Exterminators?" I do not question the honesty of the man at Blanket, neither do I question the fact that it pigs in the field among the corn and otton, but believe me I never did see cotton. It appears to me that if a pig would pick up cotton squares that had been punctured and eat them they would eat the tender foilage of a cotton plant. But I have never seen one do it. However, I suppose they could be starved to it. So to be plain about the matter I think that pigs will not do any other good than to keep down weeds. But I do know what will e profitable and practical and that is chickens and turkeys. If a man had his field properly fenced and sufficiently stocked with chickens and turkeys, they will do no harm to the plant but will bug that cotton field every day over and over. What could a man stock his field with that will pay better than chickens and turkeys? Hoge will catch and eat grass-




