BILL REDUCES U. S. ARMY TO 150,000 MEN

Washington, Jan. 28. - Provision has been made in the annual army appropriation bill for an army of only 150,000, at the suggestion of President-elect Harding, Representative Anthony of Kansas, chairman of the House Appropriations Subcommittee, which drafted the measure, said last night in announcing that the bill was ready to be reported.

The proposed army of 150,000 which compares with the present army of about 213,000 men, and with the army of 175,000 men fixed in a resolution recently adopted by the House and Senate, was suggested by Harding as a proper maximum, Chairman Anthony said, at the recent conference which he held with the President-elect at Marion. GREAT DREADNOUGHT IS RAISED FROM SEA-

London, January 28 .- The correspondent of the Daily Telegraph at Milan wires that a unique naval engineering achievement was affected yesterday at Taranto Harbor in connection with the salvage of the Italian dreadnought Leonardo da Vinci, which was sunk there in August 1916, as the result of a treacherous plot and the exploding of infernal machines which caused the ship to completely capsize, keel upward, with her smokestacks smashed and her turrets remaining embedded in mud Two hundred of her crew were drowned.

Naval engineers have been busy during these last two years with a recovery scheme based on pumping air into the hull and slowly dislodging water, compartment after compartment, until after the coal and ammualthough capsized was floated again. this week. In this overturned condition, bottom dry-dock, where her turrets were removed and her decks rendered water-

preparations were made for righting her. Thousands of people congregated at Taranto to watch this interesting event, and the Navy Minister and many Admirals and engineers also attended.

Operations began yesterday, certain compartments being filled with water until the hull slowly began to rotate, assuming an inclined position. At this stage, by pumping water into more compartments and also dislodging it from others by compressed air rotation accelerated itself, the deck appearing by degrees, until finally the dreadnought fully righted herself as if automatically. The whole operation was followed with the utmost enthusiasm and amid tremendous
