Erroneous Impression.

An erroneous idea was unintentionday's issue by the Brady Fire department, in which the impression was state emphatically that this was not the case, but that the service rendered was highly efficient and entirely satisfactory, demonstrating completely the great value of the new fire pump.

The trouble with the article was that t was an incomplete statement ril 3. of the facts in the case.

As demonstrating the efficiency of the new fire pump, Fire Chief Hurd says that when the pump was on, the ril 27. fire boys had 100 pounds pressure on their three lines of hose, with a 30pound pressure on the main. When girl, April 1. the pump was stopped, momentarily, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Taylor, Fife, the pressure dropped to 60 pounds on girl, April 1. the lines, and 30 pounds vacuum on the main, but as soon as the pump was started again the pressure jumped back to its original force. Thus, the absence of the pump gave only the gravity pressure from the standpipe but the moment the pump was started the tremendous pressure of 30 pounds on the main and 100 pounds on each of three lines was obtained. DELEGATES RETURN FROM KERRVILLE MEETING OF W. T. CHAMBER COMMERCE

Messrs. B. A. Hallum, Edd Broad, E. L. Ogden and Mayor J. E. Shropshire, who went to Kerrville Monday o attend the district meeting of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, returned Wednesday. They reported muddy roads on the trip there, and during their stay in Kerrville Tuesday another rain fell. The rain extended to Fredericksburg and up to Mason, and also covered a large scope of the western country. On acount of the rain, the delegation hortened their stay at Kerrville, and o missed the banquet tendered the delegates Tuesday night.

One of the important things taken repeal of the law placing a tax of from 1c to 8c on trucks for every mile the wheel turns, whether loaded or empty. This pernicious law goes into effect July 1st, and virtually means that freighting by auto trucks will be rendered prohibitive.

While the delegation was in Kerrville they enjoyed a visit to the new government sanitarium being built there, and which will shortly be opened to Uncle Sam's soldier boys. Between \$200,000 and \$300,000 has already been spent in buildings and equipment, and the sanitarium will be enabled to take care of about 60 patients. However, the government has appropriated \$1,000,000 for additional buildings, and \$500,000 for equipment, which will enable greatly increasing the capacity and efficiency of the sanitarium.
