The narrative is told in the artistic manner and with the great wealth of human interest for which its author is celebrated. The successful business man, public-spirited enough, but not sufficiently con-cerned with public morals and the setting of a good example by his own life, is shown; also his goodhearted but silly wife and his im-lroperly educated daughter. We see the plumber, the carpenter and several others transformed by unusual profits into "beggars on horseback;" and we see a quiet, normal community going the way of the socially ambitious, the upstart and prodigal. Logically, nature, the law of compensation or whatever it. is that brings about readjustments after any indulgence in extremes. asserts itself and the village endeavors to sober up. It is not accomplished without severe phycical, mental and normal headaches.

After showing the more sordid and materialistic phases of life in the village, the author introduces the other side and gives a basis of optimism in the leaven of spirituality proceeding from certain purely unselfish beings in the place. Every town has these devoted souls, and like those in the village described by Mr. Bacheller, they usually are found in the substratum of society and seldom in its upper levels. We do not recall having encountered a more sweetly inspiring character in all fiction than the crippled, almost bed-ridden son of Washerwoman Widow Morgan in "The Prodigal Village."

Given Decent Burial.

Captain Webb related numerous instances of dealing with different kinds of cases but they were all along the lines mentioned. The only out of the ordinary case was one down in Mississippi where forces of the carpetbaggers killed a Ku Klux as he was returning from a visit to negro quarters one night. The name of that Ku Klux was Dillard. Dillard had been an officer in the Confederate army and the reconstruction forces wanted him more than any Ku Klux in Mississippi. They ambushed him with his den one night and shot him to pieces. They left him lying in the road and at first refused to allow him to be buried. When burial was permitted they refused to permit his body laid to rest in the Christian

"It didn't take word of that incident long to travel over the Invisible Empire," the captain said. "Soon a select party was organized to go to Mississippi and bury Dillard's body in the cemetery, regardless of what carpetbaggers said. They went, 100 of them. They went prepared for trouble. But the murderers had learned of their coming and did not not attempt to prevent Dillard's body being removed. Dillard's body was taken from the hole into which it had been dumped. It was properly shrouded and buried in the city cemetery. It was buried by the Ku Klux in broad daylight. At the head of the grave was placed a slab and on that slab was inscribed: 'Killed and

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
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
