## HOWARD PAYNE COLLEGE BEGINS SEPTEMBER 11th.

Howard Payne College is just completing the most successful summer term in its history. Dr. J. B. Holt of Kerrville delivered the commencement address on August 11th to a College Class of 12 graduates and an Academy class of 30.

Howard Payne College has grown steadily since it became a standard college in 1915. Its college enrollment annually is about four hundred and its sub-college enrollment about four hundred. Quite a large number of the teachers through Central Texas received their diplomas and teachers' certificates thru this institution. The college is classed first class by the State Department of Education and by the Texas Association of Colleges. Freshman receive two year high school and four year elementary certificates. Sophomores receive four year high school and six year elementary certificates. Those holding the elementary certificates receive permanent elementary certificates and Seniors receive permanent certificates. Graduates of the college complete their master's degrees in one year.

The Fall term will begin on September 11th. Four year College and Academy courses will be offered. The academy will begin its work for the first time in the building recently purchased from the city high school, with a separate organization and discipline. A strong faculty will offer courses in the various branches of Fine Arts. The business college is equipped with the latest mechanical and electrical contrivances for teaching.

## SCORES BLANTON ATTACK.

Editor Star-Telegram: I see in The Star-Telegram of Sunday in "Letters From the People," a letter signed by a bunch of Cogdell brothers who give no address or other sign of where they live, or who they are, but go on at great length by inuendo and slander, with a subtle and garbled mixture of a very little truth and much inuendo to attack Oscar Callaway.

I have lived on an adjoining farm to Oscar Callaway all his life and know him thoroughly and every incident of his life and of the lives of his family. I know thoroughly and familiarly the whole story of his devotion to his father and his brothers and sisters as well as the story of his political courage and honesty and his devotion to the people. I never knew a man who was more devoted to a brother.

This letter has been mailed all over the Seventeenth District and published in all the newspapers as political advertising. It is prepared and circulated by Blanton himself as a campaign document, at an expense of thousands of dollars, and that notwithstanding his statement, that he could not meet Callaway because he had already spent all the money authorized by law.

The fact is that Callaway never sought to obstruct the draft or any war measure. His speech in Comanche in August, 1917, did more to promote the draft and adherence to the law than any one thing done in the county. During the war Callaway personally directed and took part in the work of his farm which produced wheat and other food products enough to feed thousands of people. He had three brothers in the army, all of whom are now members of the American Legion and one of whom is commander of his post.

The statement that Callaway tried to make a speech in Gorman in 1918 and was informed that he could not make a speech of that kind there is absolutely false. The only speech Callaway made or attempted to make in Gorman in 1918 was a speech in the Governor's race. He made this speech without any molestation in the afternoon and left there to make another speaking date. I have under-

stood that after Callaway left Gorman one Judge Jean P. Day made a speech there.

Blanton prefers this form of campaign to coming out in the open and meeting Callaway like a man, as he has challenged him to do through the columns of your paper and through circulars distributed over the district. I see that 77 citizens of Lometa, Texas, sent Blanton a telegram asking him to meet Callaway there, and I understand that 50 citizens of Santo and more than 200 citizens of Carbon and Gorman on last Saturday sent him similar requests, offering to pay all expenses if he would meet Callaway and answer the charges against him. He has refused all petitions, though he is still in the district and has no other speaking dates which would interfere with his meeting Callaway.

look out for any kind of cowardly attack on my part or any cowardly attack to be made by Blanton in newspapers or circulars, during the last days of the campaign. Knowing the character of the campaign Blanton has waged in the past and is waging now, we must be ready to protect ourselves and the district from his viciousness.

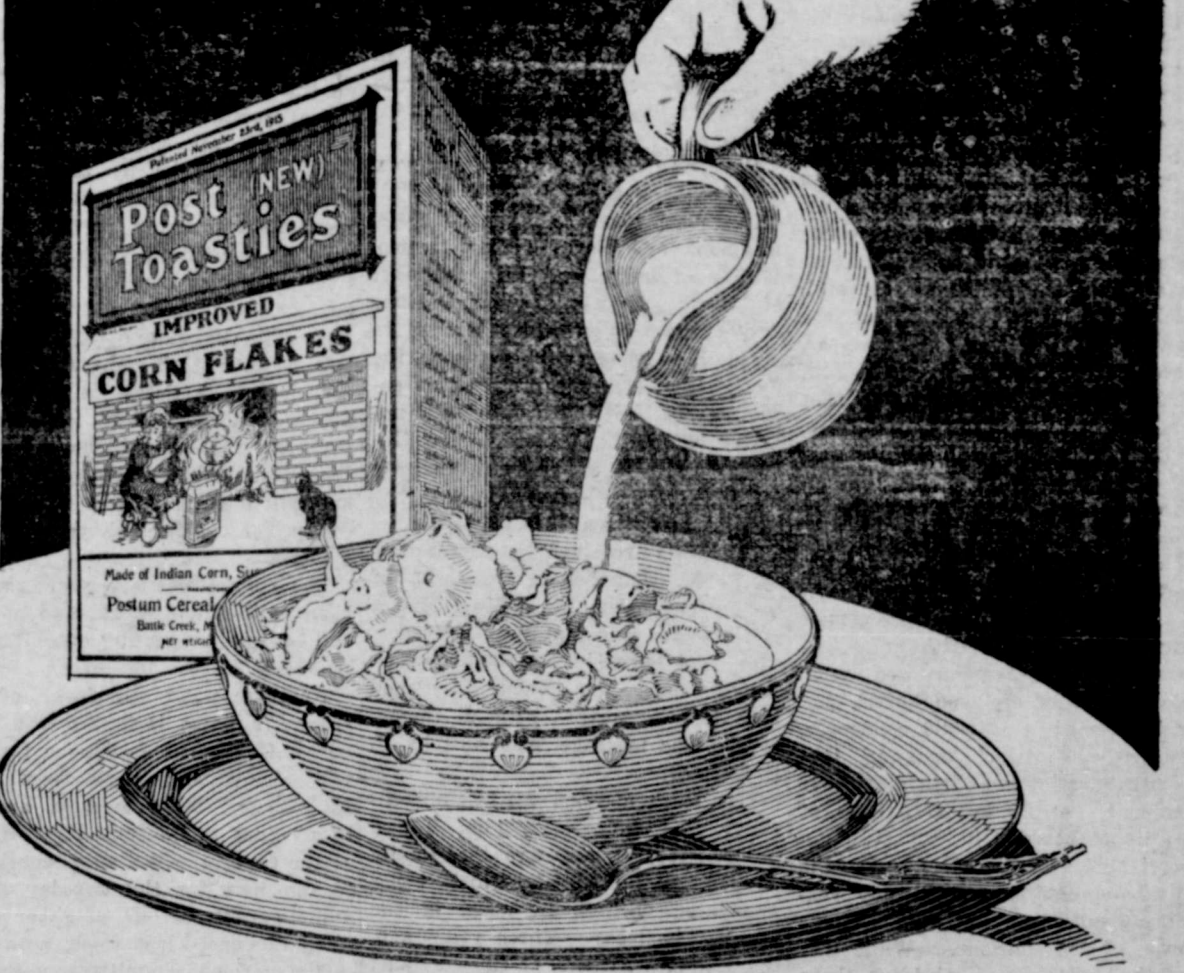
