AT A TIME when major league baseball is going through a time of turmoil, in regard to the Pete Rose gambling issue, it was refreshing this past week to see the headline story regarding Glenn Davis of the Houston Astros.

Davis, who has been Houston's home run leader practically since he joined the team, and is currently leading the league with seven homers, spoke out against the commercial use of his name in relation to a beer company commercial.

It seems that the Astros' television broadcasts are sponsored by the Budweiser company. When an Astros' player hits a home run, the team announcers have been cued by the advertiser to proclaim "This Bud's For You," while the player circles the bases.

Might sound innocent enough to some players, but upon hearing about the practice, Davis went to the team's general manager and asked to be excluded from that particular promotion.

Davis explained that he was concerned that the home run promotion sponsored by the beer company was sending mixed signals to his fans, some of whom might think he condoned drinking. "Personally, I don't drink and I don't want to be associated with it. I try to set a standard and be a role model for a lot of other people," the young slugger stated in an Associated Press interview.

The rising star explained that he makes as many as 250 public appearances a year, and many of them are speaking engagements at schools, in relation to drug abuse. He said he doesn't want youngsters watching the game to think he's living a double standard.

"We need heroes. We need role models; we need guys who can stand up and say you don't need to follow the crowd. You can get high on other things," Davis said in the interview.

This is undoubtedly the most refreshing statement we have heard a professional athlete make in a number of years.

Davis, it was explained, doesn't take the subject of alcohol abuse lightly. When he was 17, he was nearly killed in a car accident that was alcohol-related.

"That scared me sober," Davis said. "I don't want other kids to have to go through that."

The television station spokesman has indicated that the announcers will respect the player's wishes in regard to the issue.

In a day and time when it's much easier to just go along with the crowd on certain issues, it took a lot of courage by Glenn Davis to stand up for his convictions.

I have thought for a number of years that it's too bad that the main sponsors for our professional sports telecasts and radio broadcasts are the beer companies. I am sure, like Glenn Davis indicated, this has sent its share of "mixed signals" to young fans.

Hopefully, a lot of his fans will assure the young man that he did the right and proper thing.

"Teams that have gone to state from this region have done well at state. I think we have a chance to win. Booker, the team that won our region this year, has about nine first place trophies from state. I think we could beat them if we played our best."

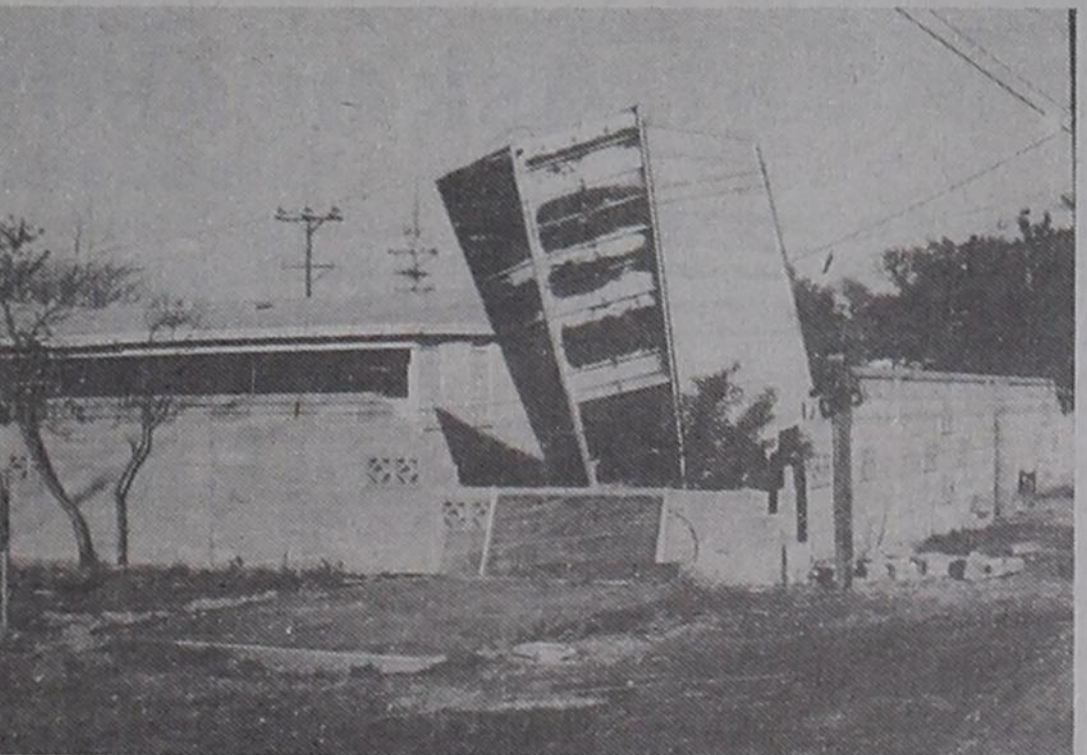
Winds gusted for quite some time locally, heaviest between 5:30

Boys Track Team Is Ninth In State

The Bovina Mustangs competed in the first-ever state Six-Man championships, held at Comanche this past Saturday, and competed well.

With some 40 to 50 schools represented in the meet, Bovina finished ninth as a team, scoring 18 points.

Denver Riddle placed second in the 400-meter dash with a time of 52.1. Riddle had awakened Saturday with a questionable stomach, and was perhaps somewhat below par, but still ran one of his best races of the year.

Corey Kirkpatrick, one of the Mustangs' amazing freshmen, placed third in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles with a time of 42.03.

"This was just super for a freshman to compete that well in a state meet. It should give him confidence in his future athletic events," said Bovina Coach Monte Moore.

The 1600-meter relay team (Robert Guevara, Kirkpatrick, Manuel Porras and Riddle), placed fifth with a time of 3:38.83.

In Bovina's other event, another freshman, Angel Porras, placed 11th in the 3200-meter run with a time of 11:24.2.

Mustangs 3rd In Regional Golf Tourney

The Bovina boys finished third at the Regional Golf Tournament last week with a 718.

Bovina's individual scores included: Scott Scaff, 89-86--175; Scott Sudderth, 79-86--165; Denver Riddle, 91-90--181; Corey Kirkpatrick, 98-101-199; Bud Venable, 109-97--206.

Lazbuddie also participated. Their individual scores included: Brian Glover, 98-90--188; Wes Jarman, 108-99--207; Donnie Holt, 104-109--213; Scott Miller, 107-100--207. The team's total score was 815.

"It was a long trip to Comanche, plus, it was a hot, humid day. We haven't been used to having to run in that kind of humidity, and that probably affected the athletes," Coach Moore said.

"But to advance to a state meet was an accomplishment in itself. I told the boys that this was a season for them to remember," Moore commented.

The meet was held in Comanche's high school stadium. Comanche is a good-sized class AAA school. The stands were packed for all of the races, and this was a different experience for the tracksters, getting to run in front of that many people.

Good Vote Turnout Is Noted

A good turnout of voters elected members to the Bovina School Board and the Bovina City Council last Saturday.

Galen Hromas and Charlie Teague were elected as members of the City Council from a field of four candidates.

Hromas received 160 votes, with Teague getting 143. Other vote totals included Earl Quintana, 37, and Radford Venable, 31.

In the school board election, there were six in the running and the three who were elected were Jerry Roach, 184, Mike Beauchamp, 180, and Dennis Willard, 172. Other vote totals included Joe Steelman, 98, Dickie Clayton, 92, and Al Kerby, Jr., 61.

There were 190 votes cast in the city election and 270 in the school board race.

Youngster Critically Injured

Wayne Stormes, fourteen-year-old son of Sam and Ella Jo Stormes, is hospitalized in the Lubbock St. Mary's Hospital after an accident at their home last Friday.

Wayne's brother was shooting cans with a pellet gun in their front yard when a pellet ricocheted and struck Wayne in the chest. The pellet went through the lower part of his lung and lodged in his heart. He was taken to St. Mary's Hospital in Lubbock where he was kept on stand-by for heart surgery in ICU for three days.

He was put in a private room on Sunday. His mother said they were giving him morphine for the chest pain. At one time, they took him off the morphine and put him on Tylenol 3, but it did not take care of the pain and he is back on morphine.

Wayne has a drainage tube in his chest and will have it there for at least a week.

The doctors said the pellet may be less severe if it remains in his heart compared to the surgery to remove it.

David and Lerina Bockari, teachers in West Africa, will be guest speakers at the First United Methodist Church on Sunday.

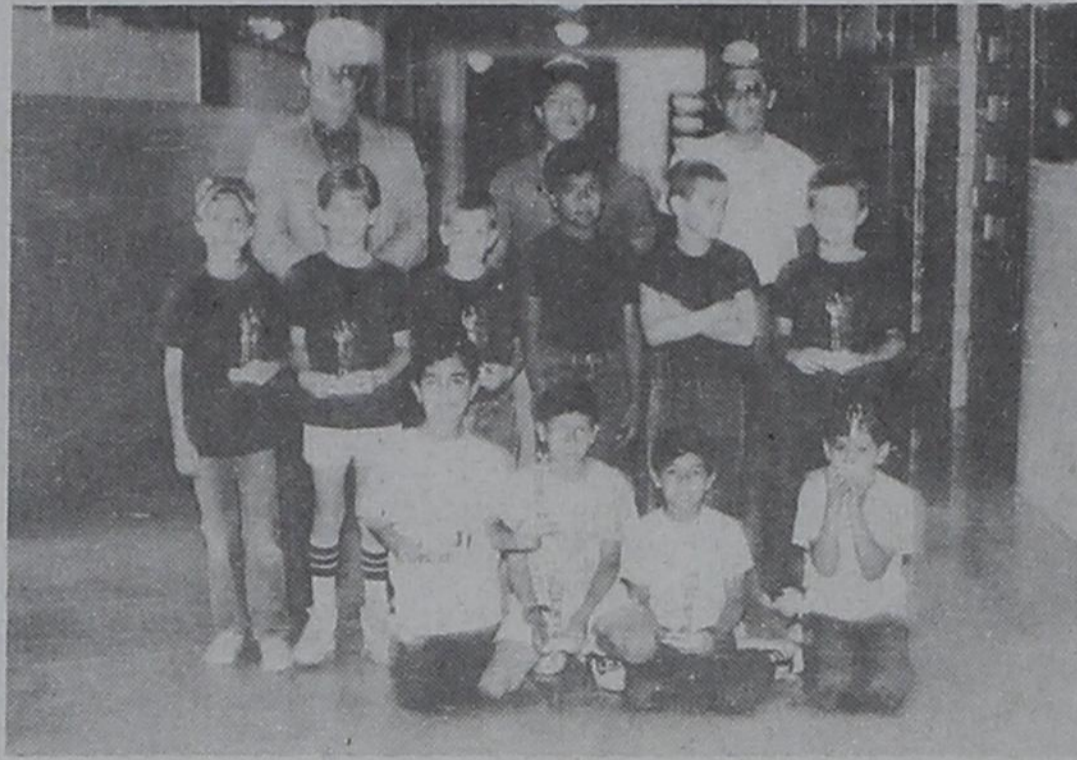

Care Credit Requires New IRS Form

Beginning with the 1989 returns filed next year, taxpayers claiming child or dependent care credit must identify the care provider. Form 2441 (and Schedule 1 for those filing the short form) will have space for the care provider's name, address and identification number. If a tax-exempt organization, such as a church or charity, provides the care, you need not include an identification number. You must provide, in any case, the care provider's name and address.

Taxpayers not including this information on their returns will not be allowed to claim the dependent care credit. If you cannot provide the required information, you must show you made every effort in attempting to

obtain it.

The IRS has developed Form W-10 for use in obtaining dependent care provider information. You will have met your responsibility once you have obtained the form, properly completed and signed, from your care provider. There are other ways to show that you have made every effort; Form W-10 is, however, the simplest.

Taxpayers would be wise to obtain their completed Form W-10's as soon as possible. That way you protect your insurability for the dependent care credit even if your care provider moves to another location between now and the time you file your 1989 return. If your care provider does not have copies of Form W-10, your local H&R Block office can provide them for you and answer any questions you may have about the child care credit.

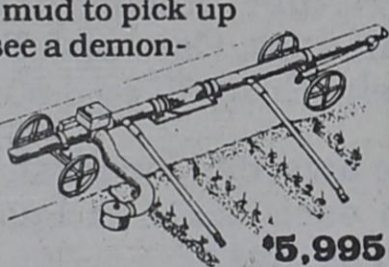
