#### SCATTERED WOOL SALES REPORTED -- MEXICO BUYERS

A slight rift in the cloud that has cast a shadow over the wool industry since the middle of May, due to the collapsing of the market which was then strong, has this week appeared with reports of sales of small lots at Del Rio and Kerrville.

At Del Rio, J. R. Hamilton, Valverde county sheepman, disposed of months. 100,000 pounds of eight-months wool to Mexican parties, who will ship the fleece to Mexico City. It brought 42 cents per pound, according to information reaching this city.






