#### SHROPSHIRE L KE CLUB DAM ONCE MORE REBUILT -DAM LEVEL IS RAISED

Carroll Gray, contractor in charge of the rebuilding of the Shropshire Lake club dam, washed out during the torrential rains of last month, Tuesday closed the gap in the dam, thereby restoring the dam to its original state. The dam is to be raised two feet now, to afford greater protection and to give greater strength, and incidentally the spillways on either side are to be deepened and enlarged. The committee in charge of rebuilding is confident that by this means a recurrence of the recent disaster will be avoided.

# TO OUR ICE CUSTOMERS AND THE

We realize that we are operating a public service business, and we want the people to know we are doing it along honest and legitimate lines; if we are not we are willing for reasonable men to correct us. We want the ice plant to be a credit, not only to Brady, but to us as operators. (And right here we want to say few towns the size of Brady have better plants,) and we feel that the people of Brady should be able to point to their ice plant with pride. We know you realize it is a seasonable business, and at the most cannot make a profit for more than four months out of the year. We have a capacity of over six thousand tons per year if we could operate continually, while the largest years business we have ever had was less than two thousand tons. We hope, however, to be able to increase the consumption by getting ice to the country people at a cheaper price; in most places in the country they are being charged \$1.50 to \$2.00 per cwt., when we only get 40c to 50c for the same ice. This is not only detrimental to us, but prohibits the people from using it, when they actually need it and want it, except as a luxury, which is an injustice to them.

We are charging 60c per cwt. to the retail trade at the platform for from 25 to 100 lbs., which is the same price being charged at Brownwood, a town four times he size of Brady, and with a plant more than four times the capacity, and we have arranged by the use of coupons to deliver this ice anywhere in the city limits in 50 lb. deliveries for 65c per cwt. or 21/2c for each delivery by purchasing 3,000 lbs.; at 66 2-3c per cwt, or 3 1-3c for each delivery by purchasing 1,500 lbs.; 70c per cwt or for each delivery by purchasing 500 lbs. In 25 lb. deliveries 66 2-3c per cwt. or 1 2-3c for each delivery by purchasing 1,500 lbs.; 70c per cwt er 2-12c for each delivery by purchasing 750 lbs., 74c per cwt. or 3 1-2c for each delivery by purchasing 250 lbs. In 12 1-2 lb. deliveries 70c per cwt. or 1 1-4c for each delivery by purchasing 750 lbs.; 72c per cwt. or 1 1-4c for each delivery by purchasing 375 lbs. This makes it possible for anybody to buy coupons and avoid paying a higher price off of wagons. We have installed the Protective Coupon System, which absolutely protects, and unless you will cooperate with us in the use of these coupons we see no way of maintaining an efficient delivery system at these

We do not want to sell ice at 80c per cwt.: we do not want that much money for it, but if we delivered from wagons as cheap for cash as for coupons, or at the platform, we could not hope for cooperation nor a cheap delivery price.

What would your coal dealer think if you asked him to deliver your coal one scuttle at a time, and pay for it as he delivered it? You can readily see how ridiculous it would be, yet that is exactly what we are expected to do in some instances in the ice business. Most people will buy from one to five tons of coal in the hot summer time, pay the cash for it, get it all delivered at one time, and put it out in rain and sun to air, slack and depreciate, as well as let the cows pack it off, in order to save on the price; you know, or your dealer can tell you. how much more it would cost you to make deliveries to you in this way and yet we know ice deliveries must, of necessity, be made every day or two.

Brady is a hard town in which to maintain a delivery service, anybody operating one will verify this statement. On account of the town being so scattered and rough it is very expensive; last year our delivery cost was almost 20c per cwt. It is our purpose to reduce this expense and give our customers the benefit of it in the price, but the only way it can be done is by delivering more ice with the same men and this can never be done as long as they have to be detained on the route to make change, or charges, or sent down town to your place of business to get the money. You know this makes extra expense ad trouble; not only to the delivery man, but to you as well. Your time is evidently worth something, besides having to be bothered with this every day occur-

As stated: We are selling ice at the plant for 60c per cwt., which is the same price charged before we went into the war, and you know there are very few things as near the old price, especially when operating costs are practically double. We used to hire an engineer for \$75.00 per month, now we pay \$150.00; delivery men for \$50.00, now we pay \$100.00, and other labor in proportion. Ammonia used to cost us 20c per lb., now it is 37c; fuel oil 80c per barrel, now it is around \$2.00 per barrel on an average, and has been double that amount. We never did go above 80c per cwt. on our ice while towns like Dallas and Fort Worth charged that amount, and small towns, especially in West and Southwest Texas charged \$1.00 per cwt. Almost all other commodities you can think of advanced from two to four times the former price, why single out the ice industry alone, all over the country, and try to make it stand all the loss? By every reason in the world, to a fair minded person, it is impossible for prices to be as low as before the war with freight rates and other things as they are. If you are going to try to force these conditions, why not do so all down the line. You know living expenses are almost double, building material as well; doctors, druggists, lawyers and even our own home town papers, as well as preachers and teachers have to have more for their services. You might single out some of these that seem high, but upon thorough investigation you might decide differently.

Don't you think you would rather see our public utilities operated by home people, or the city, so the surplus if any, will stay at home, than to see them in the hands of large public Corporations who live in New York or some other city, and who have very little feeling for us, besides taking all their surplus away, and when they get in they can do as they please about prices and service, and everything else. We have an immediate instance at Ballinger, they put ice at \$1.00 per cwt. and light in proportion. The city became indignant, voted a large amount of bonds and put in a complete plant, with a result that the Company cut the price to 25c per cwt. at the platform, which was ruinous, and the city now has used up its money, and will have to quit or vote more bonds to pay operating expenses, unless the people are willing to pay a reasonable price for the service which is hard to get them to do when they can get it for nothing. The Company can run at a loss because they have plants all over the country at which they are making a profit, but this cannot and will not continue, because eventually it will have to be put on a reasonable basis. We do not believe any reasonable person would want to see such conditions in Brady. Some few might profit while it was going on, but it would be different after it was over with.

During the time there was so much agitation in Ft. Worth and Dallas about ice prices, we had an example of how unreasonable people can be and how absolutely indifferent and uncharitable to the needs of others. It was absolutely established that the Women's Clubs who were the most active and the hardest persecutors, enrolled numerous members who thought nothing of paying \$25.00 for a pair of shoes, \$50,00 for a hat, or \$200.00 for a dress, seemingly never conscious of their inconsistency. It simply goes to show to what extremes people

We want to render an efficient service and only ask for a fair and reasonable return, and we earnestly crave your co-operation and support in making our service better, as well as more efficient, to the end, that prices may be kept as low as good business methods will justify, and with a further object of working together for a bigger and better Brady, who's interest will be more closely allied and better cemented in the spirit of mutual good. # FORD TURNS OUT 6,000,000TH MOTOR

### **Next One Comes Through** 5-1\3 Seconds Later

Ford Motor Number 6,000,000 was lifted from the assembly line in the Highland Park Ford Plant at 9:14 a. m. May 18th. Just 5 1-3 seconds later Number 6,000,001 was finished.

The unusually heavy demand for Ford cars and trucks at the present time has necessitated the building of 5400 motors daily. These are shipped in carload lots to the various Ford assembling plants throughout the United States.

The first Model "T" Ford motor was completed on October 1, 1908; number 1,000,000 left the assembly line December 10, 1915; and number 5,000,000 came through May 28, 1921.

Although the Ford Motor Company turned out a number of different models prior to 1908, the present numbering system began with the first Model "T."


