





In the vicinity of Devil's Hollow, several miles east of Quapaw, Okla., there is a wigwam-shaped church building located miles from any white man's habitation, and a long distance congregate regularly to worship the Great Spirit in silence. They sit about a tiny fire that has been built on a stone base in the middle of the dirt floor, from Saturday night at sundown till Sunday noon, fasting and praying, but never speaking a word.

A feature of their church meetings is the feast that follows the fast and religious rites.
