McCULLOCH COUNTY GOOD ROADS ASSOCIATION

Report of Committee on Organization.

Mr. Chairman: We, your committee on organization, beg to submit the

following report:

That, whereas, having carefully considered the different methods of financing road building projects; we, therefore, heartily endorse the issuance of Bonds as being the only logical method of securing money for building roads and highways in McCulloch county and therefore endorse and hereby pledge our support in favor of voting for the issuance of bonds at the election to be held December 20, 1921, and we hereby endorse the action of the 447 petitioners in asking for said election and the action of the Commissioners court in ordering said election for that date.

We further recommend,

That this association be permanently organized, and that the membership consist of those who have previously signed the pledge to support the present bond issue, together with all other citizens who are good road boosters and who are in favor of said Bond issue, who wish to become members.

That an active campaign be immediately put on for mem-

That the name of said organization be, "The McCulloch County Good Roads Association."

That the object and purpose of said organization be, To promote the building, constructing and maintaining of roads and highways in McCulloch county.

That the officers of this association shall consist of a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, a Secretary and a Treasurer.

That a similar organization be organized in each voting precinct in the county, and that the chairman appoint members of this association to go into each of said precincts to assist in organizing these different precinct organizations, and also that the chairman designate at least one man from each precinct, who shall have authority and whose duty it shall be to organize said local organization in his precinct.

That the chairman of each precinct organization, together with the officers of this county organization, be designated the Executive committee of the association.

That said Executive committee meet at Brady, Saturday, December 3, 1921, with reports from the different organizations and with suggestions and plans for the remaining days of the campaign.

It is further recommended that the Central Campaign committee, heretofore appointed, continue as such and that the chairman of said committee shall have authority to add to said committee such other members as he sees fit from the membership of this organization, and it shall be the duty of said committee to collect data, arrange publicity and handle any problems that may arise in connection with the present campaign for the coming bond election and shall otherwise co-operate with the Executive committee of this association.

That a collection be taken to defray the expenses of this

association. It is further recommended that this association pledge its support to all towns now lying on or adjacent to any highway traversing McCulloch county, in the final determination of said highway, and that this association will do all within its power to see that said highways go through said towns, subject to the approval of the State Highway department.

While we repose the utmost confidence in the honesty, integrity and ability of our Commissioners court, yet, they having publicly, at the November term of said court, requested and invited our aid, assistance and advice in solving such problems as may arise after said bonds are voted; it is therefore recommended that a committee be appointed to represent this association in said advisory capacity and in such matters as may arise between this association and the Commissioners


