### BRADY AUTO LOSS HEAVY IN PLATE GLASS CRASH

Brady Auto Company suffered a heavy loss Monday afternoon when \$1,000 worth of plate glass became overbalanced while being trucked from the depot to the new garage building, and crashed to the ground. The big crate contained nine pieces of plate glass, each about 6x6 ft., and every one was broken and splintered in the big crash. The accident happened about 30 yards this side of the freight depot. Frank Hurd of the Brady Auto Co. was driving the truck, and A. D. Wright, contractor in charge of the rebuilding of the garage, was balancing the crate of glass. An unexpected lurch of the truck overbalanced both the crate and Wright, who jumped from the truck just in time to save being buried underneath the avalanche of broken glass. As it was, the broken splinters struck his heel, cutting through the shoe and lacerating the foot slightly.

Messrs. Hurd and Wright had just previously unloaded a crate of six pieces of plate glass for smaller windows, making the trip over from the depot in safety.

Aside from the monetary loss, the accident is all the more aggravating since it will still further delay the completion of the new garage building under construction for the past six months. The plate glass was ordered last April, seven months being required to effect delivery. B. A. Hallum, manager of the Brady Auto Co., is hopeful that more rapid delivery can be effected upon the re-order since building activities have slumped considerably in recent weeks.

### TO BUILD PAPER MILL IN DALLAS WITHIN 6 MOS.

The first pulp and paper mills for the manufacture of writing, blotting, tissue, book and news print paper west of the Mississippi River will be erected in Dallas within the next 6 months by the Trinity Paper Mills, according to an announcement made by George F. Lull, president of the company. It is expected that the first unit will be completed by that time, Mr. Lull said, and more units will be added as the business increases. The same company also is planning to erect a pulp mill at Commerce, and this will be in operation within three months, according to present plans.

The pulp and paper mills at Dallas will each have a capacity of twenty tons daily and will use cotton linters in the manufacture of the paper. Two such mills owned by a nationally known firm already are in operation in the South, one at Augusta, Ga., and the other at Memphis, Tenn.

Mr. Lull, who is president and general manager of the Dallas company, has spent a quarter of a century in the paper and pulp trade. He is a graduate of Massachusetts Institute of Technology and has attended the United States Military Academy, at West Point, and the University of Maine. He has written many articles on the paper trade and has contributed a discussion of this industry to "Rodgers' Industrial Chemistry," a book used in many schools and libraries throughout the country as an authority on American chemical industries.

The mills to be erected in Dallas will employ approximately 200 per-

sons as soon as they begin operation. About 50 per cent of this will be unskilled labor, although the men in charge will necessarily be those who have had considerable experience in the paper industry, Mr. Lull said.

"Dallas was selected as a suitable location for such a paper mill after an inspection of sites throughout the entire South," Mr. Lull said. "It is in the heart of the cotton-growing industry and can furnish much more of the raw product than our mills can possibly consume. About 1,500,000 bales of cotton are financed through Dallas every year, which means that there are approximately 75,000 tons of linters available here annually.

"The use of cotton linters in the manufacture of paper is no new thing. The encyclopedia states that the wool of the cotton plant was first used in the manufacture of paper by the Chinese two centuries before Christ."

Regarding the present status of the paper industry, Mr. Lull said a 40 per cent shortage exists in the United States. "This country uses half the world's supply of paper and obtains 55 per cent of this from Canada," he said. "If we should cut all the timber in Canada today and make paper from it there would be only enough to supply that country for fifty years, or the United for fourteen years."—Dallas News.
