### CHILDREN UNDER SCHOLASTIC AGE MUST ENTER 11TH

TUESDAY-FRADY

In making mention in the Tuesday issue of the opening of the Brady schools on Monday, September 11th, The Standard failed to state that only children who have attained the age of 7 years before September 1st are eligible to entrance in the Brady grade school as free pupils. The scholastic age is from 7 to 21 years. All children who are six years old on or before September 1st, may attend by paying tuition, provided they start at the beginning of the term. No pupil under scholastic age will be of the school September 11th.

Rates of tuition are as follows: Pupils in the primary grades—the 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th-\$3.00 per month.

Pupils in the intermediate grades -5th, 6th and 7th-\$3.50 per month. Pupils in the high school, \$5.00 per



### BLIND NEGRO BOY GIVES EX-PRESSION OF FEELINGS IN ASPIRING TO EDUCATION

The Standard has been handed the following composition, written by Alfred Williams, a blind negro boy, who calls Brady his home, but who is a student in the Deaf, Dumb and Blind institute at Austin. The subject of the composition is "The Rugged Mountain," and the aspirations of the student are compared to the ambition of the mountain-climber, who aspires to the heights beyond. The composition by the colored boy was compiled by J. N. O. Brown, pastor of the local colored Baptist

Here is the vision that Alfred Williams sees through his sightless eyes: The Rugged Mountain."

"When we are going through different schools, we are only climbing the rugged mountain that will lead us to success, and when we get halfway up these mountains and stop, then we have made a failure in the sight of the whole world; but when we make up our mind to climb these mountains then the world will be overjoyed. There are some people who will stop at the foot of these mountains and never know what is at the top, but the boy or girl, young man or lady who toils over these great rocks and never gives up will finally reach the top where the doors of success will be open waiting to greet them. But, remember, when we get to the foot of these mountains, there will be a guide who will lead us onward to the top, and without this guide we can never find the top. He knows the way up these mountains and he will lead us on, so come along and let us find these mountaintops where the broad fields of success are waiting to greet us. If there is anyone who has stopped at the foot of these mountains, just say 'From today I am going to find the top of these mountains, where success reigns forever until the end.'


"Oh, come and let us go on-the guide will lead us and we have no need of fear. There are men and women who have gone into the world and failed. Why did they fail? Did they go to the top of these mountains? No! no! they did not; they stayed at the foot and never knew what was at the top. 


