DRILLING IN TEXAS-MEERS IS RESUMED

Drilling has been resumed in the Texas-Meers well on the Hartgrove ranch near Millersview, according to W. O. Shultz, the Millersview ranchman, who is spending a good part of his time in Ballinger, where he is feeding a large bunch of cattle.

The Texas-Meers well suspended operations some time ago at a depth of 950 feet, waiting for easing. They now have an ample supply of casing on the ground and a fuel supply sufficient to carry on the work success-

This well is located three miles a good showing of oil was found at a depth of 1400 feet, the Shultz well producing about ten barrels of high grade oil at that depth. It is six miles South of Russell No. 1, from which 300 barrels of crude were recently sold at \$2 per barrel delivered at the well.

At the present depth of the Texas-Meers well the bit is working in a perfect thirteen inch hole, and prospects are promising for successful drilling to a depth of 2,500 feet. The test made in the Russell well brought oil at about 1900 feet and the best production came at 2,290, and the Texas-Meers drillers are very optimistie for pay oil at a shallower depth, as the first good sand was found in the Shultz well at 1400 feet .- Ballinger Banner-Ledger.

Energy and Vitality by Purifying and took it over during the war with no profit to the grower, and in view of the fact that the tarriff commission weeks there. shows that the cost of producing wools in the West is 45c per pound and in the Eastern states about 55c a pound, and considering that the price of wool in the grease has very little to do with the cost of a suit of clothes, the average high grade suit, having only four pounds of washed wool in it, taking 60 per cent as the shrinkage for our Texas wools, it would take ten pounds of wool in the grease to produce a suit so that a difference of 25c per pound to the grower would only make a difference in the cost to the consumer of \$2.50 on a fine suit of clothes.

"This year at shearing time buyers were anxious for our Texas fine wool and were buying the wool off the mutton, (which is sheared first,) at 70c per pound. Over night the Federal Reserve bank put on the 'clamps.' They had allowed the Legal Reserve to go below the Legal Requirements just as our wool was coming off, and our crops were being planted. 


