2 and 8 per cent.

A month or so ago, raw wool was selling around 60c to 70c a pound, and there was much speculation concerning the possibility of wool going to \$1.00 per pound. Closely following came a drop of about 50% in market quotations in wool, and all buyers in this section of the country threw up their hands and left for back east.

At this time it is impossible to obtain offers from buyers, and there is nothing left for the wool growers to do, but to sit steady in the boat and await a more favorable tide in events. Wool is a mighty fine asset and is worth as much as it ever was, even though there is no present market for the product.

H. C. CUMMINS DANGEROUSLY WOUNDED BY REVOLVER BULLET THURS. EVE

J. D. BLACKBURN DOES SHOOTING, OUTCOME OF DISPUTE OF SEVERAL MONTHS' STANDING—BULLET PIERCES LEFT SHOULDER, JUST ABOVE HEART.

H. C. Cummins, prominent citizen of the Dodge community, is at the local sanitarium at the point of death, as a result of being shot through the left shoulder by J. D. Blackburn at 4:15 o'clock yesterday evening. The weapon used is reported to have been a revolver, the bullet entering the left shoulder just above the heart and piercing the left lung. Physicians were hurriedly summoned, and Mr. Cummins' condition was at once pronounced critical.

The tragedy occurred at the fence separating the places of Mr. Cummins and Mr. Blackburn. There had been bad feeling between the two men over some misunderstanding last fall. Mr. Cummins was chopping cotton at the time, and Mr. Blackburn was running his cultivator. Following the tragic shooting, Mr. Cummins was carried to his home, and medical aid was hastily summoned. Mr. Cummins was reported in great agony, and was gasping for breath. It was decided to bring him in at

once to the local sanitarium.

DAY CONTRACTS COMPLETION WELL NO. 2 AND DRILLING OF WELL NO. 4

BOB LITTLEMAN, WELL-KNOWN DRILLER, SHIPPING IN STAR RIG FROM BROOKSMITH FOR OPERATIONS—DAY WELL NO. 3 SHOWING BOTH OIL AND GAS.

Thad O. Day announces the letting of a contract to Bob Littleman, well-known driller of Brownwood, for the completion of well No. 2 on the Dutton tract. Mr. Littleman has been operating recently in the Trickham section, and brought in the McGee gas well near Brownwood within the past few weeks. Littleman is well known throughout this section, having operated in McCulloch county up to about a year ago, and is accounted one of the best and safest drillers in this part of Texas. He will load out his machinery, including a Star rig, from Brooksmith for immediate shipment here, and operations should be in progress again on No. 2 within a week's time.

Day well No. 2 was shut down at 670 feet, and the rig skidded to location No. 3 a couple months ago awaiting the clearing up of a dispute over ownership of the well. With the formation of the \$960,000 Day-Daley Petroleum Co., which has taken over the entire 2,080 acre Hall-Dutton tract for development, all legal tangles have been cleared up, and well No. 2 will now be drilled to completion. Immediately following the completion of this well, Driller Littleman will spud in well No. 4, the location selected being 350 ft. west of producer No. 1.

Reports from Thad O. Day well

No. 1, the original producing well, are that production is holding up as usual in this well, the oil being used for drilling on well No. 3.

No. 3 is occasioning much interest among oil men by reason of showing heads of oil and gas at intervals. Underreaming is in progress on this well at 880 ft. to overcome a bad cave which has filled the hole with about 100 ft. of caving. This well was drilled to a depth of about 1,000 ft., and had just struck a new sand at this depth, when the cave occurred.

The Texas-Meers well on the Hargroves tract in Concho county has just finished a bad fishing job, and is drilling again at about 600 ft.

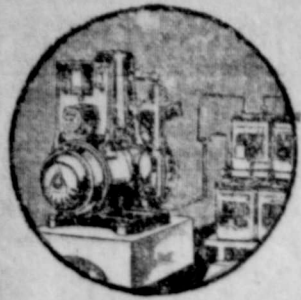

Torrential rains had fallen. The boy, anxious to watch Donahue creek rise, left his home at Bartlett. There he discovered 600 feet of trackage had been washed away.

Swings Sweater to Save Train.

Less than a mile away he saw the approaching flyer. He knew the train would plunge into 12 feet of water unless it could be stopped.

Pulling off his little red sweater, the boy raced up the track. Frantically he waved the danger signal. The engineer thought the lad was playing. But when the speeding train came within a few feet of the boy, who still remained on the track, his screams unheard, the man in the cab flung on the brakes.

The lad jumped just as the train came within a few feet of him. The engine stopped just seven feet from where the trackage had been washed away.

Passengers swarmed about the boy, making up a purse which totaled \$5000. The railroad announced it would add its check for \$1000 to the fund.

"Gosh, I didn't do nuthin'," Roy told the passengers who crowded about him. "I saw the guy do that in a movie, that's how I knowed what to do."

The youthful hero was later confined to his bed, physicians explaining the fear he felt as the engine kept coming toward him without stopping had caused a nervous breakdown.

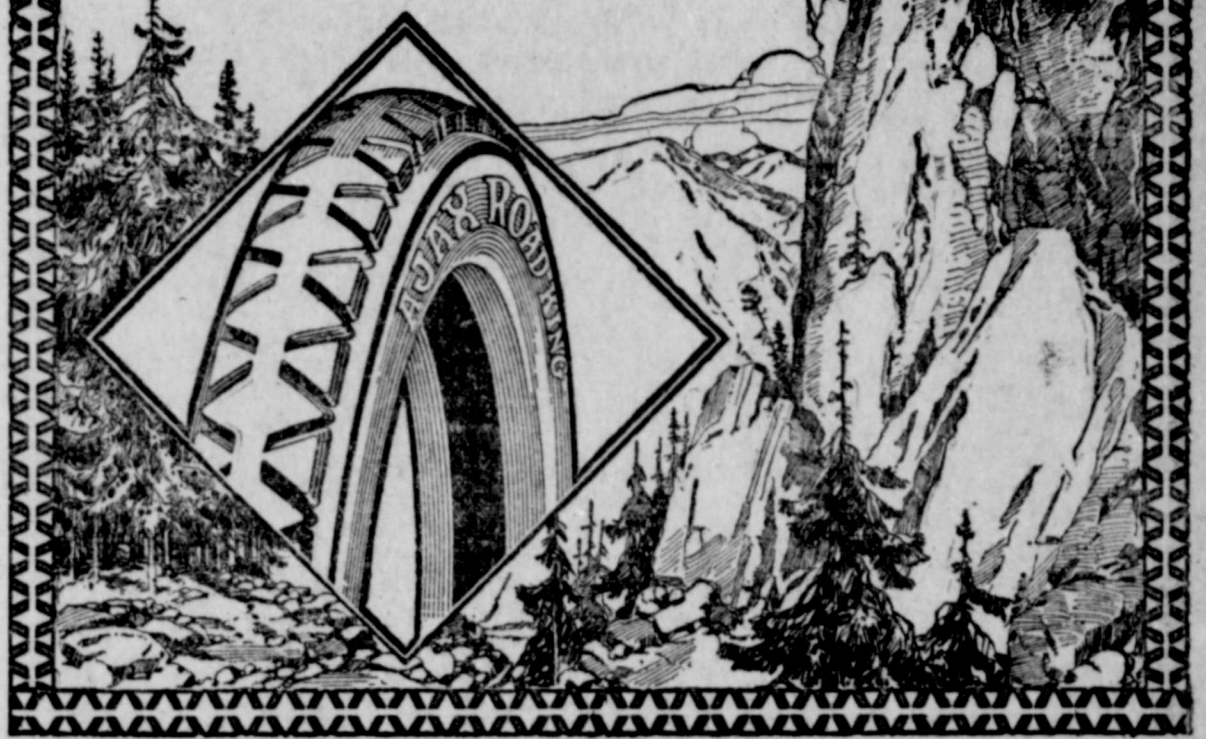

RECIPES.
(Elizabeth M. Dobbs).

Cream Puffs.
To one cup of boiling water add 1-2 cup of butter, stir until melted, remove from fire, add one cup of sifted flour, beat well, set aside to cool; then add three whole eggs, one at a time, beating each egg vigorously before adding another. When the batter is smooth and "satury" drop by spoonfuls into greased pans slightly warmed; bake in quick oven for 30 minutes. When cool, make a slit in the top of each and fill with whipped and flavored cream or a custard made by heating one pint of sweet milk, stirring in one spoon of corn starch or flour, dissolved in milk and when it thickens add the well beaten yolks of three eggs, about 1-3 cup of sugar, stir until quite thick. Remove from fire, add 1-2 teaspoon of vanilla and a little nutmeg. Sprinkle powdered sugar over the puffs.

Russian Rocks.
Cream 1-2 cup of butter and 1-2 cup of sugar; add two eggs, slightly beaten, 2 cups of flour sifted with 1 1-2 teaspoons of baking powder, 1 teaspoon of cloves, 1 teaspoon of cin-

namon, a few grains of salt, 1-2 teaspoon of vanilla, 1 cup each of raisins and pecans; form into balls the size of an English walnut, bake on slightly buttered sheets in moderately hot oven about twelve minutes.

Sorority Cakes.
Three cups of Post Toasties, crisp-ed in the oven, 1 1-2 cups of pecans cut rather fine, 10c box of desiccated cocoanut, 1 cup of sugar; beat the whites of 4 eggs until stiff, fold in the sugar, then the nuts and cocoanut, lastly the Post Toasties and a little vanilla. Shape with the hands into balls about the size of an egg. Place on slightly greased papers, bake in a very slow oven for about an hour.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Apricot Cream.
One-fourth box gelatin.
Yolks of two eggs, well beaten.
Three-fourths cup sugar.
One pint milk.
One cup apricot pulp.
Two tablespoons lemon juice.
Soak the gelatin in one-half cup milk ten minutes. Put sufficient stewed apricots through a sieve to obtain one cup of pulp. Heat remaining milk and add yolks of eggs and sugar well beaten and cook in double boiler until mixture coats the spoon. Remove from fire and add the softened gelatin and apricot pulp. Mix thoroughly and lastly add the lemon juice. When cool, pour into mold.

Vanity Cream.
1-2 box gelatin.
1-2 c milk.
3-4 c sugar.
1 1-2 pts. cream.
1 1-2 t pistachio extract.
3 or 4 drops almond extract.
1 1-2 t vanilla extract.
1-4 c seeded raisins.
1-2 c boiling water.
Soak gelatin in the cold milk five minutes and dissolve in the boiling water. Whip cream and add sugar, and dissolved gelatin. Flavor half of this mixture with the pistachio and almond extract and color with green color paste. Line a melon mold with this and flavor the balance with vanilla and stir into it the 1-4 cup large seeded raisins. Pour this in the center of the mold and chill thoroughly before serving.

Nut Sundae.
1-4 box gelatin.
1-4 c cold water.
1-2 c sugar.
1 pt. cream.
White of 1 egg.
1 c chopped nuts.
1 c pineapple and strawberries.
Soak gelatin in the cold water five minutes and dissolve over hot water. Add dissolved gelatine to cream and sugar, and stir in beaten white of egg. When cold, add the pineapple and strawberries, which have been chopped in small pieces; also, the chopped nuts. Serve ice-cold in sherbet glasses.

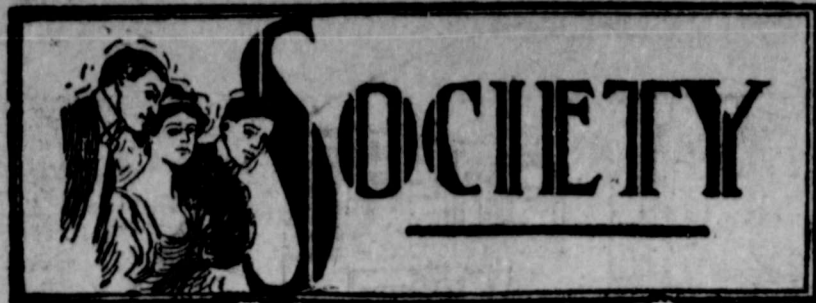

INDIAN THIEF HAD INGENUITY

Remarkably Clever Stratagem by
Which Piegan Escaped With His
Booty of Stolen Ponies.

Among the many interesting stories
told by members of the Canadian
mounted police is one that has to do
with the cleverness of an Indian.

One snowy morning a band of Crees
awoke to find that about a dozen of
their ponies had been stolen during the
night. A band to go in pursuit was
immediately organized, and in the
course of an hour the trail was struck.
The band followed it for thirty miles
or more, till it entered a river and
headed for a little wooded island.

Smoke was rising from the trees, and
an opening, apparently the mouth of
a cave, was in plain view. Presently
a Piegan Indian showed himself in
front of the opening. At his heels was
a dog.

Pretty soon the dog scented the
Crees, who were lying low, and began
growling and barking. The Piegan look-
ed up, glanced about him for a moment
and then instantly entered the cave.
In about ten seconds, another Piegan
came round the rocks and also went
in; then another, and another and an-
other. The Crees lay silently in the
bushes, counting, till upward of fifty
Piegan had come round the rocks and
gone into the cave, and still they kept
coming. Each carried a rifle.

When at last seventy men had disap-
peared in the cave, the superstitious
and cautious Crees concluded that the
evil spirit had something to do with
it. So thoroughly were they filled with
this idea that even when re-enforce-
ments came, which was in a few hours,
they were reluctant to attack the
island.

That night, however, one Cree, less
credulous than the others, crossed over
the lee to investigate. On approach-
ing the supposed cave, he found that
it was no cave at all, but simply an
opening leading some ten feet into the
rock, where it made a turn and came
out on the other side.

There was the remnant of a single
camp fire, the ponies were gone and
not an Indian was in sight. The in-
genious Piegan thief, by making the
circuit of the passage, and the end of
the island seventy times, had so de-
ceived his pursuers as to gain the
time necessary for his escape.

be required to reconstruct it." The
purchaser is assured, however, that it

British Land Changing Hands.

Land in the British Isles is changing
hands at the rate of 100,000 acres a
week, well-informed real estate deal-
ers estimate. By the end of this year
some \$100,000,000 in land deals will
have been completed.

Large estates are being sold, mostly
in small lots. One of 10,100 acres in
Durham fetched \$430,000 when cut up
into 96 farms. Syndicates are getting
in their work. One estate, valued at
\$500,000 was sold to a syndicate for
\$750,000 and the latter disposed of the
land to another syndicate for \$1,000,
000. Only 3,000 acres were involved.

Tenant farmers are pressing for
opportunity to own the land and large
landowners are availing themselves of
the chance to "get out" at high prices.

Big Demand for Diamonds.

The demand for diamonds all over
the world so far exceeds the supply
that the stocks of importers and cut-
ters are practically exhausted and they
are unable to fill the orders of their
retail customers. This condition was
attributed by New York jewelers chief-
ly to the prosperity of the country.
The war-time period of bonanza wages
has made the working people the na-
tion's greatest diamond buyers. This
class, it was said, had absorbed a large
portion of the small stones on the mar-
ket, but the rich man is as badly off as
the man of moderate circumstances,
because the larger and more valuable
diamonds are scarce and higher in price.

To Make Mother-of-Pearl.

The secret of another German key
industry has been discovered, the man-
ufacture of artificial mother-of-pearl.
J. W. H. Dew, a fellow of the Royal
Society of Arts, found the process af-
ter much patient experimenting.

Doctor Dew was engaged during the
whole period of the war in reconstruct-
ing, step by step, the method of manu-
facture.

Artificial mother-of-pearl is used for
making fancy buttons, dress trimmings
and many other articles. Before the war
most of it came from Germany.

Farmers' Loan in Jamaica.

The agricultural loan bank move-
ment was initiated in Jamaica in 1912
to provide relief for the small plant-
ers of sugar, bananas and coconuts
whose holdings were injured in the
destructive hurricane and drought of
that year.

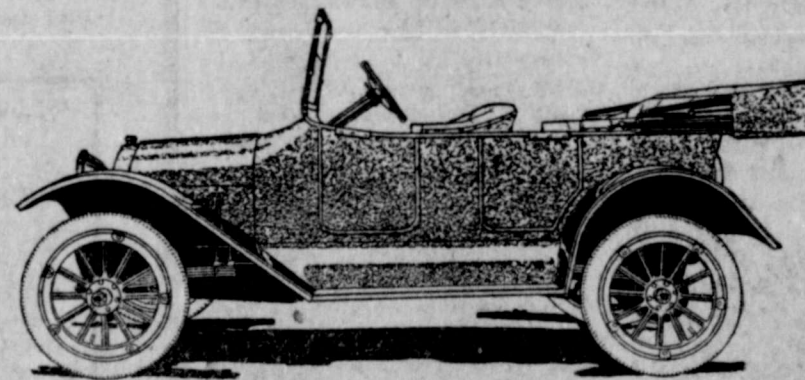

WILL AGAIN HONOR MAGELLAN

Quadrifennial of His Famous Voyage Likely to Be Appropriately Observed in 1921.

March, 1921, will be a good time to visit the Philippines, for it will then be an even 400 years since Fernando de Magalhaes, as he was named in his native Portuguese, although better known, as English usage afterward changed it, by the name of Ferdinand Magellan, first visited the islands, discovering and taking possession of them for the crown of Spain. And plans are now under consideration to celebrate that anniversary in a way to outdo any celebration ever held in the Orient. One will hear, no doubt, a great deal about Magellan in the next 12 months, and the first navigator of the Pacific will reappear in newspaper columns and magazine articles; nor is it unlikely that his counterfeit presentment will rediscover the Philippines in a proper pageant. The celebration, indeed, comes at an appropriate time, for the Pacific ocean is only just assuming reality in the thoughts of the great majority of Americans, and it provides historic background against which the modern islands can display their products, their development, and their opportunities for the investment of American capital. Like Columbus, Magellan was not seeking new lands for Spain. He set out to find a passage from the Atlantic to the ocean that Balboa had seen some years earlier on the other side of the continent, and having passed through the straits of Magellan, he believed that he was steering for the Moluccas, or Spice Islands. And so, incidentally, he found the Philippines.

COMES OF ANCIENT FAMILY

Danish Minister to Iceland Traces Origin to First White Man Born in America.

Information has been received from Copenhagen that the Danish consul-general in London, I. E. Boegild, has been appointed Danish minister to Iceland. Mr. Boegild is widely known in America, having been Danish consul in San Francisco and Chicago, consul-general in New York and commercial adviser to the Danish legation in Washington. Mr. Boegild seems especially fitted for this post, as he has Icelandic blood in his veins. On the maternal side he is descended from the Tullinius family of Iceland, which traces its origin back to Thorfinn Karlsefni, one of the famous Norsemen who discovered America nearly one thousand years ago. Karlsefni, of whom a statue was recently erected in Philadelphia, was the first white man to settle in America, spending two years in "Wineland," where his wife, Gudrid, gave birth to a boy, who was called Snorri. From Snorri descended a numerous and distinguished lineage, among whom is numbered the Tullinius family, and the new minister to Iceland can thus lay claim to being descended from the first white man born in America.—Detroit News.

Cook With Oil on Warship.

The Hood, the monster mystery battleship, launched from the Clyde the other day, is fitted out with a large oil-fuel cooking galley. For several years past the use of oil fuel has been common in the British navy for propulsion purposes, but its employment for cooking is quite an innovation. The galley referred to is capable of cooking for 1,200 men. The heat is obtained by means of special burners, which consume the oil under pressure, compressed air being used to atomize the fuel. The result is a white flame of extraordinary heat and cleanliness, which leaves no residue whatever and is easily controlled. There is an entire absence of smell—a usual disadvantage in cooking by means of oil—and there is no chance of the food being contaminated.

The Earth's Crust.

The most important scientific investigation of the past year in any country has probably been the attempt to measure the earth's crust. We know very little about the shell on which we live. Scientists have been studying the problem in Hawaii, Tuscany and Salvador, where the opportunities for investigation are especially favorable. Many data new to science have been collected concerning the shell, its composition and probable age. Still other tests have been made in New South Wales, where a great reservoir concentrates an immense weight of water on a limited area, and instruments have been devised to measure the movement of the earth's crust under this weight. New light has thus been thrown on the action of volcanoes.

Hardest Tool-Steel Yet Discovered.

When a tool becomes dull, time is required to sharpen it, and time in a machine shop is expensive. A tool that will cut hard materials and still keep its edge saves both time and money. Eleven years ago Professor J. O. Arnold, of Sheffield, England, invented the alloy of steel in which the metal vanadium was introduced to provide a cutting power greater than that of other steels. As a result very rapid production became possible. He has now produced a steel of even greater cutting power in which the alloy molybdenum replaces the tungsten present in all vanadium-alloy steels, forming six per cent of the steel instead of the eighteen per cent of tungsten. It eclipses the cutting power of all its rivals.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.

ALL FOR FREEDOM

Desperate Chances to Escape Taken by Prisoners.

Even When Almost Certain Death is Faced, Convicts Have Been Known to Go On With Their Efforts.

Pepper got his cognomen from his method of highway robbery. Walking along the street in the evening, he carried an unlighted pipe between his teeth. When, in some lonesome spot, he saw a pedestrian stop to light a cigar, Pepper would accost him, asking him to "hold the match." When the fellow traveler obliged, Pepper, instead of lighting his innocent-looking pipe, turned it toward the eyes of his victim, and blew hard. The pipe was of special construction and filled with red pepper. The victim, blinded by this horrible assault, could do nothing to defend himself until relieved of his valuables.

With two terms already behind him, Pepper was sent to Clinton. There he immediately began to plan an escape, and in his plans exhibited great cleverness.

He worked in the clothing shop of the prison. One piece at a time, working over a period of eight months, Pepper stole a complete civilian outfit from the shop. The ensemble he hid in his pillow.

Banging his way loudly, Pepper made for the warden's office. Without even knocking he stumbled in. The warden happened to be very busy at the moment, but this did not deter Pepper. "I've come to sell you some meat," he declared confidentially.

"Sergeant!" bawled the warden, "take this d—d pest and throw him out! He's bothering me!" The sergeant came in and removed the obstreperous meat seller, dumping him outside the gates with force and relish. It was not until Pepper was across the 20 intervening miles to Canada that he really allowed himself a good laugh. Pepper stayed out of the clutches of the law until five years later, when he was foolish enough to return to New York.

At the same prison great courage enabled another break-out.

Near the prison laundry stood an empty barrel. Taking the bottom out of this, four prisoners took turns at tunneling.

After two weeks of intermittent work they reached the wall, and excavated a small chamber there for working purposes.

Finally one of the huge slabs was loosened, and worked forward to a point where it was almost about to topple into the excavation.

Here a terrible difficulty became apparent. It would be perfectly simple to release the slab, but the second it came out it would crush beyond recognition the man working in the excavation. The men talked it over gravely and decided that one of the number must be sacrificed that the other three might escape.

They drew straws. By ironic chance G—, the one of the four with more than an ordinary reason for escape, drew the shortest straw. His was the assignment. One of the others, proclaiming himself unattached, offered to take his place, but G— refused. In the few seconds after his election he had formulated a scheme that might give him something of a chance to escape the slab when it fell.

He took down a short piece of plank. This was insufficient to stop the rush of the big stone, but he thought that, in breaking, the wood probably would delay the fall long enough to permit him to squirm out of the way. Propping it in place, he grimly worked the slab until it gave way.

Gritting his teeth, he made no outcry, however, but turned to the work that yet remained.—E. T. Bronedon, in Popular Mechanics Magazine.

Guild Long in Service.

An ancient Irish guild, the Goldsmiths' corporation, gave a dinner recently for the first time since before the war, at the Gresham hotel, Dublin. The charter was granted by Charles I in 1637, was originally established for the purpose of hall-marking all articles of gold and silver wares that were brought to their offices for marking. It has zealously discharged its duties for over 250 years and is still vigilant as ever in detecting and punishing fraudulent hall-markers. The original charter and seal, a copy of its roll of members, with the warden's and members' oath, were exhibited, and on the table were specimens of antique silver bowls, potato rings and other articles.

He Comes No More.

My friend came to see me on Saturday evening as usual, in a beautiful new suit. We went to the theater and when we arrived at my home decided to spend the remainder of the evening on the front porch. The porch had just been painted a few days before, but, supposing it to be dry, I thought nothing of it until he, thinking it time to leave, exclaimed, "O, I'm stuck!" He just happened to sit on a part of the porch that had not completely dried. To my embarrassment, he rained his new suit, and what was worse, never paid me another visit.—Chicago Tribune.

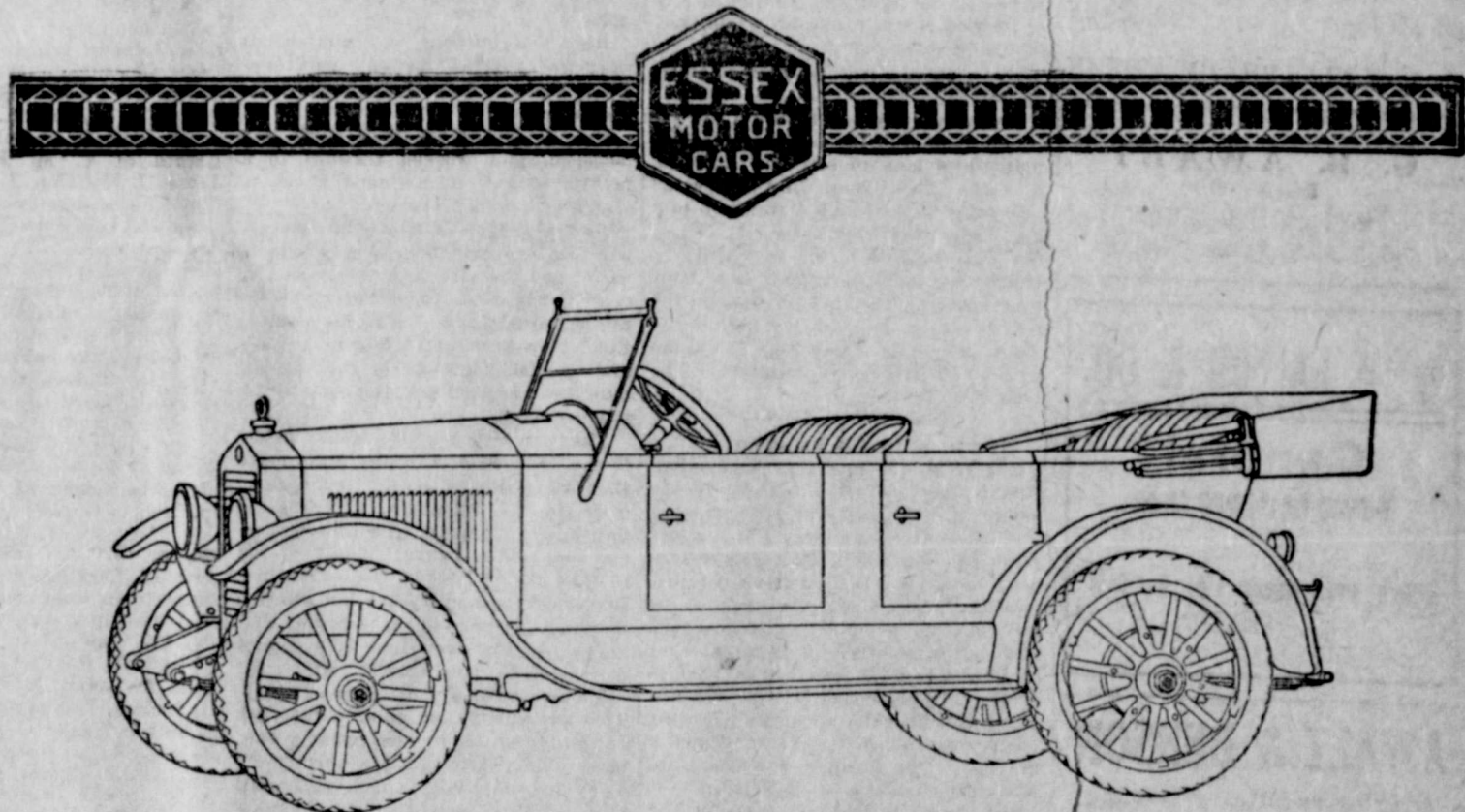
