The local Mexican population last night concluded two days of grand and glorious celebration of the 110th anniversary of the independence of Mexico. Don Miguel Hidalgo, the liberator of Mexico, is the chief hero in the eyes of the Mexican patriots, although Morelos, Bravo, Juarez and other national characters likewise come in for adulations and homage.

The celebration in Brady was held at the A. T. Jordan hall, which was gaily decorated for the big event, with American and Mexican flags intertwined. A patriotic program of speeches, recitations, vocal and instrumental songs and patriotic renditions made up the program for the two nights celebration, and a big baile (dance) concluded each night's performance.

VALUATIONS IN McCULLOCH COUNTY SHOW OVER HALF-MILLION INCREASE

COUNTY TAX ASSESSOR HODGES ROLLS SHOW 667,957 ACRES OF LAND WITH ASSESSED VALUE OF \$4,439,353—MAKING NEW TOTAL VALUATION, \$9,309,691.

County Tax Assessor H. R. Hodges, has just submitted his tax rolls to the commissioners court for examination and approval, and the court, in session this week, after reviewing the rolls, passed the same without correction or change. Mr. Hodges takes great pride in the fact that his rolls have always been balanced, and have never been subject to correction by either county or state officials. The rolls this year show the total taxable values in McCulloch county to be \$9,308,691, as compared with \$8,797,451 for the year 1919, giving an increase in valuations this year over last of \$512,240.

The assessor's rolls give various information of interest, among other things being the fact that there are some 667,957 acres of land in McCulloch county, with an assessed valuation of \$4,439,353. Other items of interest are the following: Value of City property, \$889,879. Horses and mules in county, 7,651 head; value \$355,867. Cattle, 30,266 head; value \$647,225. Jacks, 20 head, value \$1415. Sheep, 26,432 head; value, \$132,160. Goats, 19,900 head; value, \$59,149. Hogs, 3,463 head; value, \$16,007. Dogs, 28 head; value, \$1460. Autos and other vehicles, value, \$264,637. Value of merchandise, \$399,121. Value of implements and machinery, \$191,593. Value of engines, \$44,845. Value of private banks, \$14,600. Money on deposit, \$198,217. Value of notes, \$424,446. Miscellaneous, \$66,884. State and National banks, five in number, value, \$217,176. Miles of railroad 70.98; value, \$558,840. Rolling stock, \$61,091. Intangible assets, \$283,662. Value of telegraph and telephones, \$42,904. Total assessed value of McCulloch county, 1920, \$9,309,691. Amount of poll tax assessed, \$2031. County rate \$.68. State rate \$.62. School rates from \$.20 to \$.50. Road No. 1 rate \$.25.

Death of Mrs. J. P. Schafer.

The death of Mrs. J. P. Schafer occurred Tuesday night at her home in the Voca community. Funeral services were held Wednesday morning, and interment was made in the Voca cemetery.

Mrs. Schafer was one of the oldest and most highly respected citizens of McCulloch county, a good Christian woman, whose life and example had been a beacon to guide the footsteps of her children, as well as relatives and friends. With her husband, she was one of the pioneers in the southern part of McCulloch county. Throughout her life, she devoted herself to those who needed her services, caring for the sick, helping the suffering and scattering sunshine and happiness wherever her presence was called. For some six months past, she had been in ill health, and death came as a relief to her pain and suffering.

Besides the husband, ten children, all grown, are left to mourn the loss of their mother. To them is extended the heartfelt sympathy of a host of friends throughout this section.

Death of Soldier Boy.

The death of P. G. Patterson, well known in this county and more especially in the Pontotoc section, occurred on August 15th, in Washington state, while in the service of the U. S. The lad's mother lives in the Rochelle community, and the following tribute is paid the deceased by an old friend of the family living in the Fredonia community:

P. G. Patterson was born Feb. 25, 1900, near Pontotoc, Mason county, Texas. He joined the United States Navy June 27, 1919 at Houston, Texas. While out on leave of absence near Bremerton, Washington, he fell over a cliff about 150 feet high and was killed August 15, 1920. The body was shipped back and buried near his old home at the Newsom cemetery, Aug. 30, amid a large gathering of friends and loved ones. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Fred P. Bishop.

His mother, four sisters, and three brothers survive him.

P. G. was a boy of sterling character and a kind and loving disposition. Though he never reached the years of mature manhood, the world is better by his having lived.

May God's richest blessings rest upon those who mourn his loss.

SEEK STATE AID ON PUGET SOUND TO GULF HIGHWAY

County Judge Evans Adkins, accompanied by Commissioner R. L. Burns, County Surveyor W. P. Doty, G. B. Awalt and E. T. Jordan of Melvin, left yesterday noon for Austin where they will, in person, make application for state aid. Previous application for aid, made by Judge Adkins in writing, was refused on the grounds that plans for improvements now being made on the southern end of the Brady road to Mason, had not been submitted to the state highway department for approval. It is the purpose of the committee to have Judge Doty secure all the state department's specifications for road building down to the minutest detail, in order that the local work may be carried on in strict accordance with the same. The committee will also carry with them sample of the road material being used, for approval by the commission.

While something like \$2,000 has already been spent improving the Mason road from Otte's to the river, the committee is in hopes of securing approval of the remainder of the work now being done, and of securing state aid in like sum to that which is still to be expended. Something like \$4,000 remains on hand for this purpose, and another \$1,000 or more is expected to be raised. Should \$5,000 state aid be granted, then McCulloch county would have some \$10,000 for improvement of this important highway.

Mr. Jordan's main object in visiting Austin with the committee is to make effort to have the Melvin road improvement bonds, voted a couple years ago, disposed of, so that the funds may be available for road improvement work in the Melvin section. Incidentally, Mr. Jordan will endeavor to secure state aid for his precinct in like sum to the amount that will be expended there in road improvement.

DAY WELL SHOWING FINE—MUCH TO DO AT MERCURY

The Day field has one well producing oil, one well drilling and one well flowing oil from the casing head. That is the terse description of the status of the wells on the Hall-Dutton tract, 11 miles northeast of Brady. Day well No. 3 is pronounced by oil scouts as showing up better all the time. The flow of oil from the casing head continues, with increasing gas pressure. Mr. Day is in the north, and nothing further will be done with this well until the completion of No. 4, when a power plant will be installed and all three wells placed on the pump.

Well No. 4 is now at about 450 ft. depth, and the crew commenced setting 10-inch casing Wednesday night.

C. W. Purcell, superintendent of the Howell-Hyde well on the Matthew Capps ranch, reports that hole at a depth of 900 ft., and the crew waiting on an underreamer to set the casing down.

The citizens of the Mercury community are much enthused over the new spurt in activities in that field. The Argo Drilling Co. is reported to have brought in a splendid gas well, with a flow sufficient either to be used in drilling another well or else to be converted to commercial purposes. The shipping of the first carload of oil to the Brownwood refinery by A. W. Cooper has also added interest to the field. The oil was produced in the White field, and sold to the Brownwood refinery at \$4.25 per barrel. Deducting transportation costs, the oil netted \$3.75 at the field. There is much activity in and about the White field, and something like eight tests are reported under way there.

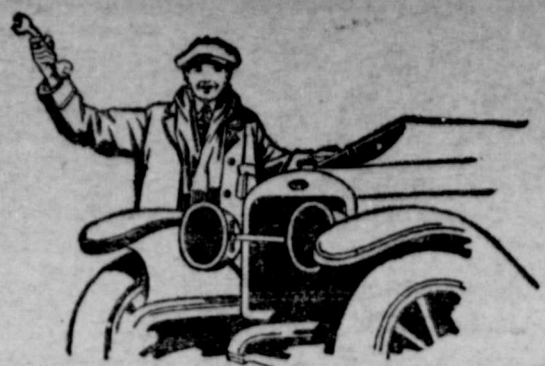

EVERY-DAY FOOD.

A can of salmon on the emergency shelf is a most convenient form of food, as it may



be served in a variety of ways.

Salmon Souffle.

Remove the skin and bones from canned salmon; separate into flakes and

season with one teaspoonful of salt, two teaspoonfuls of lemon juice and pepper and paprika to taste. Cook one-half cupful of bread crumbs with one-half cupful of milk five minutes. Add the salmon, the yolks of three eggs beaten thick and the whites beaten stiff; these are folded in lightly at the last. Turn into a buttered baking dish and set into a pan of hot water to bake. Serve with:

Spanish Sauce.—Melt three table-spoonfuls of butter, add three table-spoonfuls of flour; stir until well blended, then pour on gradually, stirring constantly, one cupful of milk and one-half cupful cream. Bring to the boiling point. Add one-half cupful of pimiento puree, one teaspoonful of salt and a few dashes of cayenne. To prepare the puree, put a can of pimientos through a sieve, after draining them.

Baked Rhubarb.—Wash and soak eight prunes; when soft, remove the stones and cut in pieces. Cut up two cupfuls of rhubarb without removing the peeling, add one cupful of boiling water to the rhubarb and prunes and bake in a moderate oven until nearly cooked, then add two-thirds of a cupful of sugar.

Meat and Potato Pie.—Take one cupful of cold chopped meat, two table-spoonfuls of minced onion, one-half cupful of canned tomatoes, two cupfuls of mashed potatoes, with salt and pepper to season. Put a layer of meat in the bottom of the baking dish, add a little onion and seasonings, and half the tomato; repeat and cover with the mashed potato. Cover, and bake in a hot oven.

Hot String Bean Salad.—Take cooked string beans and a table-spoonful or two of shredded onion. Pour over them a little hot bacon fat and a few slices of bacon cut in cubes and cooked brown. Add salt and pepper and enough boiling vinegar to give the proper zest.

GOOD THINGS TO EAT.

A salad is always enjoyed and any new combination welcomed.

Cheese Salad.—Take half a pound of rich American cheese, one cream cheese, one table-spoonful of cream, two green peppers and one Southern onion chopped fine. Rub the cream cheese, cream and grated or minced American cheese to a smooth paste. Add the finely chopped onion, a stalk of celery and the peppers all finely minced. Season with paprika, add salt and cayenne and mold into a loaf. Place on ice to harden. Serve with hot toasted crackers.

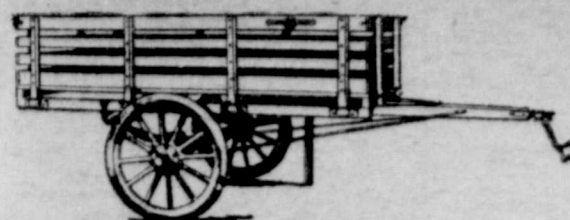
Lobster With Rice.—Cut the white meat of one chicken and one lobster into dice. Put two table-spoonfuls of sweet fat into a shallow frying pan, add one sweet green pepper and one sweet red pepper chopped fine; stir until they are soft. Add the lobster and chicken, one teaspoonful of salt; heat slowly, while a cupful of seasoned tomato sauce is prepared. Put two cupfuls of hot seasoned rice in the center of a platter, put the meat mixture over the top and pour over the tomato sauce and send to the table.

Cadillac Codfish.—Pick over salt codfish and separate into small pieces. Measure two-thirds of a cupful. Cover with lukewarm water, cook until soft and drain. Cut four medium-sized cooked potatoes into slices, arrange a layer of potatoes and a layer of fish, sprinkle with salt and pepper; repeat. Pour over one and one-half cupfuls of tomato sauce, sprinkle with buttered crumbs and brown in a moderate oven.

Venetian Sauce.—Melt one-fourth of a cupful of butter, add four table-spoonfuls of flour and stir until well blended; then pour on gradually while stirring constantly two cupfuls of boiling water. Bring to the boiling point and add the juice of half a lemon, one-fourth of a cupful of capers, one table-spoonful of finely chopped parsley and two table-spoonfuls of finely chopped pickles. Again bring to the boiling point, season with salt and add two table-spoonfuls of butter bit by bit.

HONEST INJUN.

King Cotton is just beginning his new reign in McCulloch, but it is going to take a good price to crown him.

COTTON GRADES.

There is destined to be a radical change made by cotton farmers in the class of seed planted and the grades of cotton produced. This is indicated by a letter received from one of the leading cotton factors in Texas by a local representative, and which states:

"We have your favor of the 11th inst., and also have received types.

"We beg to say that right at the moment this cotton is not suitable for our needs as our requirements at this time are exclusively for better staple than your type is showing. We are in hopes that either the staple in Brady will improve or the demand will come for the shorter staple.

"For the above reasons, we do not feel justified in giving you a limit at this time."

Should the conditions named in the foregoing letter continue through the cotton season, it will spell the doom of the short staple. Every observant person has noted the tendency of the times is for better merchandise of every class. Any merchant will tell you that the demand for low grade cotton goods is steadily declining—their customers want the best, regardless of price.

The farmers of McCulloch county should take warning in due time, and make arrangements next year to plant only such seed as will assure a long staple cotton. Already warnings have been sent out by those interested in the welfare of the South and the Southern farmers to withhold low-grade cotton from markets, in order that a fair price may be maintained for the better grades.

Texas is changing from the low-grade and mixed breeds of every variety of farm product, whether livestock or crops, to the pure-bred grades and registered stock. It is a tendency that has added untold wealth to the empire, and incalculable prestige to Texas good name.

SAVING THE COUNTRY.

THE CASE OF WOOL.

The American Woolen Company is shortly to reopen the mills it closed down about six weeks ago, and at the old scale of wages. The particularly significant circumstance is that there is to be no reduction in the scale of wages. This seems to refute, not conclusively, though perhaps as much as it deserves, the notion put at large by Mr. Gompers and others, that the company had closed down its mills partly for the purpose of depressing wages and partly for the purpose of giving the country a foretaste of what would be the consequence of electing Governor Cox. It must be pretty plain that, if that action was aimed in a punitive spirit at any class, it was at the producers of wool and the consumers of woolsens. It is not wages that have been depressed by the closing of these mills, but the price of wool, while a further consequence has been to sustain prices of woolsens at a level that would have been impossible if the mills had been kept in operation steadily. Of course labor has been a victim of the process to the extent that the employees of the mills have been kept in idleness; but it is evident that that effect instead of having been designed as an offensive measure against labor, was a mere incidental consequence of a policy which was prompted by the determination to hold up prices and profits. To the accomplishment of this purpose labor has been made to contribute, but less than have the growers of wool and the consumers of woolsens.—Dallas News.

THE CROWDED DOCKETS.

Press reports within the last few days carried a statement from Hon. D. A. McAskill, District Attorney of Bexar county, stating that there are now pending in the 37th District court of that county one hundred and eleven felony cases, one hundred and five of which are murder cases and six criminal assault cases—all capital cases. District Attorney McAskill states that in cases of this kind it usually requires a special venire of 100 men and at least a week's time to dispose of a case. At this rate it would require more than two years' time in which to dispose of the cases now on docket. This is indeed, a deplorable state of affairs and the matter should have the prompt consideration of the coming session of the Legislature. The increase in crime throughout the land is appalling and sufficient courts should be created to expedite disposal of the overcrowded dockets, and the accused should not be compelled to languish in the jails for one or two years without trial by due course of law.—Texas Monthly Review.

A SIMPLE PROBLEM IN H. C. L.

A Coleman hid dealer pays the farmer or ranchman 4 cents a pound for a calf hide. The hide dealer says he cannot pay more than four cents a pound because he sells the hide in the market at five cents a pound.

Recently a Coleman harness maker received a tanned calf hide to be used as lace leather. The harness maker's invoice showed that the tanned calf hide cost him at the rate of \$3.75 a pound.

THE STATE'S FINANCES.

Reviewing a recent statement of the State's finances, issued by the State Treasurer, the Waco Times-Herald says:

According to official announcement approximately \$19,000,000 became available at the State treasury at Austin at the beginning of the new fiscal year September 1. Six millions of this vast sum goes to the public schools, \$4,000,000 being an appropriation made at the last special session of the Legislature to supplement the available school fund and \$2,000,000 to aid the rural schools. The balance of \$13,000,000 will be used in support of the State government during the fiscal year just entered. The State treasury contained \$14,000,000 in cash on the first day of September, including amounts in the State depositories and \$8,750,000 of this belong to the general revenue making the largest general revenue balance in the history of the State. The financial condition of the State is such according to State Treasurer John W. Baker, that there is not the slightest chance of the State having to go on a deficiency basis during the present fiscal year. The amount of the credit of the general revenue was nearly double that of September 1919, when there was a balance of only \$4,602,000. The balance to the credit of the available school fund the first day of this month was \$1,500,000 compared with \$854,000 in September last year and \$348,000 in 1918. The State Highway department has a balance of \$1,910,000.

All this money has been gathered from the taxpayers of the State and none of them will be surprised at the enormous total if he remembers the amount of his own contribution.—Waco Times-Herald.

The amount "contributed" by the average taxpayer, to bring the state's finances to the immense totals enumerated above, was small in comparison with the millions collected by the State. From every standpoint by which State's finances can be accurately judged, we think the financial condition of the State at the beginning of this fiscal year was indeed splendid. It reflected strongly the business-like methods which have been used in handling the money matters of the State; and while the amounts collected from the tax payers have been large, the expenditure of the huge funds has been so safeguarded that the State is now able to conduct its business for the coming year without the embarrassment of costly deficits. The cost of government has increased, just as all other costs have increased; and it is somewhat remarkable that under existing conditions the state has been able to make such a remarkable financial showing, even though it has collected enormous sums from the tax paying citizens.—Brownwood Bulletin.

The French-Capper "truth-in-fabric" bill, compelling manufacturers to stamp every yard of cloth with its contents of virgin wool and other material was endorsed by the convention.—Coleman Democrat-Voice.

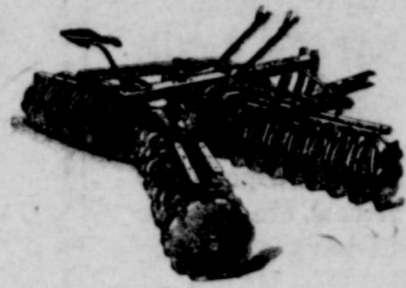

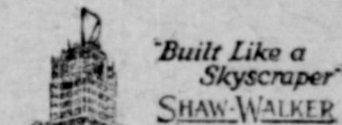

OF INTEREST TO WOMEN.

Apple Fritter Recipe. Make a batter in the proportion of 1 cup warm sweet milk to 2 of flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 2 eggs well beaten, 1 tablespoon sugar and saltspoon of salt; warm the milk; add slices of sour apples or other fruit. Drop in spoonfuls in boiling fat and fry to light brown.

In order to make a pair of hose last twice as long, turn them wrong side out and darn the heel and toe. Use a fine soft darning thread and do not make the stitches all the way through. The fact that the hose are darned cannot be detected.

My black silk shirt waist collar was yellow or spotted from cleaning, so I made a tiny cloth mop and wiped it over twice with black ink. The result is most satisfactory.

"When an insect stings," says a reader, "it usually leaves its sting in with the poison sac attached. If the sting is pulled out, the poison sac is sure to be smashed, causing more poison to flow into the wound. This highly undesirable result is avoided if the sting is scraped out."

To keep bees from fading when canned, keep in water of one temperature. That is, when you parboil the bees to get off the skin, do not plunge into cold water to remove. Peel with knife and fork as you do Irish potatoes. When canned, cover with paper or put in the dark.

Election Return in Early Days Remained Long in Doubt.—Hayes Told of Election.

When the time came that Rutherford B. Hayes must leave Columbus for Washington, if he was to arrive in time for his inauguration, the result of the election was still in doubt. The machinery of the electoral commission devised and provided to meet the emergency that had arisen in the exceedingly close result of the contest between Samuel J. Tilden and himself was still in operation.

Private Dalzell, now one of the assistant sergeants-at-arms of the Ohio House, was a member of a small party of friends of Governor Hayes who left Columbus with him for Washington, Thursday evening, March 1, 1877, and tells an interesting story of when and how the Governor received information that the long drawn-out contest had been decided in his favor, and how it affected him.

When the train reached St. Marys, Md., early on the morning of the 2d, a message was received by Dalzell from Zach Chandler, Secretary of the Interior in the Cabinet of President Grant, who had managed the Republican national campaign in 1876. It read as follows:

"Both houses adjourned. Hayes declared elected. Glory to God."

"ZACH CHANDLER."

Hayes was asleep, but was awakened, and the message handed to him. Sitting up in his berth he took the telegram with apparent reluctance, though he must have read its meaning in the joyful faces of his friends, glanced at it with the pallor of almost death itself on his face, and simply said to the little group assembled in the car aisle before him—Lewis Weir, General Noyes, General Grosvenor and Dalzell—"Boys, don't cheer so, you will wake up the other passengers."

"With that he motioned us away, and quietly lay down in his berth again," said Dalzell, "and we all came away more silently than we had broken in upon his rest."—Columbus (Ohio) Dispatch.

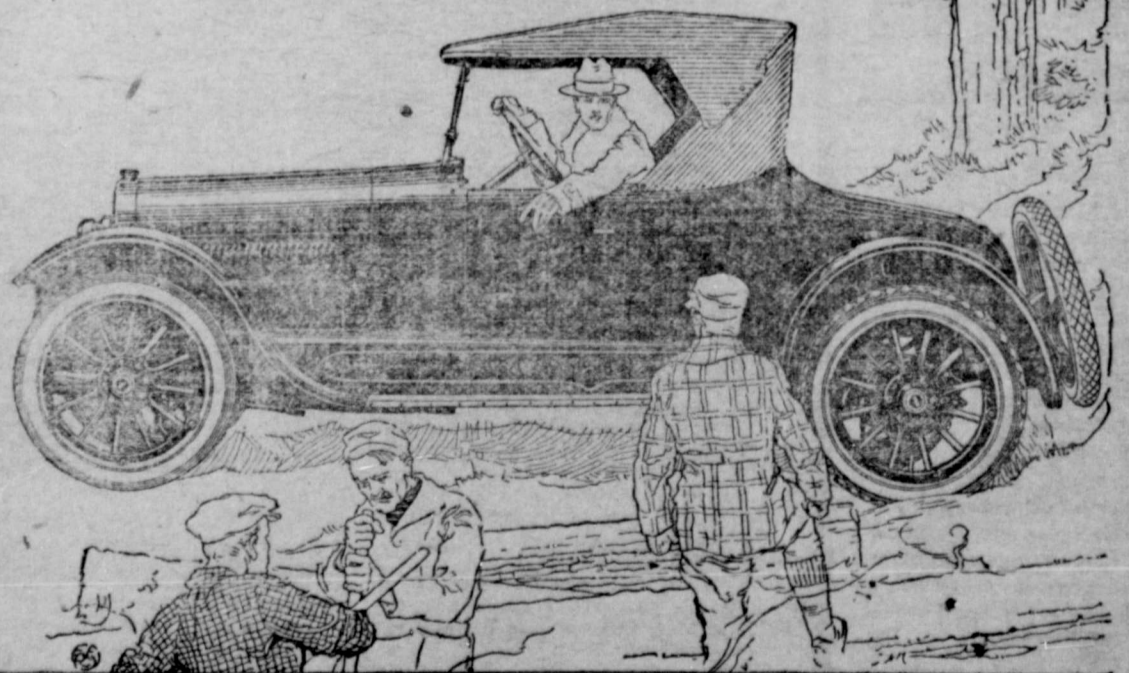

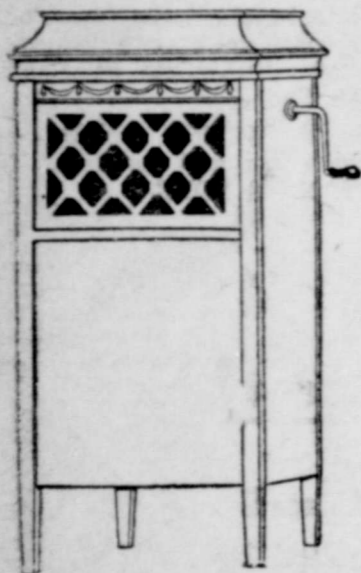

Ordered by court that county tax on carnival which showed for benefit of Brady Fire department be and same is hereby remitted.

W. P. Burselen presented bond as justice of peace, Pre. 5, for sum of \$1000; examined and approved.

Clerk ordered to issue warrant for \$500, payable to Brady Nat'l Bank and \$1500 payable to Commercial Nat'l Bank, payable March 1, 1922, bearing six per cent interest per annum, to be drawn against general fund; ordered that said \$2000 be and is hereby transferred to road and bridge fund, Precinct 2.

Ordered by court that sum of \$168 be and same is hereby transferred from General fund to R. & B. fund Precinct 2.


