## CLARENCE OUSLEY TO SPEAK IN BRADY FOR FARM BUREAU

### HON. CLARENCE OUSLEY TO ADDRESS FARM BUREAU—"VICTORY WEEK"

NOTED SPEAKER COMING TO BRADY TO DISCUSS CO-OPERATIVE COTTON MARKETING PLANS OF TEXAS FARM BUREAU—THIS IS "VICTORY WEEK."

R. E. Buchanan, special representative of the Texas Farm Bureau, is in Brady this week, assisting County Agent B. D. Black and members of the McCulloch County Farm Bureau in the drive to sign the full 100% of the county's quota in the One Million Bale Cotton Pool campaign on in Texas. As a grand finale to the week's work, Mr. Buchanan announces that Hon. Clarence Ousley, former Assistant Secretary of Agriculture of the U. S., and one of the foremost thinkers and speakers in the state, will be in Brady next Saturday and address the farmers and business men of Brady and adjoining counties. Mr. Ousley will discuss in detail the Co-Operative Cotton Marketing plans of the Texas Farm Bureau. No citizen interested in better marketing can afford not to hear Mr. Ousley, and every farmer and citizen is urged to be present.

The Texas Farm Bureau Federation has designated this week as "Victory Week" in their campaign to sign one million bales of cotton on five-year contracts, to be sold through a Co-Operative Marketing Association to be set up by them. A big intensive drive is being waged over the entire State, according to reports. In some instances the business houses and banks are closing to allow the merchants and bankers to assist in the drive.

The plan contemplates a selling association similar to the co-operative fruit associations of California. When in operation it will sell the cotton of its members as direct to the spinner as possible, thereby eliminating all

intermediate middle-men at a great saving to the producer. The Bankers Association of Texas, at its meeting in San Antonio recently, endorsed the plan without a dissenting voice, and Federal Reserve Bank officials are reported as saying they believed it based on safe and sound business principles.

The McCulloch County Farm Bureau members are engaging in a strong drive this week, assisted by R. E. Buchanan, special representative of the Texas Farm Bureau, and B. D. Black, county agricultural agent. Several meetings will be held in the county this week and next. The dates are as follows:

Every farmer and citizen of the county is urged to attend the meeting at the county courthouse, at Brady, next Saturday at 2:00 p. m. A good speaker will be provided and the plan of the organization explained.

The County Bureau directors request every farmer to note the date of the meeting in his community and be there to hear the speaker, and urge every other farmer to attend and study this problem more seriously than ever before—because this drive is closing July 1st. Do you want to see the plan succeed? If you do, you must ACT, and that now!

### PREPARATIONS FOR HOLDING U. C. V. REUNION AUG. 3-4-5 BEING COMPLETED

### MONSTER CELEBRATION AND RECORD-BREAKING CROWD ANTICIPATED—VARIOUS COMMITTEES APPOINTED TO ARRANGE FINANCING, ENTERTAINMENT, ETC.

Brady is planning to make the annual U. C. V. Reunion on August 3-4-5 this year the greatest event of the kind ever held in this section. A program of entertainment and amusement is to be arranged for the Confederate veterans that will long be recalled, and nothing will be left undone towards assuring their care and comfort throughout the reunion, nor will there be anything lacking towards making the three days' celebration a grand and glorious occasion for everyone attending. TEXAS LEADS NATION IN NUMBER OF CATTLE, SHEEP, GOATS, MULES

Dallas, June 16.—Texas leads the nation in the number of cattle, sheep and goats, based on the latest census according to a bulletin by the Industrial Congress today.

The total number of cattle on farms January 1, 1920, was 6,249,443, a decrease of 685,413 for the previous ten years. Sheep totaled 2,552,412, an increase of 743,703. Goats numbered 1,706,606, an increase of 571,362.

Texas leads the country with the number of mules on the farm, the bulletin said.

### CIVIC LEAGUE FOR "BETTERMENT OF BRADY"—MEETING THURSDAY P. M.

ALL BRADY CLUBS, SOCIETIES AND LODGES TO BE FEDERATED, AND EACH GIVEN REPRESENTATION UPON THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF LEAGUE.

A federation of all Brady clubs, church and other societies and lodges is to be formed at once to operate as a Civic League, the sole and only object of which is to be "For the Betterment of Brady." This, in brief, was the decision reached at the meeting of the executive committee of the Civic League held last Saturday afternoon. The active interest and support of all the various bodies of the city in everything that pertains to the welfare and advancement of Brady is, by this action, made possible, and through the various units, the Civic League, as representative of each and all of them, expects to accomplish great and lasting benefits for the City of Brady.

The meeting of the executive committee was marked by harmony and enthusiasm. First of all it was decided that the full co-operation of every citizen was essential to the carrying out of any object which the Civic League might decide upon. Therefore, the forming of a federation of the various clubs, societies and lodges of the city was unanimously decided upon. The plan of operation will be to have each such club, society or lodge name one of its active members as a delegate to the Civic League, such delegate to serve as a member of the Executive committee of the League.

As the sole purpose of the League was decided to be "For the Betterment of Brady," each delegate will have a voice in bringing before the League matters pertaining to the welfare of Brady. These matters will be acted upon by the delegates present, and the action reported to the various unit bodies, each of whom will be asked to lend its hearty support and co-operation in the matter which the League decides to advocate. This mode of operation will not only give every unit organization the privilege of bringing before the body the measures it desires to advocate, but will give every other unit a voice in the matter of whether or not the

Come out and help give the new Brady band a rousing start. The band boys have the assurance of being able to get a first-class instructor, and have been promised hearty support and encouragement by the citizens of Brady. Quite naturally they are unable to employ a permanent instructor before the organization is completed, and for this reason it is especially desired that a full attendance of band men and citizens be had at the meeting, so that there may be a full understanding of the plan upon which the band will be organized.

### SAM MCKNIGHT SHIPS TOP-NOTCH STEERS FRIDAY

Sam McKnight last Friday loaded out a shipment of Whiteface Herefords, conceded by local cattlemen to be the finest bunch of cattle ever sent to market from this section of Texas. There was 130 head in the shipment, and all the animals had been fed since last fall on cotton seed and grass on the McKnight ranch in the Lohn community. Their average weight was estimated locally at better than 1100 lbs. The cattle were consigned to Kansas City market, where they were to be unloaded and offered, and if not sold, they were to be carried on to Chicago market.

That the judgment of the local cattlemen was good is borne out in the telegram received this morning by Mr. McKnight advising that the cattle had been sold at 7c on the Kansas City market, with an average weight of 1111 pounds.

This is but the first shipment from Mr. McKnight's big herd of Whiteface, and he expects to load out two more shipments, one possibly Friday of this week, and the second next Sunday, each of which will average about 130 head, and which will rank well up with the first shipment.

**COINS WERE MADE BY CONFEDERATE STATES—AT N. O.**

Just recently The News has received inquiries as to whether the Confederate States Government coined any money at any time. To one of these questions answer was made, by mail, that it had not. On further investigation it has been ascertained that this answer was not strictly correct, yet practically so.

A volume entitled "The Rare Coins of America and Foreign Countries," issued in October, 1897, it is stated that on Jan. 26, 1861, the United States mint in New Orleans was seized by the State authorities of Louisiana, the State having that day seceded from the Union. This volume further states that up to May 30 following, about four months, the Confederate States had coined 2,000,000 pieces, half dollars; that is to say \$1,000,000. It is hardly credible that this number of half dollars was coined. Not one of the eleven Confederate States produced any silver. It is true some silver bullion might have been seized with the mint, and it is true that every devoted woman of the South would have gladly contributed every ounce of her silverware, but these probabilities are too remote to give credence to the statement of \$2,000,000 half dollars having been coined.

**Two Coins at New Orleans.**

The evidence is beyond question that two silver half dollars were coined by the Confederacy at the New Orleans mint for Mrs. Susan B. Harrison, house regent of the Confederate Museum in Richmond, Va., writing The News under date of June 1, ultimo, says: "There are in existence two Confederate half dollars made at the mint in New Orleans. As far as I can find out, there were only four of these made. We have in the Virginia room of the museum a Confederate cent, 1861. It was made in Philadelphia, Pa., the die being broken in the making."

A resolution adopted by the Confederate States Congress gives evidence of the desire of the Confederate Government to coin money. This resolution reads:

"The Congress of the Confederate States do resolve that the mints at New Orleans and Dahlonega shall be continued and the proper arrangements made as soon as possible to provide dies for the coin of the Confederate States."

This enactment was made in March of 1861.

Richmond Museum.  
What a wonderful monument to the Confederate States is this museum in Richmond! But that is another story," as Rudyard Kipling would say.

The Confederacy had two mints, that at New Orleans, the other at Dahlonega, Ga., this one being in the midst of the gold mines in Lumpkin County, Georgia. The output of these mines was small and while also there was gold in Virginia, South Carolina, North Carolina, Tennessee and Alabama, none of these were very rich and in the midst of war on every hand the mines could not have been worked to any appreciable extent, so where

could the Confederacy obtain a supply of the metals necessary for coinage?

It may be asked how did the Confederacy secure gold to pay for the construction of the man of war Alabama, the Shenandoah, the Florida, the Stonewall Jackson and other vessels, the war material necessary for these vessels and their crews? This was done by sale of cotton run out on blockade runners, and not a little cotton was shipped through Brownsville, Texas, by way of Matamoros, Mex., to British steamers outside the mouth of the Rio Grande.

For home needs the Government had speedy recourse to paper notes and bonds. No war can be carried on without a money chest, but the Southern Confederacy came nearer doing it than any other land under the sun ever did. Her sole dependence for home needs were promises to pay. Some of these "I owe you's" bore in-

terest and some did not. The first paper money issued was engraved on paper smuggled in from New York City. A man named Hover in Richmond, an engraver of cards and posters, made the plates and the first money issued was eight \$100 bills. All these notes of various denominations were printed on a hand press, yet soon there were thousands of dollars abroad in the Southland, as welcome to the brave hearts in the ranks of the Confederate armies and the devoted men and women at home as though they were gold. They were dearer far to the gallant men who were dying for the cause they represented and loyal men and women, enduring any and all privations without murmur, that the cause dearer than life to them might live.

**Bonds and Notes.**

Each one of the different issues of bonds and notes bore the pictures of George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, John C. Calhoun and other fathers

and exemplars of free Democratic government, and of the leaders in the Southern cause, Jefferson Davis, his Cabinet officers and some of the fair women of the land, notably Mrs. Jefferson Davis and Mrs. Governor Pickens was Miss Lucy Holcomb, who was reared in Marshall, Texas. She was reputed as the prettiest woman, not only in Texas, but the whole South. She was the toast and the belle of every occasion, especially in Washington City, where she won the heart of United States Senator Francis Pickens of South Carolina, accompanying him to Russia, where he went as Minister in the Buchanan administration. He was the war Governor of South Carolina from 1861 to the close of the war.

### What Others Think About The Plan:

#### BANKERS' STATE CONVENTION ENDORSES FARM BUREAU PLAN.

Not A Dissenting Vote When San Antonio Meeting Thanks Sapiro and Appoints Committee to Help.

San Antonio.—More than a thousand bankers assembled at the Texas Bankers' Association Convention here unanimously passed a resolution to thank Aaron Sapiro, California Marketing expert, for his address to the convention, to endorse the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Growers' Co-operative Marketing Association, and to appoint a committee of three bankers to work with the sales division of the Texas Farm Bureau in every way possible. Oxsheer Smith, Joseph Hirsch and L. Talley were appointed by the chair.

Dallas.—"I can not see how the plan can fail to succeed," declared Joe Hirsch, a banker of Corpus Christi in addressing a Dallas meeting of farmers and bankers here, called to discuss the co-operation of bankers with the Texas Farm Bureau in its plans for a million bale cotton pool.

"Even though the market price should fall to advance, continued Mr. Hirsch, a saving of at least \$10 to \$20 a bale should be realized by the elimination of country damage and the expenses and profits of the various buying agencies operating in the towns of the state."

"Personally, I believe the principles underlying the plan are sound. It is understood that the movement is one of selling and not of holding," said Lynn P. Talley, Deputy Governor of the Dallas Federal Reserve Bank.

"We are satisfied, from our investigation of this undertaking and from our knowledge of the men in charge of it, that it is in capable hands, that if successfully prosecuted, it will result in larger net returns to the producer, in a safer and more satisfactory settlement of debts, in a saving of much waste and in the establishment of a more economic system of agriculture in the cotton region.

"For these reasons we cordially commend the undertaking to the consideration of bankers and merchants, and we urge them to do whatever may be becoming in assisting the Texas Farm Bureau Federation to get this Co-Operative Cotton Growers' Association into operation at the earliest possible time.

The association intends to hire the best informed cotton man in the South for this purpose, just as the California Prune Growers employed the best dried fruit expert in the world to merchandise their crop. A ruling of the Federal Reserve Bank permits the association to make advances to growers on delivery of cotton, etc. The Agricultural Committee of the Texas Bankers Association has examined the marketing plan very carefully and pronounced it economically sound and conforming to safe banking practice.
