JOHN DOTY, FORMER BRADY CITIZEN, PASSES ON

County Surveyor W. P. Doty is in receipt of the sad news of the death of his brother, John, who passed away at Red Lodge, Montana, on the night of Friday, October 29th. John Doty is well remembered by the older citizens of Brady and the McCulloch county section, having been a resident of Brady back in the early '80's, at which time he conducted a hotel on the site of the present Commercial National bank. Concerning his death, the Picket-Journal, published at Red Lodge, Montana, has the following account:

"John Doty, a pioneer of this section, died at Mount Maurice hospital during the night of Friday, October 29. Mr. Doty, who was during his lifetime a staunch home builder, a believer in good community life and an ardent Mason, arrived with his family at Roberts, on March 17, 1896. He and his two sons, Dan and Ed, immediately took up adjoining homesteads and entered, with his few neighbors, into a campaign of community building that has made the Roberts section and the lower Willow creek valley one of the premier farming and stock-raising sections of the state. About four years ago he suffered a slight apoplectic stroke and was compelled to give up the active work he had followed all his life. About three months ago another stroke seized him and finally, three days before his death, he was attacked by the third, which ended in his death. The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon, October 31, and was in

charge of Star of the West lodge, No. 40, A. F. and A. M., interment at Henry cemetery.

"John Doty was born on December 22, 1833, at Deerfield, Tioga county, Pennsylvania. In 1854, at the age of 21, he removed to Iowa City, Iowa, where he worked at his trade of stone mason. Later he moved to Oxford, Iowa, where on October 18, 1859, he was joined in wedlock with Mary Eliza McDonald. Six children were born to this union, one daughter and five sons. The daughter, Mrs. C. F. Lampman of Greybull, Wyo., and two sons, Dan Doty of Roberts and Ed Doty of Monrovia, Calif., survive their father. On February 8, 1880, occurred the death of his well beloved wife. Soon after this he again took up his home in a new locality, having settled at Jolley, Iowa, where he married Susan Lampman on November 28, 1882. Three children were the fruits of this wedlock. Two of them, Mrs. T. W. Abrahams of this city and Orr Doty of Roberts, were present to comfort their father during his last suffering. The third, Irma Doty, died here in 1907 and rests in Henry cemetery. Their mother passed on eleven years ago.

"Mr. Doty was the eldest of a hardy family of nine children. Three of them are still living but were unable to attend the funeral on account of the long journey which it would necessitate. They are W. P. Doty of Brady, Texas; Mrs. Fred Stiles of Burnet, Texas; and Mrs. John Ring of Des Moines, Iowa. Sixteen grand-children and nine great-grandchildren, living in California, Iowa, Wyoming and Montana, also live to perpetuate the name of Doty.

"Always a believer in Masonry, Mr. Doty joined the lodge at Lake City, Iowa, on January 16, 1875. He became a Royal Arch Mason on June

15, 1880, and was a member of Palestine Commandery, No. 2, of Iowa City, Iowa, until after he came to Montana, when he became by demit a member of Star of the West lodge, No. 40, of Red Lodge, on January 4, 1905."

ARREST TWO MEN ON ROCHELLE BURGLARY CHARGE

The two men, Chas. and George Moore, who are alleged to have burglarized the Wallace Price Tailor shop at Rochelle on the night of November 2nd, were placed under arrest at Lometa Saturday evening upon arrival of the Santa Fe's Eden branch train at that station. To Conductor J. L. Hunt of the Santa Fe goes credit for the discovery of the pair, and should their conviction follow, he will doubtless be entitled to the \$100 reward offered.

The conductor's identification of the men was the result of descriptive postcards sent out by Sheriff Wall, who also gave cards to both Frisco and Santa Fe conductors, asking them to be on the lookout for any passengers who might answer the description. The Moore brothers boarded the Santa Fe at Hall, Texas, and, having been unable to buy tickets, the conductor had opportunity to observe them closely as they paid their fare. His attention was attracted to the scar on the cheek of George Moore, and upon looking up the descriptive postcard, he decided the two men answered the description closely enough to warrant their detention. The brakeman also identified the two men and assisted in keeping them under close surveillance.

At San Saba the train arrived too late to communicate with the San Saba sheriff, so the men were allowed to remain on board until the train approached Lometa. There the brakeman went on ahead and got the town marshal to come to the train and place

the pair under arrest. In conversation with the officers at Lometa, the men gave their names as Tom and Lee Liggett.

Mr. Price was notified at Rochelle and accompanied by Constable J. W. Cole went to Lometa, where both readily identified the men as the parties accused of the burglary. Mr. Price also identified the suits the men wore as part of the goods missing after the burglary. It developed that three suits and the suit cases taken, were disposed of to some Mexicans at Hall, and these were also recovered. Among the articles not so far recovered are the vest out of the \$95 suit, the three ladies' dresses and a pair of shoes.

The two men were brought to Brady Sunday afternoon by Constable Cole and lodged in the Brady jail. Examining trial will be held this afternoon.

PUBLIC SERVICE.

NO NEWSPAPERS IN FIFTY YEARS, PICTURE DRAWN BY PAPER MAN

Chicago, Nov. 12.—Inside of fifty years, unless there is a comprehensive plan of reforestation, national conservation of the discovery of some substitute for wood pulp, there will be no newspapers, no magazines and information will be disseminated by word of mouth, by town crier and by telephone. This was the picture drawn today by George W. Sisson Jr. of Potsdam, N. Y., president of the American Paper and Pulp association, at the annual meeting of that organization.

He said it was not a question of lower prices in the paper industry, but a question of supply and prices for future generations. Frank I. Moore, chairman of the committee on forest conservation, urged immediate action by the States and Federal Government for the acquisition of forests and tracts that can be used to grow timber all to be under strict Federal control, already approved by Colonel Greeley of the forest service by the United States Chamber of Commerce and by all associations controlling paper trade.

The plan called for the expenditure of \$50,000,000 in the next five years by the Federal Government, aside from millions to be spent by various States in starting the great work of reforestation and conserving what timber still remains.

20 TEXAS COUNTIES FREED FROM CATTLE TICK QUARANTINE

Washington, Nov. 13.—Release of 32,171 square miles of quarantined area in the cattle tick infested States of the South was announced yesterday by the Department of Agriculture, effective Dec. 12. Failure of county officials to co-operate in eradicating the tick in their areas caused the requarantining of 7,917 square miles, the statement said. Under the revised quarantine approximately 218,000 square miles is held to be infested.

In Texas, Bell, Brown, Burnet, Camp, Coryell, Delta, Denton, Falls, Franklin, Gillespie, Hill, Hopkins, Lampasas, Limestone, Mills, Navarro, San Saba, and Wise and a portion of Comanche and Lamar counties were released.

Work against the cattle tick generally is progressing very successfully, the announcement said, and with full county co-operation, "more substantial area will be freed from quarantine" next year.
