SHERIFF RETURNS WITH BOY WANTED FOR MUR-DER IN BROWNWOOD

Sheriff R. B. Pugh came in Friday from the Wichita county oil fields, bringing with him Willie Carter, the 16-year-old boy wanted here in connection with the murder of J. N. Weatherby, which occurred on the night of October 18th, last.

Willie Carter was captured at Burkburnett by a deputy placed at that point by Sheriff Pugh-a man who knew the Carter boy, and also the man, George H. Scott, wanted for the same crime, and who is still at large. Sheriff Pugh, in a general way, had a hunch that the fugitives wanted for the Weatherby crime would likely head for the North Texas oil fields, and he very wisely located a man there to pick them up in case they came that way.

When arrested, the Carter boy was found to be in pretty bad shape physically. He was considerable worn and drawn from the hard usage of hiding by day and traveling by night. Even when he reached Brownwood Friday, after four days of rest in the Wichita county jail, the boy still showed the hard effects of the grue ing conditions he underwent in trying to make a successful escape.

Sheriff Pugh was notified by wire last Sunday of the boy's capture. He left immediately for Burkburnett, arriving there Monday. He remained in the oil field territory three days, endeavoring, with the help of Wichita County officers, to locate some trace of George Scott, the man in the crime. He was unsuccessful, he says, even in getting the slightest trace of

When the sheriff was notified here of the Carter boy's capture, it immediately leaked out that the boy had been caught. Brownwood press dispatches were sent to the outside daily papers to that effect, and the officers believe their failure to capture Scott immediately following the capture of the boy was due to the fact that he was warned through these dispatches that the officers were hot on the trail.

In speaking of his trip to Burkburnett and his interviews there with the boy, Sheriff Pugh says that Carter refused to disclose to him any information of value; in fact, he says, the boy adopted a very close-mouth attitude, and it required no little urging to get him to say anything about the crime with which he is charged, or about his flight from Brownwood on the eventful night of the murder. He told the sheriff that in leaving Brown-W. W. Among the articles of value missing from Weatherby's person was a \$2500 diamond ring. Supposing Scott and the boy to have committed the murder, it is apparent from the boy's destitute condition that the diamond ring had not been sold up to the time of the boy's arrest, or that Scott had kept all the funds.

The Carter boy underwent a grueling third-degree examination in the district attorney's office at the courthouse Friday. Present at this examination was District Attorney Early, County Attorney Wilson, and Judge T. C. Wilkinson, who is employed in the case by the relatives of the mudered man.

The boy was kept under a rigid examination for the better part of the day and while the officers refuse to state what he related or that he made a confession, it is the general undertanding that the boy talked freely and told his story in a way that it is credited by the officers as being the



BUZZARD TRAP SNARES 225 BIRDS IN FIRST WEEK

A record of 225 buzzards captured in a trap built by him on the Lewis Brook ranch, 9 miles east of Brady, was hung up by W. H. Caldwell, who is employed with Jamie Brook in operating the ranch. Not only this, but in the three weeks that the trap has been in operation a total of over 400 birds have met their doom as a result of the device. At one time the buzzards enjoyed the protection of the state laws, because they were considered the scavengers of the air, and therefore a benefit to the country. In recent years, however, it has been asserted that the buzzard is one of the auses for the spread of charbon. Also it is a proven fact that these monsters of the air will kill pigs, young calves and lambs, several losses of this sort having occurred on the Brook

In designing the buzzard trap, Caldwell used 6-ft, high poultry netting, enclosing and covering a space 15 ft. square. The opening to the trap was made 18 inches high and 14 inches wide, and was made four foot long running towards the center of the trap, the opening tapering down to about 12 inches. A cage for the bait was placed in the center, and when food or a carcass is placed in this cage, the trap is ready for business. After entering the converging opening and getting inside the trap, the birds become confused and are unable to find their way out.

While the trap has rendered highly efficient service the past three weeks, its usefulness is not yet ended, and stray buzzards continue to meet their doom in the simple device.
