The biggest still and outfit ever seen in these parts was captured at 2:30 o'clock Monday morning eight miles south of Brady in the Voca community by Constable Green Owens and his deputy. Two trucks were required to bring the outfit to Brady Monday morning, there being a huge copper boiler of 25 to 30 gallon capacity, an iron barrel fitted up as condenser, and fifteen wooden barrels.
