Through courtesy of Mr. Boyd Commander, superintendent of the Lohn schools and secretary of the Interscholastic League, The Standard is enabled to give a complete list of winners of first place in the recent Interscholastic League meet, held at Brady, on Saturday, March 26th. Contests remaining to be decided include spelling, essay writing and basket ball. The total number of points received by each school will not be made up until these contests are decided.

### Interscholastic League Notes.

At the meeting of the executive board held Saturday all contested points were settled except spelling which has yet been reported from the state committee, the essays, and boys basket ball.

In the junior girls declamation, Juanita Joyce of Brady was declared the winner of first place and the question of the medal for winning boy debater was allowed to remain as decided at the meet.

The letter which follows will make clear the disputed points and show what contestants are eligible for com-

petition in the district meet at Comanche, Saturday, the 9th inst.:

"Dear Mr. Commander:—Answering your letter of March 27, a prose selection in the junior girls contest is not acceptable. In case, however, there is no objection to the girl representing the county in the district meet, you may allow the decision to stand and instruct the contestant to prepare a poetical selection for the district contest. In case, however, the contestant who took second place insists upon her rights in representing the county at the district meet, she should be allowed to do so. In short with the prose selection should be allowed to go only if there is no objection to it on the part of the schools represented in the contest.

"A question raised in regard to the awarding of the individual medal in debate is not one, that can be taken up by the state executive committee. If the time keeper made a mistake in calling one of the speakers down too soon, that is one of those errors that is likely to occur at any time and cannot be rectified. I would advise, therefore, that the protest on this score should not be allowed.

## CLOSE RACE IN SCHOOL TRUSTEE ELECTION SAT.

In the election held in Brady Saturday for the purpose of naming four trustees for the Brady Independent School district, considerable interest was developed by reason of there being nine candidates on the official ballot for the four offices. A total of 156 votes was cast—something like three times the usual number of votes in a school trustee election, and but a few votes separated several of the candidates. Mrs. Eda Bryson, and Messrs. A. J. Ricks, J. B. Whiteman and Edd Broad, were declared elected. Despite the almost invariable warning of the election judge and clerks, that but four candidates were to be named and that five of the candidates should be scratched from the ticket, quite a number of votes were cast with but four candidates crossed from the ballot. These votes were cast out by the judges, and the result of the election may, thereby, have been materially changed owing to the closeness of the race.

## FARMERS TO MEET SATURDAY—PLAN MARKET COTTON

A mass meeting of the farmers of McCulloch county will be held in Brady, Saturday afternoon, April 9th at 2:00 o'clock at the court house to hear an explanation of the Farm Bureau cotton marketing plan. Walton Peet, of the Texas Farm Bureau will speak, coming here from Brownwood, where he speaks Friday night, and prior to that, having held meetings at Ballinger, Eden and Coleman, in this section.

The object of the meeting will be for the purpose of securing the signature of cotton farmers to the contract with the Farm Bureau for cotton marketing. The object of the bureau is to secure a 2,000,000 bale pool in Texas, and all contracts will be for the usual 5-year period, as only through contracts of at least five-years duration can ultimate success attend the efforts of the bureau. All members of the Farm Bureau will be entitled to enter the cotton pool without charge, and those who enter the pool will thereby become members of the Farm Bureau. R. D. Black, county agent, advises all farmers to join the Farm Bureau, and states that in case they do not have the money necessary to pay for their membership fee, to see him at once, as he will be in position to make arrangements for them.

The Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Growers' Marketing association plans to market a million bales of cotton this fall through its own sales agency. The entire control of the sale of the crop will be in the hands of the growers themselves through their board of directors composed of cotton growers. A sales agent will be employed by this board who will be charged with obtaining information regarding markets and carrying on the actual transactions. The association intends to hire the best informed cotton man in the South for this purpose, just as the California Prune Growers employed the best dried fruit sales expert in the world to merchandise their crop. Arrangements are being made with the Federal Reserve bank for money advances on cotton immediately on delivery to the association. The agricultural committee to the Texas Bankers' association has examined the marketing plan very carefully and has pronounced it economically sound and conforming to safe banking practice.

In starting the campaign for the formation of the cotton sales organization in Central Texas, the Texas Farm Bureau organization recognized the fact that this is one of the most progressive cotton farming sections in the state. More than half a million bales are represented in the 1920 cotton production of the twelve counties being covered by the campaign.

The most important step in the campaign will be the formation of local organizations in every one of the counties of the district before the cotton sign up campaign is completed. Nine counties are already organized and they are counted among the strongest of the 63 organized counties in Texas.

The counties where the first work will be done are: Burnet, Williamson, Bell, Milam, Lampasas, Mills, San Saba, McCulloch, Concho, Brown, Coleman and Runnels.
