BRADY AND McCULLOCH CO. CITIZENS TO CELEBRATE GREAT VICTORY

RED CROSS PARADE, WITH BRADY BAND, AMERICAN LEGIONNAIRES AND ALL SCHOOL CHILDREN OF COUNTY PARTICIPATING, TO BE FEATURE.

The nation's newest and greatest holiday—Armistice Day—is to be appropriately celebrated next Friday, November 11th in Brady, the citizens of Brady and the citizenship of all McCulloch county joining in the making of the occasion a most memorable one. A great Red Cross parade, with Brady's new band, the Elijah F. Allin Post of the American legion and all ex-service men, and all the school children of Brady and McCulloch county, participating, is to be the great feature of the occasion. The parade will form at the Central school building, and begin its march promptly at 10:00 o'clock, circling the square. At noon the court house lawn will be the scene of a big basket picnic, in which all the citizens, far and near, are invited to participate.

Acting in harmony with the proclamation of President Harding declaring Armistice Day a National holiday, all business will be suspended next Friday, and all the schools of the city and county will close in order to enable the school children to join in the great celebration. The joyous scenes of November 11th, 1918, are to be repeated in Brady, although the celebration this year will be decidedly more befitting the occasion than was the wild rejoicing that followed the announcing of the great armistice three years ago.

The Parade.
As before stated, the big feature of the occasion will be the Red Cross parade. Brady's new band will make its initial appearance upon this occasion, heading the parade, and playing music befitting the occasion. All Brady is proud of her band—all McCulloch county will be proud of the band, when they hear it play, and note what wonderful strides have been made in the organization in the four months of its organization.

The Legionnaires.
Next in line of march will be the Elijah F. Allin Post of the American legion. Every member is urgently requested to be present and in uniform, if possible. Also every ex-service man is cordially invited and expected to join with the legionnaires in the parade, and no soldier should remain away on account of lack of uniform. Wear your uniform, if possible, but get in the line of march, uniform or no uniform. All McCulloch county is proud of her soldier boys, and is ready to do honor to each and every one of the several hundreds of heroes who fought for world democracy in 1917-18. The soldier boys will meet at 9 o'clock at the legion's reading room, across the hall from the Odd Fellows lodge room.

School Children.
The Brady school board, and County Superintendent W. M. Deans, have declared Armistice Day a school holiday, and every school child of the county is wanted in the parade. Each of the schools will march in sections, displaying their banners, and are at liberty to adopt any original ideas as decorative costumes or effects that they may desire.

Decorated Cars.
Decorated floats and cars will follow in the line, and every merchant and citizen of the county is urged to have a car or a float in the parade. A number of cars will be decorated with Red Cross banners and designs, and the "Peace Time Program" of the Red Cross will be exemplified in mottoes and in illustrations.

Line of March.
The parade is to begin forming at the Central school building at 9:00 o'clock or earlier, and everything is to be in readiness for the parade to move promptly at 10:00 o'clock. From the school building, the line of march will be to Blackburn street, down Blackburn to the public square, and then circling the square.

Basket Dinner.
The climax of the day's celebration will be found in the big basket dinner to be given on the court house lawn, and in which every citizen is cordially invited to take part. Everyone bring well-filled baskets, and join in this great picnic.

Red Cross Roll Call.
Armistice Day will mark the beginning of the Red Cross Annual Roll Call, the days officially designated being November 11-24th. During this period it will be the endeavor of the McCulloch County Red Cross to enlist every citizen of the county as a member of the Red Cross. The annual membership fee is but \$1.00. The Red Cross is spending ten million dollars a year to help the ex-service man and his family. It is ready with aid and comfort in cases of fire, flood and pestilence. It is working wherever there is a need or a call. McCulloch county should be 100% strong in Red Cross membership. Not only that, but the local

VICTOR BRADLEY HOME COMPLETELY DESTROYED BY FIRE THURSDAY NOON

The home of Victor Bradley, seven miles from town on the Coleman road, was completely destroyed by fire shortly after noon Thursday. Mr. and Mrs. Bradley and children had left the place at 12:20, immediately after finishing dinner, and had gone across the mountain on a visit. Their first intimation of the fire was when smoke reached the place, the walls had fallen in. Some twenty or thirty neighbors had already gathered by that time, attracted by the conflagration, but the house was a mass of flames before even the first of them arrived, and nothing could be done towards saving any of the contents.

The house was a comfortable six-room dwelling, and had been built only last year by Mr. Bradley. The loss will run over \$6,000, not to mention the destruction of innumerable keepsakes and mementoes of sentimental value. Mr. Bradley carried \$3,000 insurance on the house and contents.

The origin of the fire is a mystery, and the only plausible explanation is that one of the burners on the oil stove might have been left burning, and caused an explosion.

DR. A. F. UPTON OF STACY VICTIM OF GUN ACCIDENT

Dr. A. F. Upton, physician at Stacy, was the victim of his own gun while hunting last Friday with W. S. Dickerson, prominent citizen of Stacy and former county commissioner, near the latter's place three miles southeast of Stacy. Dr. Upton was in his car and had shot one bird and had crippled another. Dickerson was out of the car after the game. According to Mr. Dickerson, who was in Brady Saturday, Dr. Upton's gun, a double-barreled shotgun, slipped out of his hand, and both barrels were discharged when it struck the running board or the ground. The heavy charges of shot struck the unfortunate man in the right side, ranging upward and passing out over the heart on the left side of the body.

Dr. Upton retained consciousness, telling Dickerson he was fatally wounded and giving the disposition of his effects. He was carried to the Dickerson home, where he died before medical aid could reach him.

Dr. Upton was 61 years of age. He was formerly located in Coleman county, and a daughter resides in Coleman, while his other children reside in various parts of the state. The body was carried to Coleman Friday night, and funeral services were conducted there Saturday.

AN ERROR.

In taking up the matter of local water rates in our last Tuesday issue, The Standard, through a printer's error, gave the impression that the company had repaid all the money advanced to it by citizens to tide it over in its time of distress. This false impression was the result of a line being misplaced in making typographical corrections in this article. As it was written, and as it should have appeared, the sentence read:

"***** Now that the plant is established on a firm financial footing; is paying huge monthly revenue, and will, in the course of a few months, have repaid all money advanced by patriotic citizens, the citizenship feels that it is mete and just that their burden should be lightened."

The Standard is pleased to state that, while no action has so far been taken by the board of water commissioners, the board views with favor the reduction of rates during the coming summer, so as to enable the citizenship to use water more freely. At present, however, with unpaid balances due for money advanced by the citizens, with the new pump still to be paid for, with unpaid interest and various other piled up indebtedness they feel that it is imperative that this indebtedness be cleared.

It also appears the opinion of the board that the entire indebtedness of the plant should be cleared up at the earliest possible moment, and while this plan has its merits, yet The Standard cannot endorse such action if by so doing, the liberal use of water becomes prohibitive. The Standard does not oppose the plant's making large dividends in order to retire its debts, but believes that while they are paying heavily in this good cause, the citizenship should be entitled to all the water they can use just as long as the city's well can furnish the water.

PROCLAMATION OF THE COMMANDER OF THE AMERICAN LEGION TO LEGIONNAIRES.

November 2, 1921.

To Post Adjutant:

On the 11th day of November we will celebrate the third anniversary of the greatest historical event this era of civilization has ever known—Armistice Day—that day when our efforts, combined with that of our Allies, forced our enemies to lay down their arms in defeat to the everlasting glory of American manhood and the principles of which it stands. We, as members of the American Legion of Texas, should therefore strive to perpetuate the sentiments which were foremost in our hearts on that great day, the anniversary of which we will soon be called upon to celebrate; both of joy and of thanksgiving for our triumph in arms and the victory of the principles for which we fought, together with the solemn thought and sacred memory of our fallen brothers who made the supreme sacrifice, and who, by their unselfish giving of their all, have made this great day possible.

We have another battle yet to fight and win, the great battle of peace, the fighting and winning of which will make our country one of peaceful homes and contented and progressive citizenship. We have gone too far to turn back. We must advance, and advancing, strive to teach those with whom we mingle, the beauty and glory of One Hundred Per Cent Americanism, and the deep sense of satisfaction which a man may only attain by absolute loyalty to his flag.

I, therefore, as Commander of the American Legion of the Department of Texas, do hereby proclaim the week beginning November 4th and ending November 11th, as Americanization Week, and do hereby instruct each Post in Texas and each individual member in this State to take such action in their respective communities as will impress the citizenship thereof with our honesty of purpose and hope of improvement in attaining One Hundred Per Cent Americanism throughout the Nation.

I do hereby also proclaim November 11, 1921, as Armistice Day, hereby instructing each Post of the American Legion in Texas and authorizing each of said Posts to hold such suitable programs in their respective localities as they may deem proper, keeping in mind that it is both a day of joyous thanksgiving and also one sacred to the memories of those who did not return.

TEXAS-MEERS SHULTZ WELL FULL OF OIL

The 1390 foot hole of the Shultz well, near Millersview, is standing 1,000 feet in a fine grade of oil, according to a phone message from W. O. Shultz to John A. Weeks Monday night. Mr. Shultz reported that this oil flowed through the bridge in the well, after the bridge-over had occurred from shooting the well last Saturday.

After eighty quarts of nitro had been touched off in the well last Saturday, gas flow amounting to 1,000,000 cubic feet developed, and as the drillers were arranging to clean out the hole preparatory to putting it under pump, the hole almost filled up with oil.

Work began immediately to drill through the bridge, and much interest is being manifested in what may develop after the bridge is drilled out.

This is the third well put down on the Shultz ranch and was drilled by the Texas-Meers Co. At practically the same depth in all the wells a good showing of oil was found, and this well is creating more excitement than either of the others, and scouts are looking for it to show up good, and if a paying producer will open the field for further development.

A number of local citizens who are interested in oil development were arranging to visit the well Tuesday to see for themselves just how the development was progressing.—Balingier Banner-Ledger.

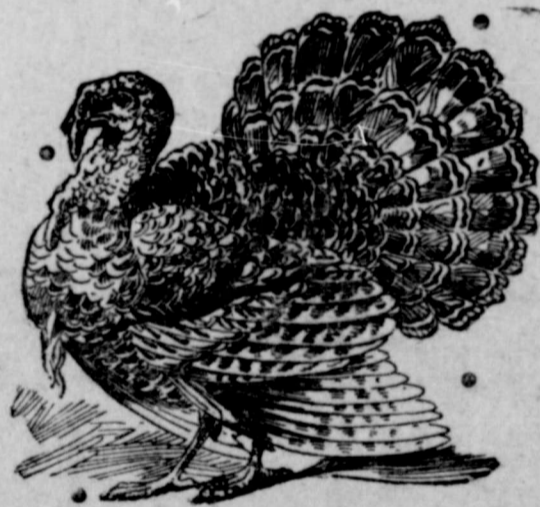
