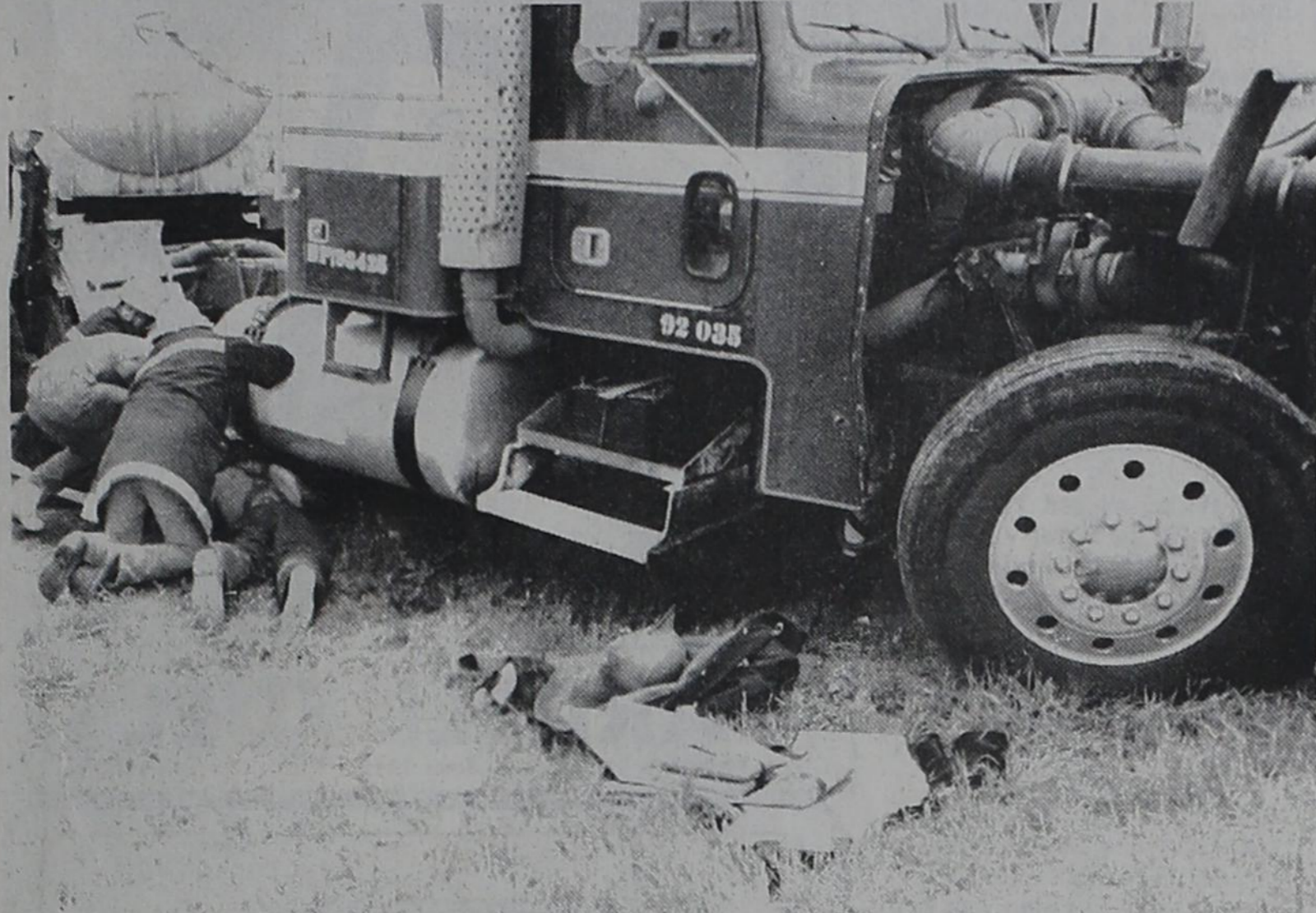

## Trucker dies after Sunday wreck

A Bowie man was killed and a Dimmitt woman was injured in a two-vehicle accident Sunday afternoon.

Wilson Bryant Mayo Sr., 45, of Bowie, died Sunday at 11:15 p.m. at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo. Mayo was taken there after his body was pulled from the wreckage of his tanker truck.

Kayla Ann Jones, 17, was hospitalized at last report at Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt, suffering from a broken nose and abrasions.

Mayo was northbound on US 385, on his way into Dimmitt from the Goodpasture plant. Jones was southbound on 385, and was attempting to turn into the parking lot of the vacant Chevrolet dealership at the south end of town when she ran squarely into the side of the truck's tractor.

"When I first went over to (Jones') pickup, I didn't expect to find her alive," said Stan McDaniel, who witnessed the accident. "It knocked the girl almost out. She couldn't breathe; her nose was obviously broken. It knocked the windshield completely out of the pickup and demolished the front

end. "The springs broke on (Mayo's) truck, came up and hit the accelerator and threw it wide open. I guess the truck ran over him after he was thrown out. The truck knocked the pickup around to where it was facing the opposite direction.

"It kept going to the embankment on the south edge of the pavement and dug in. The truck was smoking, and there was battery

acid all over the hood of the truck. It was quite a bad scene."

Emergency equipment from the Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Dept. was called to free Mayo from the wreckage.

There were no passengers in either vehicle.

Services for Mayo were held Wednesday at Sullivan Funeral

## SSC seeks city, county support

Dimmitt, Hart and Castro County officials have been asked to contribute, along with other area cities and counties, to assist the pursuit of the Superconducting Super Collider northeast of Dimmitt.

The Amarillo SSC group, which has already won the state's favor for the Happy Site (roughly bounded by Dimmitt, Hereford, Canyon and Tulia) is seeking \$7,874 from Castro County, \$3,050 from Dimmitt and \$601 from Hart to help fund "what they need for a world-class proposal," said Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce manager Delores Heller, who attended a meeting along with city and county officials and other interested persons last Thursday in Amarillo.

As of June 20, The Texas Panhandle SSC, Inc., the group behind the Happy site push, has spent \$45,599.71 in "hard" dollars and \$150,000 in "soft" or volunteer

dollars. TPSSC says the state will pay \$250,000 of the \$390,000 it will take to develop a "world class proposal" for consideration by the Dept. of Energy.

Additional costs, including a national marketing program, travel expenses, campaigning for passage of a state bond election to support efforts to land the SSC, \$72,000 to the Utility Engineer Corp., for further development of the Happy Site, and the cost of money drive the total need to \$447,000.

Dimmitt city officials have already pledged up to \$250,000 in cash support for the project, but county officials won't address the issue until the next commissioner's court meeting on July 13.

TPSSC officials have placed an Aug. 1 deadline on funding for the proposal, which is to be ready for submittal to DOE on Aug. 3.

## Dedication, celebration scheduled here Saturday

The county's newest historical marker will be dedicated and a day-long, county-wide celebration is scheduled Saturday in Dimmitt.

The Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce will sponsor its annual fireworks display and youth dance to cap Independence Day activities.

The marker, the sixth to be placed in the county, will be unveiled Saturday at 10 a.m. at the Castro County Courthouse, and will detail the history of courthouses in the county seat. Three courthouses have occupied the present site since the county was organized in 1891, and the present facility was built in 1938 and expanded 30 years later to its present size.

The program will include the welcome by John Brooks, presentation of colors, the singing of "God Bless America," led by Bill Sava, the unveiling, reading, acceptance and dedication of the marker, and recognition of officials or descendants on hand for the ceremony.

Also to be presented are the new cemetery survey books prepared by the Castro County Historical Commission, which is responsible for obtaining the marker. Limited copies of the surveys are available.

Dimmitt's Immaculate Conception Catholic Church is sponsoring a celebration at the Castro County

Expo Building from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m.

The celebration will include food booths serving hot dogs, hamburgers, traditional Mexican dinners, snow cones and authentic Mexican candies, and pie walks, cake walks, a dunking board and balloons.

Door prizes will be given away every 30 minutes, and live music will play throughout the day.

A youth dance for high school and college students will be held at the Expo from 9:30 p.m. until 12:30 a.m.

The fireworks display will begin at 9:30 p.m. across from the Dimmitt High School practice field.

Donations are still being accepted by the Chamber to offset costs.

Fireworks stands opened in the county last week, with benefit stands being operated by the Dimmitt Kiwanis Club just west and east of the Dimmitt city limits and by the Sunnyside Lions Club at the Sunnyside Community Building.

Sunnyside will celebrate with a barbecue, soft drinks and ice cream throughout the day Saturday at the community building, along with visiting and games throughout the afternoon. The Lions will hold their annual display at sundown.

Proceeds will benefit club

projects for both the Sunnyside Lions and the Dimmitt Kiwanis' stands.

Authorities warned that fireworks may not be discharged within the city limits.

Meanwhile, booths are still available for the arts and crafts show to be held in conjunction with Hart Days July 11.

Booths are available for \$25 each by calling 938-2249 or 938-2384.

Nazareth's annual German Festival will also be held July 11, and tickets for both dances to be held that night are currently available in Nazareth and Dimmitt.

For The Maines Brothers Band, who will play from 8:30 p.m. until 12:30 a.m. at the Nazareth Community Hall, advance tickets are \$8 each.

For the Caprock Country Band, performing at the American Legion Hall, advance tickets are \$4 per person.

Advance tickets for both dances are available in Dimmitt At Pro-Ag, Inc., at 106 East Halsell. In Nazareth, tickets may be purchased at Richard's Town Pump or Elmer's Package Store.

to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation."

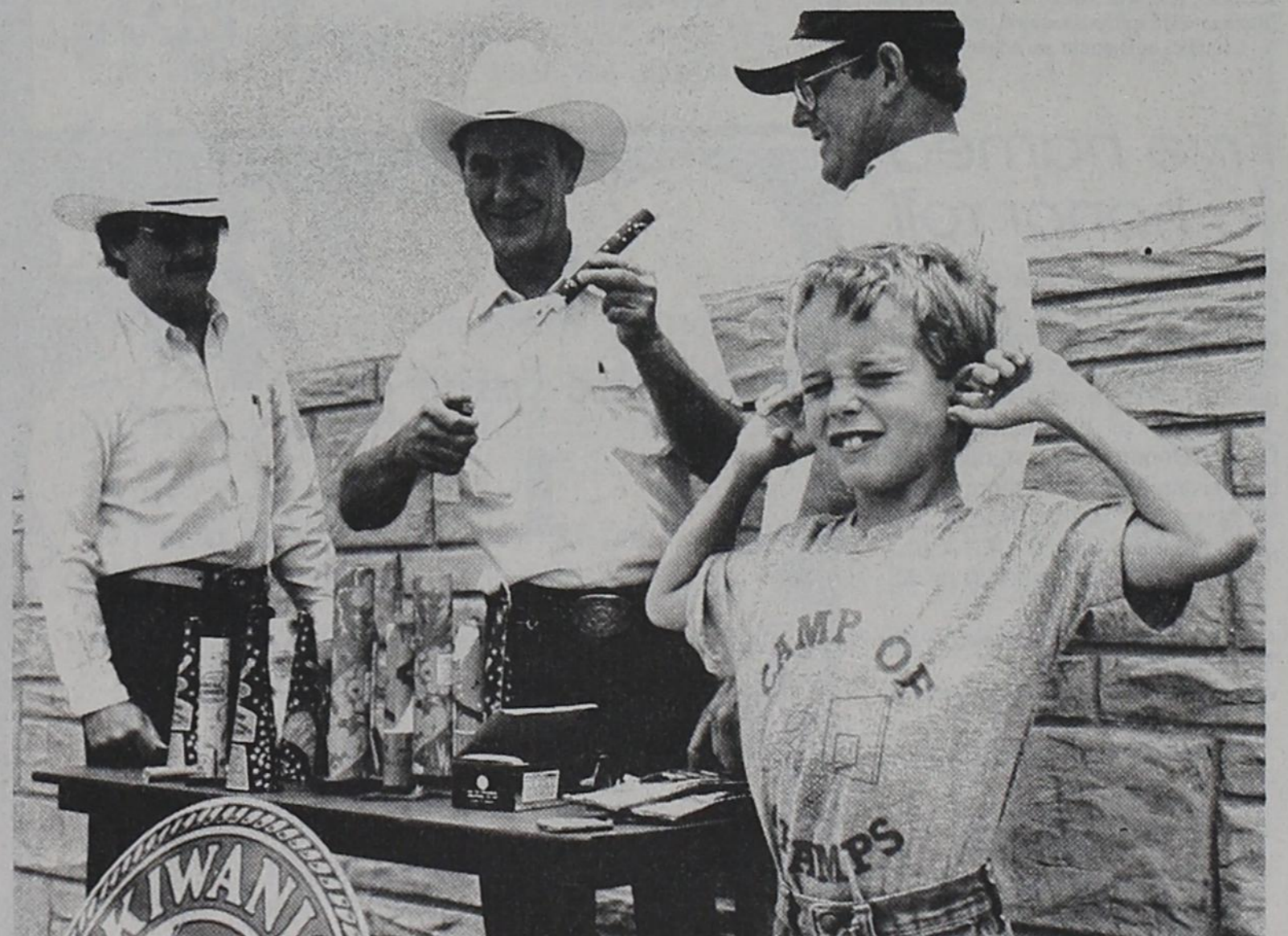

Dinner was served in the lovely dining room and dancing resumed after dinner.

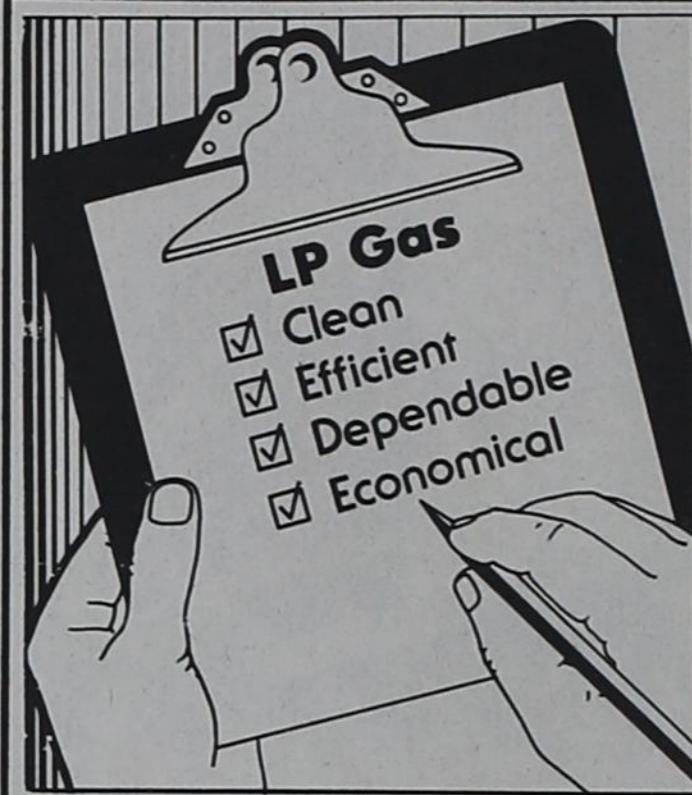

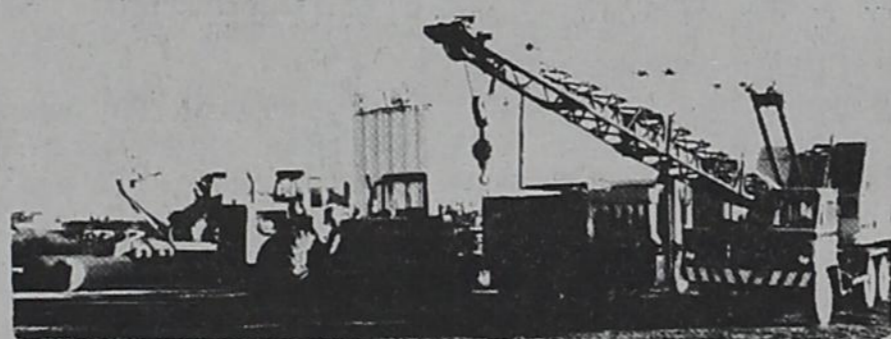

### Social Security in Castro County

By TERRY J. CLEMENTS

People who plan to apply for monthly Social Security retirement, survivor or disability benefits can help speed the process if they are well prepared at the time they apply.

The applications are designed to obtain information about the worker, spouse, children, and work history, including military service and railroad employment. Applications for disability benefits also record information about the person's disabling condition.

A person will need certain documents to support his or her claim. Only original copies of documents or copies certified by the issuing agency can be used. Uncertified photocopies are not acceptable.

Some or all of the following documents may be required in a particular case: Birth certificate; proof of military service; W-2 form or self-employment tax return for the most recent year; proof of marriage; proof of divorce; children's birth certificates; and death certificate if applying for survivor benefits should have information about their work history and information about the sources that treated them for their medical condition.

A person should not delay applying for benefits because he or she does not have all of the required evidence. People at the Social Security office may be able to suggest alternatives.

When possible, a person should apply two or three months before he or she wants benefits to begin. This will allow plenty of time to process the claim so checks will start on time.

You do not have to visit a Social Security office to apply. They can take care of this by telephone or they can call to set up an appointment at 293-9623 in Plainview, or go by 1401-B W. Fifth.

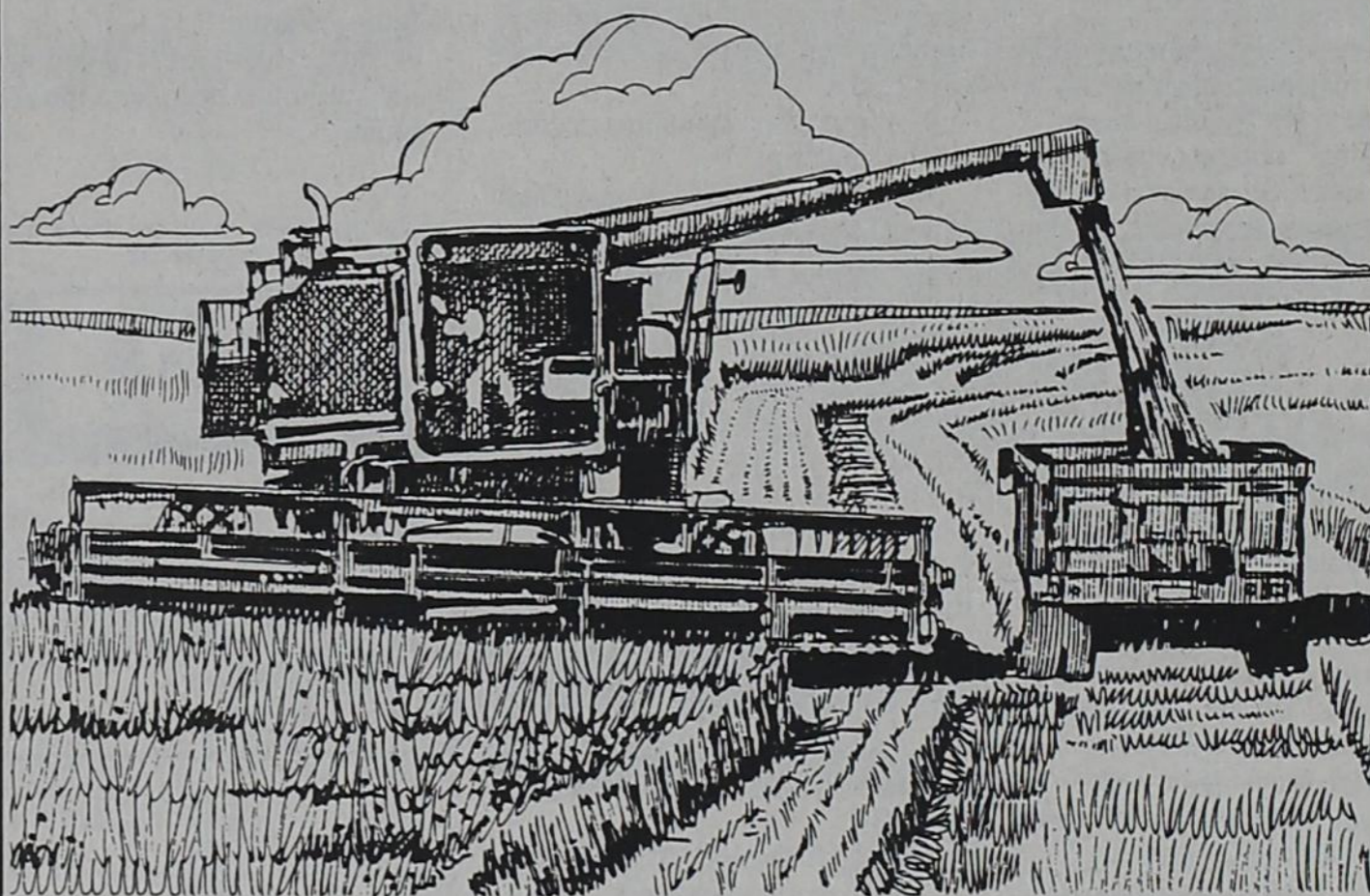

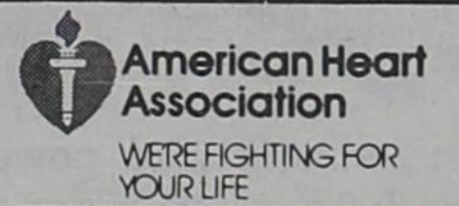

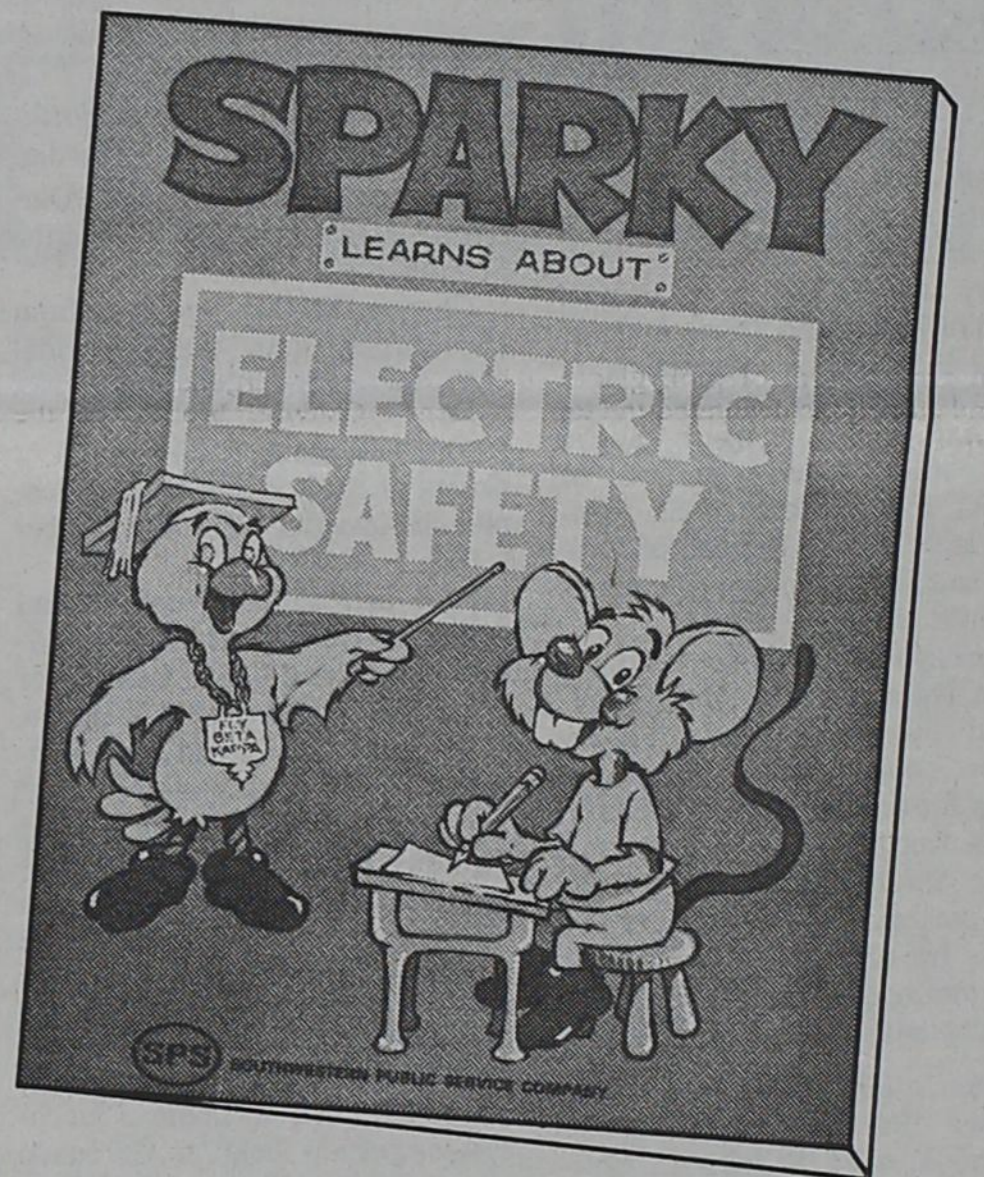

The organization sold tickets for the night and had 200 printed up. 197 tickets out of the 200 were sold, according to Davis.

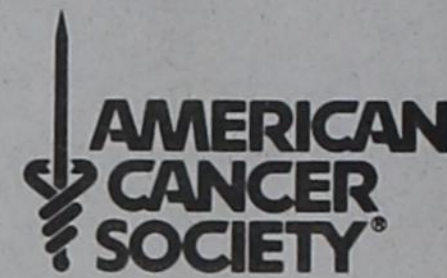
"We didn't have any food left over. Everything went just super," she added.

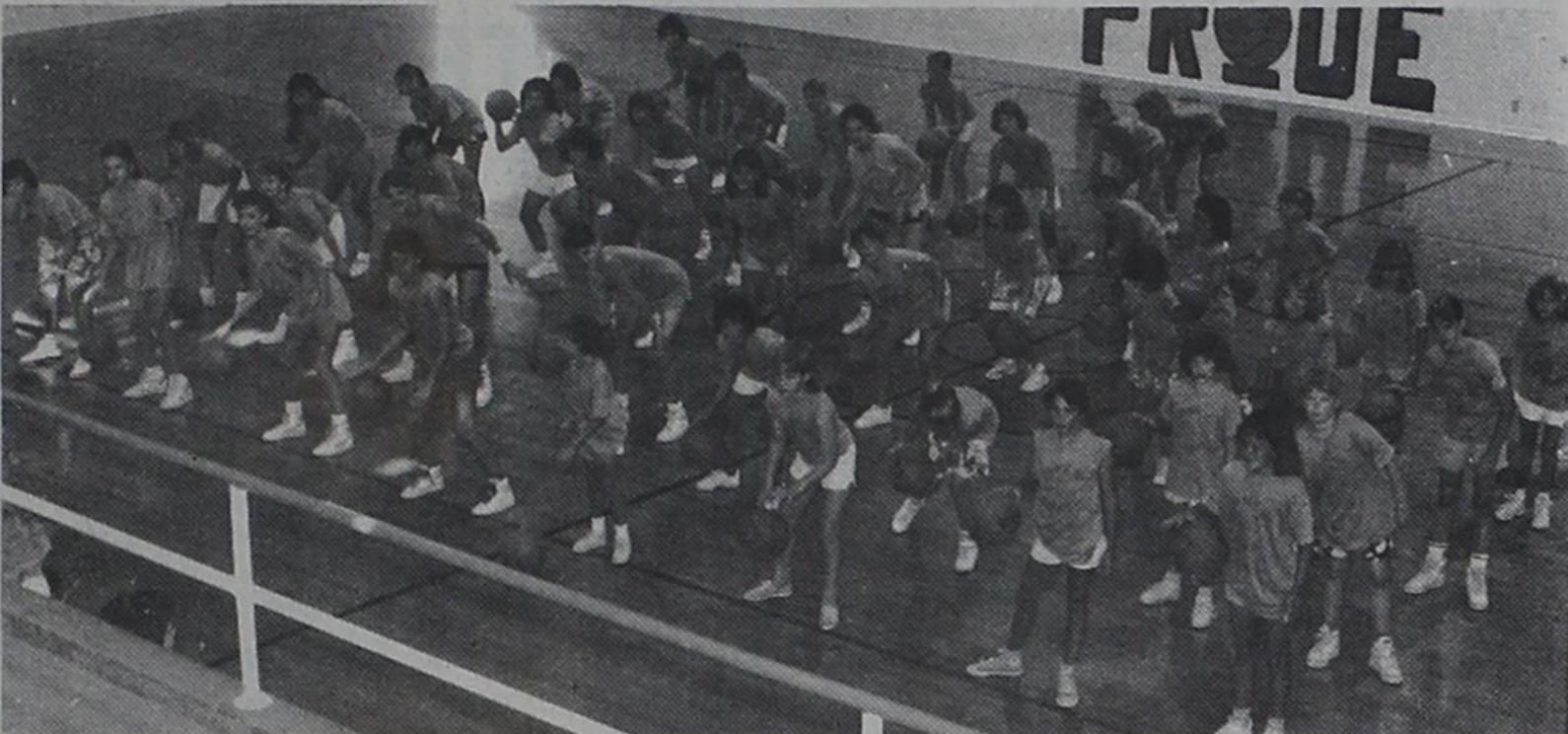

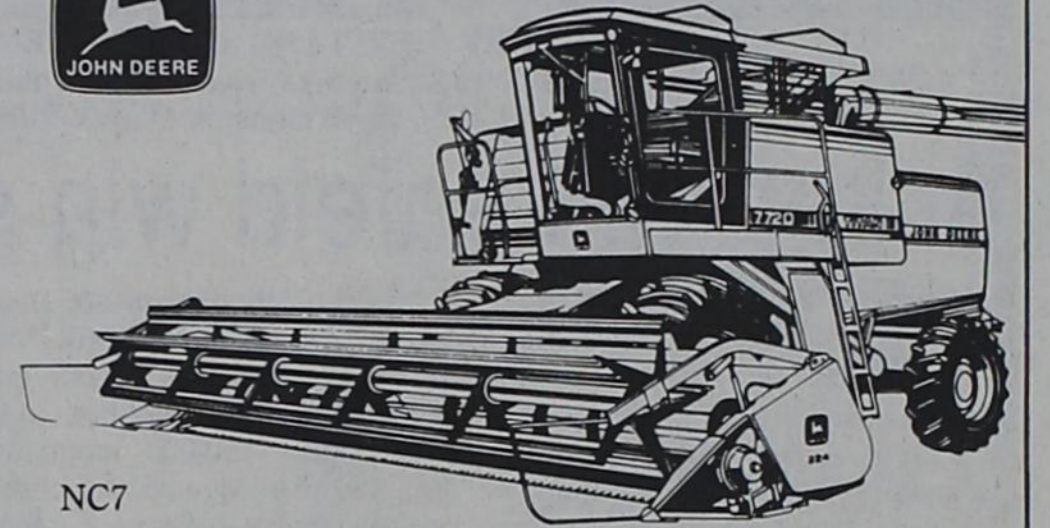

## Water field day planned

The latest techniques in farm water management will be discussed at a field water conservation demonstration day July 9 from 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the Coby Gilbreath farm.

The farm is located on FM 145, three miles east of the intersection of FM 145 and US 385. The program is a joint effort of the Extension Services, Soil Conservation

Service and High Plains Water District.

Featured attractions will include demonstrations of the mini mobile field water conservation laboratory for evaluation of irrigation sprinkler systems and a rainfall simulator depicting water infiltration into the soil profile under different types of land treatments.

Jerry Funck, ag engineer with the High Plains Water District, will explain pump efficiency testing, while Gary Hunter, district conservationist with the Running Water Soil and Water Conservation District, will discuss drip irrigation and windbreaks.

Also planned are exhibits on surge irrigation, soil moisture monitoring, chemigation, and LEPA irrigation and modifications.

A free lunch will be sponsored by local dealers for Riverside Ter-

ra, Monsanto, Tide, Dupont and Ciba-Geigy.

"The field day is designed to increase public awareness of the potential savings that can be obtained through increased water and energy use efficiency," Funck said, "as well as improved water management. We show producers ways they can reduce their production costs through higher levels of efficiency."

"This year we're going to discuss ideas that apply to the dryland producers as well as the irrigation farmers. These water management techniques that we're demonstrating are being adopted by many area farmers as practical and inexpensive methods which are easily incorporated into their management program. We feel these are the best water management techniques for farm use."

**Four persons are sentenced**

Four persons were sentenced recently in 64th District Court in Dimmitt by Judge Jack Miller. Gloria Lopez, 23, of Dimmitt, was sentenced to 150 days in jail for damage to the glass door at the Dimmitt Mini Mart on Feb. 24 in connection with an attempted burglary. Victor Aleman Martinez, 19, of Dimmitt, was sentenced to nine years in prison for the burglary of Killingsworth True Value Hardware on March 14. Joe Luis Soler, 22, formerly of Dimmitt, was sentenced to two years in prison for the forgery of a check at the Red-X Travel Center in Dimmitt. Andres Lopez, 25, of Corpus Christi, was sentenced to an unspecified term in the Abilene Restitution Center for violation of terms of his probation.

**Grand jury indicts nine**

A former Hart man who escaped from the Castro County Jail last Oct. 21 has been arrested in Colorado. Cruz Nunez, 23, has refused to waive extradition to Texas. Nunez, who had been jailed on a violation of probation charge, and Ricardo Coronado are alleged to have sawed through bolts holding a steel mesh screen over the jail window, then using mattress covers as ropes to lower themselves to the ground. Coronado is still a fugitive. Nunez, who was originally on probation for a burglary conviction, is also wanted by Kansas authorities on a narcotics charge. He was being held in Potter County Jail in Amarillo and escaped from there. He was later arrested near Hart and was being held in the Castro County Jail on several charges when he escaped from the local facility. Nunez, who was indicted on an escape charge by the 64th District Court Grand Jury last week, will probably first go to Kansas to face narcotics and escape charges there before being sent to Dimmitt. Also indicted by the grand jury, and their alleged offenses, according to County-District Attorney Jimmy Davis, were: Victor Manuel Grajeda, 26, of Hart, who was arrested for driving while intoxicated — third offense, May 10; Alvin Simon, 33, Dimmitt, DWI — third offense June 7; Larry Don Vaughn, 31, Rt. 1, Muleshoe, possession of marijuana, over four ounces, on March 8; Jaime Salazar, 18, Hart, burglary of a building, Feb. 8; Charles Louis Birkenfeld Jr., 17, Nazareth, burglary of a building, May 18; A 29-year-old Lamb County resident for forgery by passing, regarding a check passed at a Nazareth liquor store on Jan. 9; Two Dimmitt residents, ages 17 and 19, charged in the June 5 burglary of a residence in northeast Dimmitt. The names of the last three persons were not released because they have not yet been arrested.

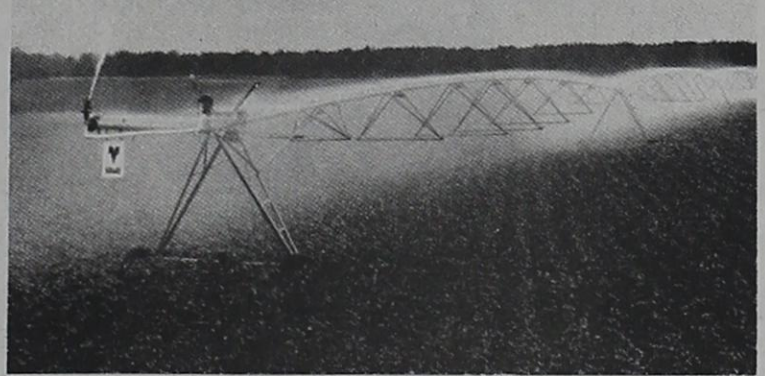

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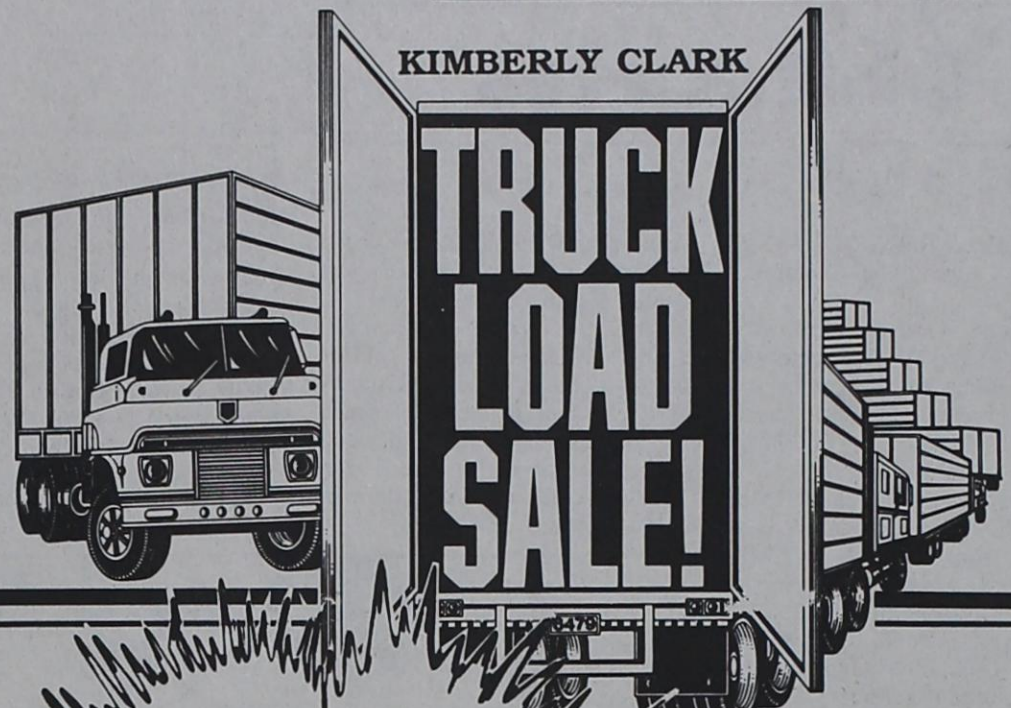

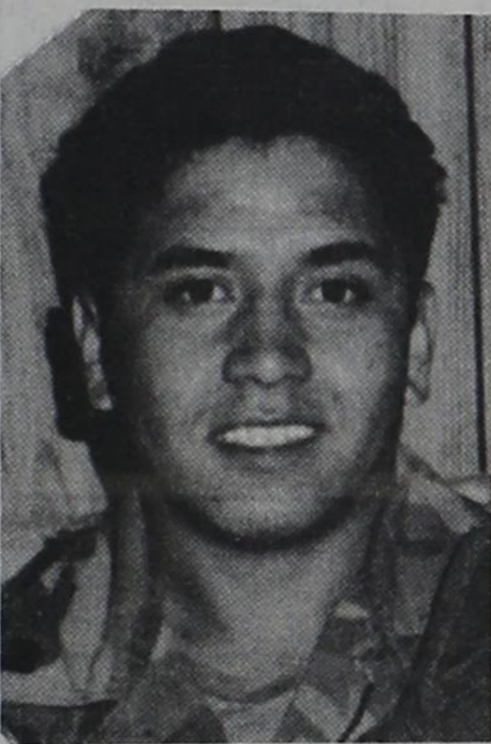
## Julian A. Garcia
